STAFFORD AT TODAY'S CONVOCATION

The address at the weekly convocation on Thursday, July 5, will be given by Russell Henry Stafford, on the topic "Civic Courage." Mr. Stafford was for a time pastor of the First Congregational Church of Minneapolis, largely attended by University students, but has now removed to the Pilgrim Church of St. Louis. During his residence in Minneapolis he became a great favorite in University circles and a most popular speaker. His return for this convocation will be something of a reunion, and he will undoubtedly be greeted by a large audience.

MISSISSIPPI RIVER EXCURSION

The annual Summer Session excursion by steamer down the Mississippi will take place on Saturday, July 7. The boat will leave the dock, foot of Jackson street, St. Paul, at one o'clock, and return about eleven at night. A stop will be made at Grey Cloud Island, where suppers will be eaten, and games played, previous to the start on the return trip. The excursion is one of the delights of the summer, and all students should make plans now.

The capacity of the steamer is limited to 1000, and tickets up to that number will be sold at the Bursar's office. The charge, thirty-five cents, covers the cost of the chartering of the boat and landing privileges. Music for dancing will be supplied afternoon and evening, and other forms of recreation will be provided. Excursionists must provide their own basket lunches for supper, because no other facilities (other than confectionery and light drinks) will be available on the trip.

TWO COMEDIES BY COFFER-MILLER PLAYERS

Attention is called to the appearance next week of the Coffe-Miller Players, a Chicago organization of high repute, in two unusual performances. On Thursday night they will play Moliere's comedy "The Imaginary Invalid;" on Friday night the old English comedy "Gammer Gurton's Needle." Neither of these plays are of common production, in fact they are relatively unknown to the average play-goer. The company has revived them with great success and this is a rare opportunity to get acquainted with them.

Admission to the plays has been placed at the flat rate of one dollar. There will be no reserved seats, and the sale will be open to the public.

"SOCIOLOGY OF LEADERSHIP"

To train young people for the various forms of social work which are continually demanding new recruits, the University maintains a Course for the Training of Social Workers. Professor Stuart Chapin, Chairman of the Department of Sociology, is director of this course, and in the conduct of his work has occasion to estimate the qualifications necessary for this profession. Some of these qualities may be considered from the psychological point of view, and some from the sociological. Looming large in all cases is the question of leadership. In the lecture which Professor Chapin will deliver in the Little Theater on Thursday afternoon he will consider this matter of leadership from the point of view of the sociologist. All who are interested in leadership—and who is not?—whether for social work or for any other profession should hear him.

CONFERENCES ON RELIGIOUS EDUCATION

The presence in the city of Allyn K. Foster, Student Secretary of the Board of Education of the Northern Baptist Convention, has enabled the University Y. M. C. A. to arrange for a series of conferences on religious education, for the benefit of teachers and other leaders. There is a large necessity these days for a clear discrimination on the questions growing out of the apparent conflict between religion and science. The growing youth of the schools as well as of colleges need guidance in this matter as much as in any phase of their education. Dr. Foster will attempt in these conferences to present a really scientific approach to religion, and to help teachers in passing it on. The meetings will be open to women as well as men, and will be held in the beautiful new Y. M. C. A. Building, on University Avenue opposite the Knoll. They will be held at 3 p. m. on Thursday, July 5, Tuesday, July 10, and Friday, July 13.

LECTURES BY RABBI MANNHEIMER

The first of a series of three lectures on the contribution of Jewish culture will be given in the Little Theater on Monday afternoon at four o'clock. The lecturer will be Rabbi Eugene Mannheimer, of Des Moines. He is a representative scholar of the Jewish faith, selected by the Jewish Chautauqua Society as lecturer for educational institutions.

STUDENTS' HEALTH SERVICE

The Health Service is established for the purpose of furnishing medical care for all students registered in the University. During summer sessions physical examinations are not compulsory, but will be provided by appointment on request. All professional services, dispensary care, and two days' hospital care are free. Vaccination, against small pox, typhoid fever, and diphtheria may be had at any time free of charge. Special drugs are dispensed on a cost basis. Outside calls are made on a cost basis at the rate of 50c for day and \$1.00 for night calls. Hospital care exceeding two days is furnished on a cost basis of approximately \$2 per day including bed, board, laundry, drugs and nursing care. The Dental Service operates on a cost basis of approximately \$2.00 per hour plus materials. A physician and a nurse are available at all hours to care for emergencies. Cases other than emergencies should come to the dispensary at one of the hours listed below. Previous appointments made at the desk will be given preference.
