Eighteen Girls Enroll in New Practical Nursing Course Home Management Will Be Important Feature Course Will Prepare Students for State Examinations

Eighteen girls are enrolled in the new Home Management and Practical Nursing Course and scores of inquiries are being received from other candidates for admission to the course.

If the demand becomes great enough, it may be that a new class will be started at the beginning of the winter term.

This course differs from other School Courses in that it is in session continuously for eighteen months. During each of the two fall terms, the students will take most of their work on the St. Paul campus. From April through June, they will have practice training in nursing at the University Hospitals under the supervision of The University School of Nursing. From July through August, the students will be assigned to selected rural hospitals with community health facilities for further training experience under the supervision and direction of The School of Nursing.

The Minnesota Medical Association has given this new course its enthusiastic support. The Farm Bureau women are engaged in recruiting new students for it.

Enrollees should be girls from 17 to 35 years of age. Preferably, these candidates should be high school graduates, but others who are from 17 to 35 will have consideration. The latter group should require a somewhat longer period of training.

At the close of the course, each enrollee will be ready to take the State Board Examinations for license as a Practical Nurse.

Dr. Ella Rose and Miss Elvira Thompson, School of Home Economics, were the representatives of the School of Agriculture on the committee which planned the curriculum, this summer. Others on this committee were members of the University School of Nursing staff, Miss Margery Low, chairman of the joint committee, Miss Dorothy Titt and Miss Eugenia Taylor, instructor of the new nursing course. Miss Elvira Thompson is advisor to the girls taking the course.

Swedish Exchange Visitors Examine American Agriculture

Four Swedish exchange students were welcomed to the School of Agriculture on Oct. 6. They were Ake Marde, Malmö; Olle Oredsson, Hassleholm; Ake Darin, Lidingö; and Anders Johansson, Falkenberg. Last spring, three other Swedish students had arrived and had spent the summer working on Minnesota farms. They were Sven T. Brunberg, Tuing; Hans Bertel Olsen, Odemarksgård; and Staffan W. Quarstrom, Herrnas over Enhorna.

These seven men are the first students to arrive under the new State Department program for exchange visitors—authorizing such students to work as well as study.

Dr. J. O. Christianson pointed out during a recent meeting of the student body, that the School of Agriculture is considering sending six or eight students to Sweden next summer, under the provisions of the exchange. The three Aggies who have been in Sweden since, last April, were Charles Knoblauch, Howard Lake, Carl Lohmann, Zumbrot; and Eldon Torkelson, Hanska. They are now attending Swedish schools of agriculture.

Dr. Christianson also pointed out that it was very fortunate that agricultural conditions in Sweden correspond so closely to those in Minnesota.

At the October 7 meeting of the International Relations Club the seven Swedish visitors appeared on the program comparing Sweden's agriculture with Minnesota's.
