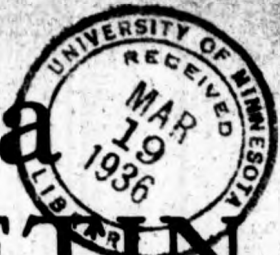

Seniors who expect to receive their degrees at the Commencement exercises Thursday, March 19, are asked to note carefully the following items of information:

ACADEMIC COSTUME—Candidates for degrees will appear in cap and gown as usual. Those who have not purchased gowns may rent them at the Perine Book Company, the Minnesota Co-Op., the Engineers Book Store, Crane Student Supply Store and the "U" Trading Post for \$1.50 for the week.

It is recommended that the women wear uniform white collars, gun-metal hose and dark shoes; the men, white collars, dark ties and dark shoes.

REHEARSAL—On Thursday, March 19, at 9 a.m., the candidates will meet on the stage in the Northrop Memorial auditorium to rehearse the formalities of the occasion and to receive final instructions.

PROCESSION—At 10:30 a.m. all candidates in cap and gown will assemble on the stage of the Northrop Memorial auditorium and will march from there to their places in the main hall.

Classes meeting 2, 3 or more hours a day are expected to use the period assigned for the first hour at which the class meets. The period for the second hour that the class meets may also be used if desired.

Conflicts in examinations should be referred to schedule committee of college concerned.

Attention is called to the fact that while the final examination schedule lists examination periods for Monday, Wednesday, Friday classes and for Tuesday, Thursday, Saturday classes, it is intended that the classes meeting 4 or more days per week shall be examined at the time set for Monday, Wednesday, Friday classes.

For example: A class meeting sixth hour on Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday, and Friday should report for the final examination on Monday, March 16, at 8:00 at the time scheduled for sixth hour Monday, Wednesday, Friday classes and not at the time scheduled for the sixth hour Tuesday, Thursday classes.

All instructors are asked to observe this principle in order to avoid concentration of examinations and conflicts.

PAYMENT OF FEES

Spring Quarter Fees Should Be Paid by March 19

It is recommended that students pay fees by mail to avoid inconvenience and delay. When remitting by mail do not send cash. All checks, drafts and money orders should be made payable to the University of Minnesota. Fee payments for the College of Agriculture, Forestry and Home Economics should be mailed to the "Cashier, University Farm, St. Paul," whereas all other payments should be mailed to the "Bursar, University of Minnesota, Minneapolis." All three sections of the fee statement should accompany the remittance.

Fee payments submitted by mail must bear a post mark prior to 12 o'clock midnight, March 19, to avoid additional fees for late payment. A late fee of \$2 will be charged for payments received from March 20-28. On Monday, March 30, the late fee will be \$3 and increases at the rate of \$1 for each additional day of delay thereafter to a maximum of \$10.

NOTICE TO DEPARTMENTS

Charges against student deposits should be reported to the registrar's office not later than 12 noon Wednesday, March 25.

To facilitate recording, final grades for the winter quarter should be sent to the registrar's office as early as possible. All grades should be submitted before noon of Wednesday, March 25. It will greatly facilitate grade recording if individual reports are forwarded immediately as typing is completed.

Health Examinations

The certification law passed by the Minnesota State Legislature in 1929 requires that all persons in order to be certificated must be "physically competent" to teach. In accordance with this law students are required to pass certain physical and health examinations at the University Health Service upon entrance to the College of Education and again prior to graduation. No student who has failed to pass these examinations will be recommended for certification.

The Health Service offers one appointment for a health examination without charge. Students who fail to keep their appointment will find it necessary to make a new appointment at the regular fee of \$4.

Students in the College of Education who have not yet met this requirement are requested to call at the Health Service at once to make an appointment, and are reminded of the importance of keeping the appointment.
