Shared Expertise

At the heart of the DCN community is our shared expertise. While everyone contributes a wealth of knowledge, collectively, our strengths cover more formats and disciplines than we could achieve alone.

After 6 years of growth, the DCN community is now more than 60 members strong, with curation expertise representing many formats.

Number of DCN Curators Identifying as Experts in Each Data Type

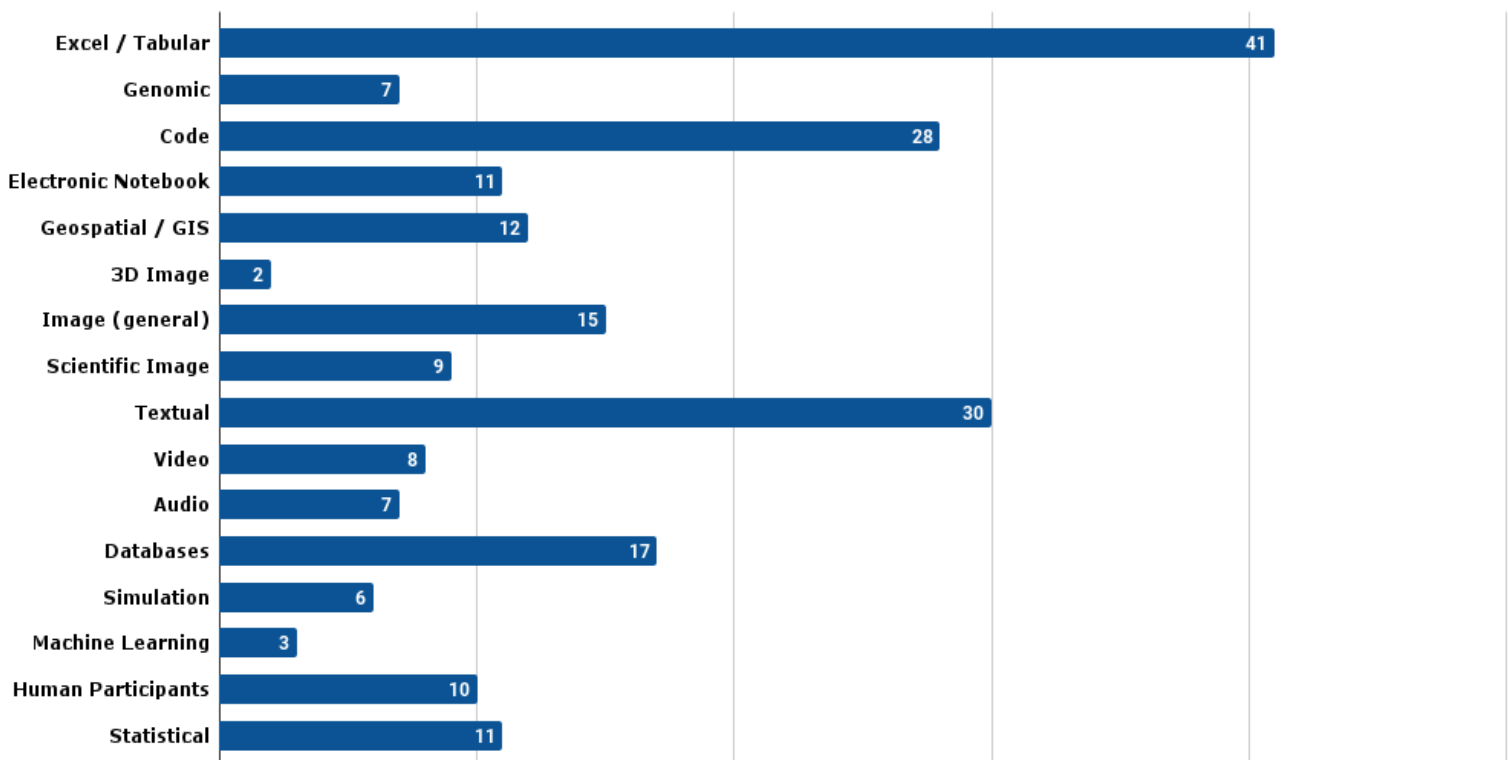


Figure 1: Curator format expertise in 2022.

In addition to the format expertise, many curators bring extensive experience in multiple subjects and disciplines. This disciplinary expertise is essential for reviewing datasets with an eye towards the needs of other researchers and future re-users within that domain.

DCN Disciplinary Expertise Representation

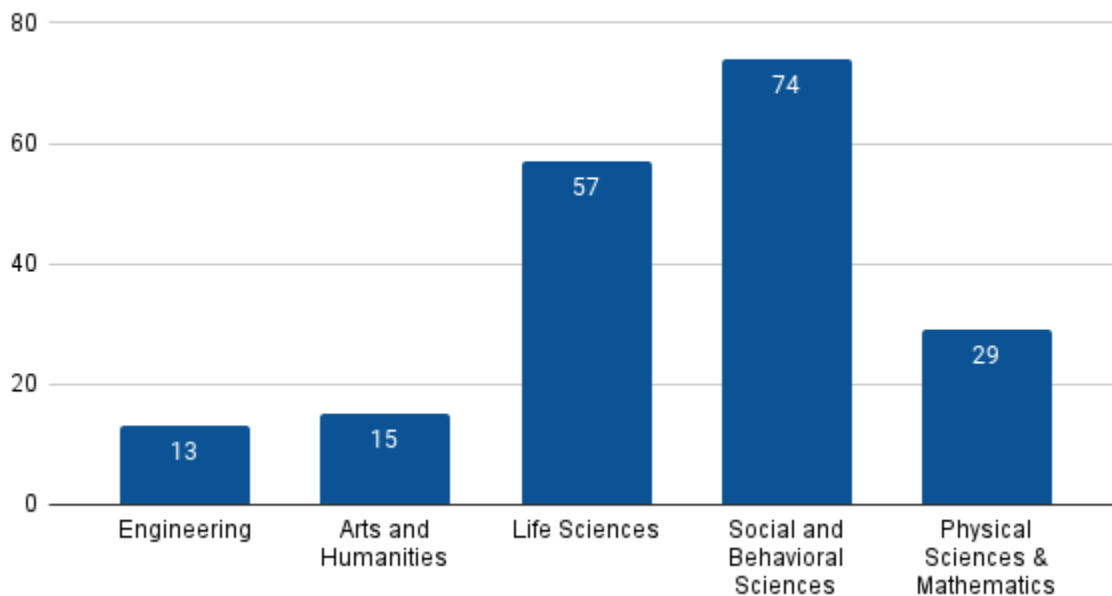
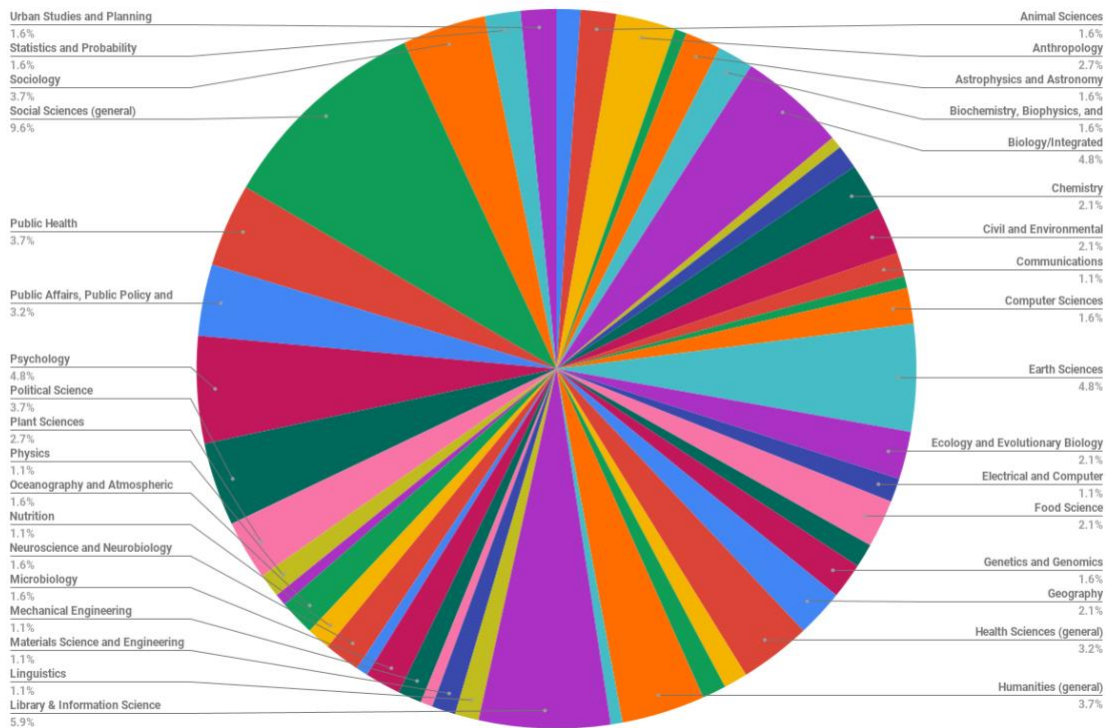


Figure 2: Curator disciplinary expertise in 2022.

The above graphic depicts the wide variety of subject expertise represented within the DCN. As is demonstrated by the rainbow of colors, DCN members can provide support across subjects both immediately, through curation support for other DCN members, as well as through educational efforts, such as primer creation and providing consultative support.

Shared curation statistics

In 2022, the DCN hit the impressive milestone of **300 datasets curated** through our shared curation workflow – and **more than 7,000 datasets** in 2022 alone across our institutions!

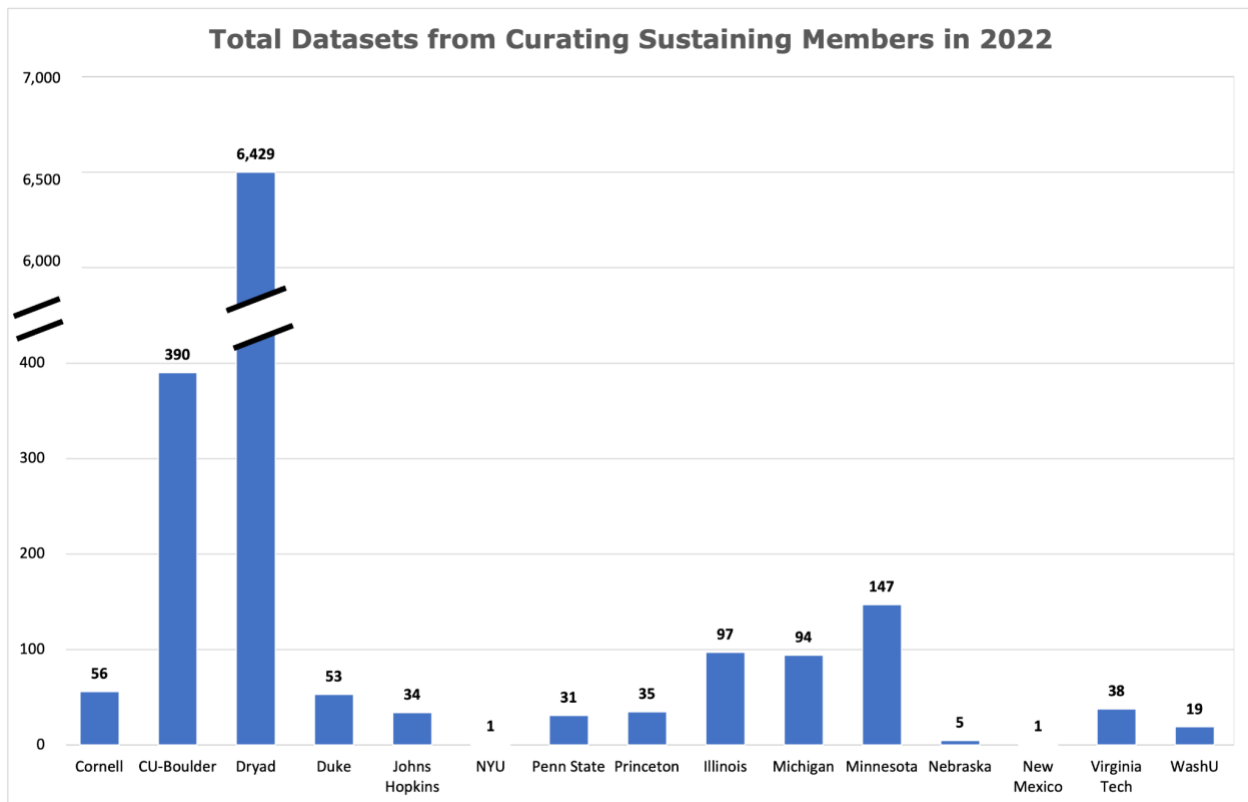
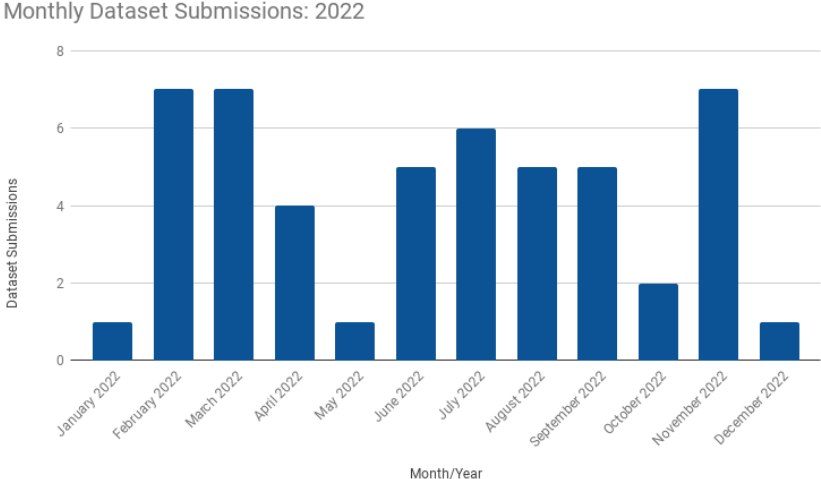


Figure 4: Total Datasets from curating sustaining members in 2022.

Each institution decides which datasets to send to the Data Curation Network for additional curatorial support. While the vast majority of datasets are curated locally, this is in fact a testament to the community of practice and education available for DCN members. Through resources like our primers and workshop, as well as the ability to connect with fellow curators via Slack, email, and meetings, members can empower themselves and one another to curate more datasets locally.

Datasets curated in 2022



In 2022, the DCN received 51 dataset submissions from Sustaining Members. While submissions were noticeably lower during the Summer and Winter breaks, overall, the shared curation workflow received a steady stream of use.

Figure 5: Monthly submissions to the DCN shared curation workflow in 2022.

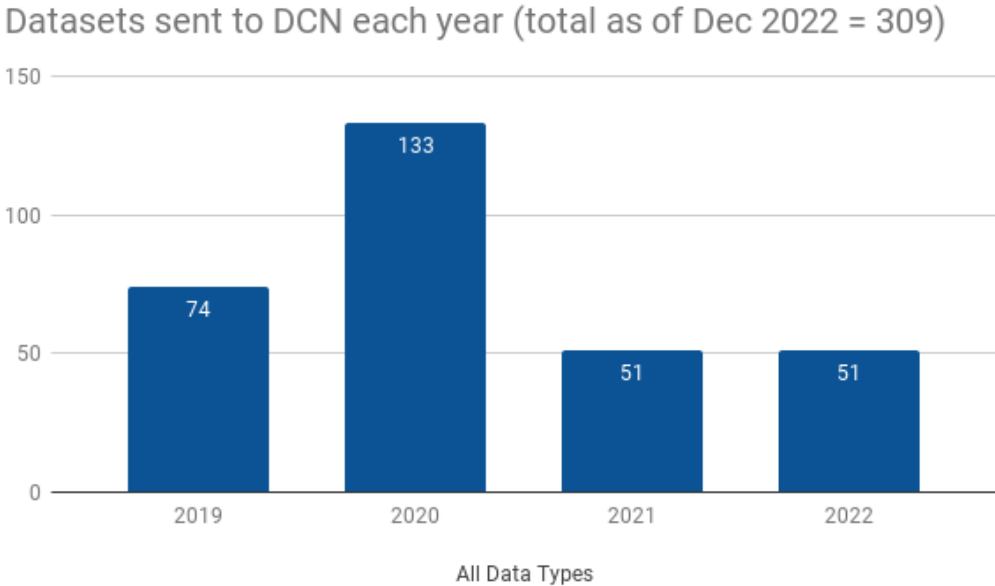


Figure 6: Yearly submissions to the DCN shared curation workflow since 2019

Additionally, use of the DCN’s shared curation workflow has remained consistent with the previous year. In 2022, there was a strong demand for curation support for Physical Sciences and Mathematics datasets.

DCN 2022 Shared Curation Disciplines

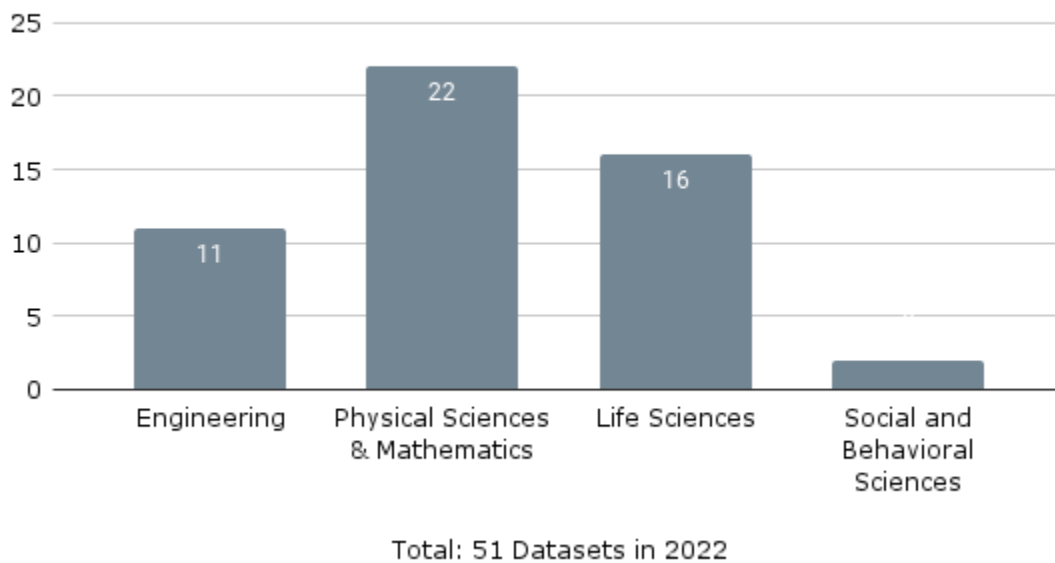


Figure 7: Yearly submissions to the DCN shared curation workflow since 2019

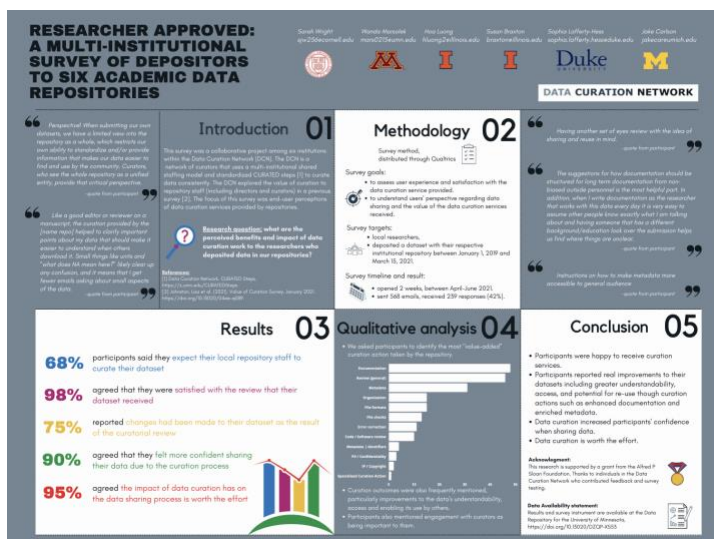
Community of Practice

The DCN is a thriving community of practitioners, and the special interest groups provide an opportunity for DCN members to coalesce around specific topics. While some are open ended and discussion based, others are focused and output-based groups. Here are a few highlights from our special interest groups in 2022...

Big Data Interest Group

With participation from members of the DCN, the Digital Research Alliance of Canada, and anyone in the research data management community, the Big Data Interest Group is working to create a framework to inform discussion around the management, ingestion, curation, preservation, access and use of big data in repositories, with the goal of developing guidance for and an understanding of current practice. The past year, the group has prioritized discussion between members as well as presentations from field experts.

End User Satisfaction



The End User Satisfaction group has continued to prepare two papers for publication, one from the researcher perspective and one from the repository manager perspective. At Open Repositories 2022, in Denver, Colorado, team members presented the poster, [“Researcher Approved: a Multi-institutional Survey of Depositors to Six Academic Data Repositories.”](#) This poster

Institutional Outreach & Communications

The Institutional Outreach and Communications Interest Group continued to develop outreach materials, share experiences of outreach at their institutions, and led a peer-compare discussion on institutional data policies. In 2022, the group developed a template others can use and repurpose for performing interviews with researchers at their institution to generate data sharing stories and piloted this template at two DCN institutions (see this example from [Duke](#)). In 2023, the group will release a template flier DCN members can use to connect with campus partners that incorporates results from the End User Satisfaction Survey.

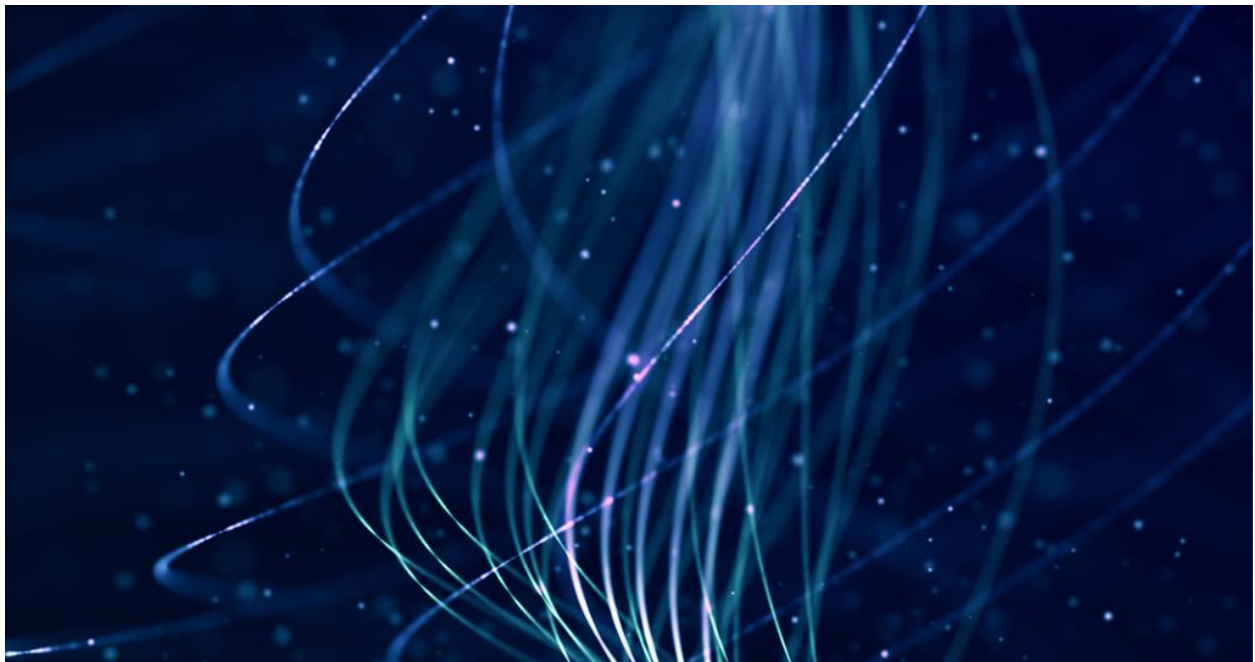
Human Subjects

The Human Subjects Interest Group has focused on educational efforts this past year. The group led a workshop at the DCN's All Hands Meeting 2022 on Human Data Essentials. Additionally, the team led two internal peer-compare discussions: the first about human data policies for our repositories, and the second on preparation for the National Institutes of Health (NIH) 2023 Data Management and Sharing policy. In 2023, the Human Subjects Interest Group

will continue educational efforts as well as producing resources to support data curators in stewarding human data.

Racial Justice

The Racial Justice Working Group met regularly in 2022, and focused on articulating the group's charter and proposed activities for 2023. The group was a key part of revising the CURATE(D) model (below) to incorporate ethical considerations and more inclusive language and in drafting [comments](#) in response to the joint ALA/ARL Cultural Proficiencies For Racial Equity: A Framework. The group also regularly assessed what racial justice means to the DCN as its membership grows, as the network develops more resources for wider audiences, and engages in new partnerships.



Education committee

The Education Committee had an incredibly busy year! Below we cover some of the highlights– we have even more in store for 2023.

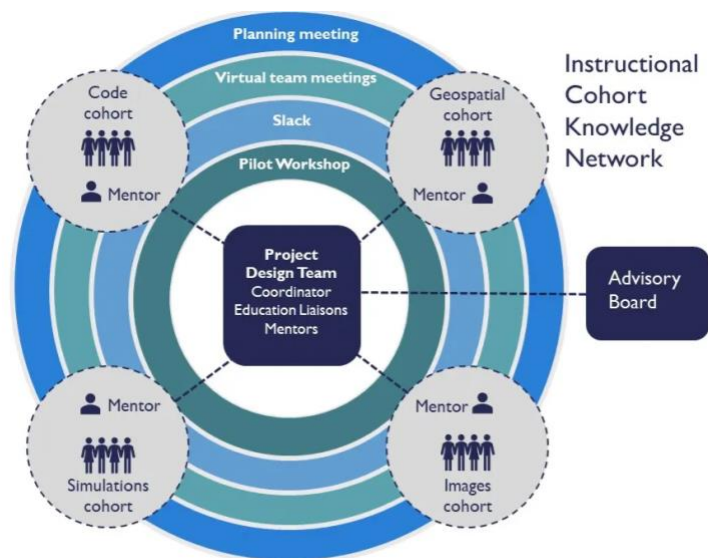
IMLS Grant: Instructional Cohorts



Sophia Lafferty-Hess (Duke University), in partnership with the University of Minnesota, Washington University in St. Louis, Princeton University, the University of Minnesota, University of California at Santa Barbara, and the Association of Research Libraries, received an Institute of Museum and Library Services (IMLS) Grant, “Developing Specialized Data Curation Training to Address Needed Expertise in Focused Areas.” This project

will build on previous DCN educational training materials to support the development of specialized curriculum for data curation training.

Information professionals have been recruited into instructional cohorts to develop new curriculum for four specialized data types: code, geospatial data, scientific images, and simulation data. Over the course of 2023, the team will create open source educational materials and plan to pilot the curriculum at a workshop in October 2023.

CURATE(D) 2.0

Many working groups, including the Racial Justice, Education, and Refining the CURATE(D) standard, proposed changes to the [CURATE\(D\) steps](#) to improve the use and transparency of this document. The revised workflow now includes:

- A preamble that includes information about how to use the CURATE(D) steps, in particular the iterative nature of curation and prompting questions to consider whether data should be shared.
- Key ethical considerations at each step
- Standardized formatting and more inclusive language, to expand the applicability of the workflow beyond data curators to include data creators.

Data Curation Primers

The Data Curation Primers, which were initially designed to capstone the CURATE(D) workshop, continue to be an invaluable resource for the research data management community. In 2022, many DCN Primers were initiated, and are set to be published in 2023. Newly published at the end of the year is the [Clinical Trials Data Primer \(archival version\)](#), led by Liliana and mentored by Sophia Lafferty-Hess and Jen Darragh (Duke University). External peer reviewers for this Primer were Genevieve Milliken at the NYU Health Sciences Library, and Lisa Federer at the National Library of Medicine.

Research, Publications, and Presentations

The Data Curation Network leverages our extensive community of practice to conduct research projects of interest to informational professionals and researchers alike. In 2022, many of our research projects were collaborations with key partners, including the [Association of Research Libraries](#) (ARL) and [Ithaka S+R](#).

Realities of Academic Data Sharing

The [Realities of Academic Data Sharing \(RADS\) Initiative](#), led by ARL, brings together expertise from the Data Curation Network to better understand the costs of public access to research data across academic institutions to meet public access requirements. In 2022, RADS Project Manager, Shawna Taylor (left) joined the project.



Over the course of the past year, the RADS Initiative also investigated [where researchers are making their data publicly available](#) by analyzing metadata from the global research infrastructure and institutional repositories. Concurrently, the team collaborated with the [Council on](#)

[Governmental Relations](#) and developed Public Access [Data Management and Sharing Activities for Academic Administration and Researchers](#).

Data Communities: Collaboration with Ithaka S+R

In 2021, the Data Curation Network and Ithaka S+R were awarded a grant from the National Science Foundation to support the development and needs of data communities (National Science Foundation [Grant No.2103433](#)).

During Spring 2022, DCN representatives Jake Carlson, Joel Herndon, and Lisa Johnston and Ithaka S+R staff Dylan Ruediger and Danielle Cooper, brought together a cohort of researchers and informational professionals for a two-day virtual workshop to explore and advance voluntary data sharing in STEM fields. There were a total of [14 participating communities](#), with significant support from DCN members as the information professionals.

In August, the research team released the final report of this effort:

[Leveraging Data Communities to Advance Open Science: Findings from an Incubation Workshop Series](#)

The report summarizes the key findings of the workshop series and the challenges different data communities face, including:

- Data communities have distinct needs at different points in their lifecycle
- Metadata and ontologies are social infrastructure
- Information professionals are an important resource
- Aligning funding structures with sustainability is a challenge
- Data communities need to resist the urge to overbuild

The report concludes by providing different recommendations for various stakeholders, including data communities at different developmental stages, information professionals, universities, and repositories.

DCN Adopts Strategic Framework

In January 2022, the DCN officially adopted the [2022-2025 Strategic Framework](#). This document was the result of many listening sessions and invaluable feedback from DCN members.  - Objective #6 Provide education and training external to DCN
- **Mission: As an organization we will grow the DCN in a sustainable and responsive way.**
 - Objective #7 Forge strategic partnerships with like-minded organizations
 - Objective #8 Grow the DCN in a sustainable and responsive way

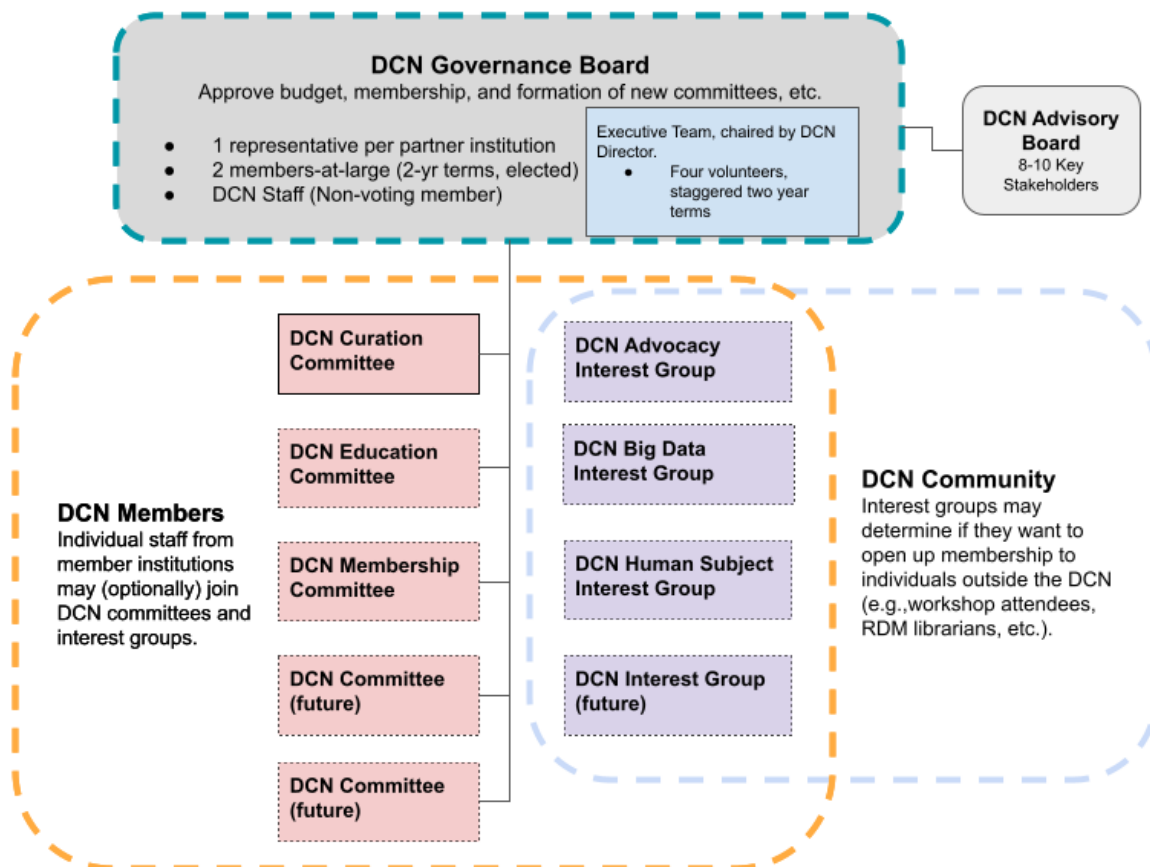
Governance Model Revision

At the annual All Hands Meeting 2022, the DCN Governance Board voted to adopt [a revised Governance Model](#) which includes several key changes:

- Formalizing and codifying the Executive Committee and its roles and responsibilities in the DCN
- Redesigning the role of DCN Director to reflect our current reality now that the Director is a full time position and the Assistant Director role is no more
- Removing elections as the means of determining committee chairs and Executive Board committee members in favor of seeking volunteers.

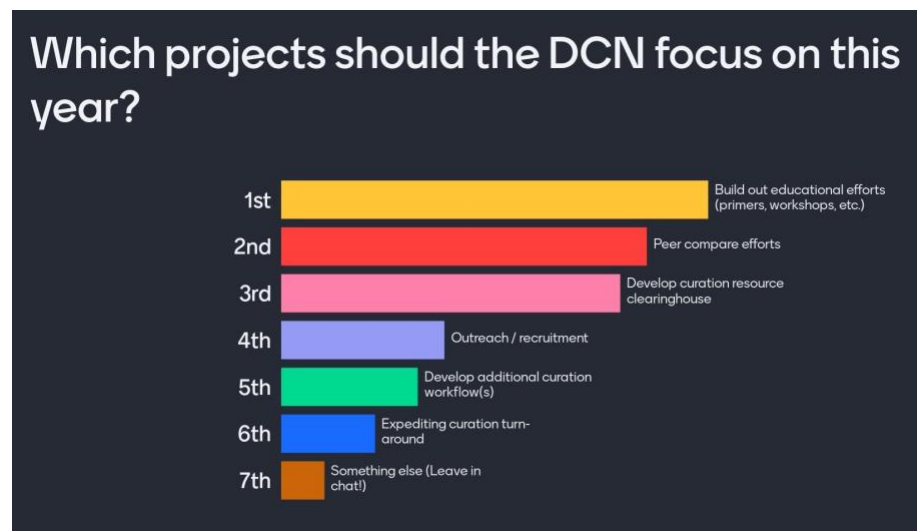
