CHARTERED BOAT TRIP ON MINNETONKA

On Saturday there will be opportunity for 125 to enjoy a two-hour ride covering practically the whole length of Lake Minnetonka. A boat has been chartered, to leave the Excelsior wharf at 4 o'clock, for the exclusive use of our party. Tickets for the boat are now on sale at the Bursar's office, at 25 cents each.

The trip to Excelsior may be made on the trolley, leaving from the station, 17 North Sixth street. The last car to connect with the boat leaves at 3:10 p.m. The boat will return to Excelsior at 6 o'clock.

This trip will give a survey of the lake, one of the beauty spots of the state, that cannot be secured in any other way; no other boats go over the same route. It is an opportunity that visiting students should not miss. Parties wishing to picnic will find ample opportunity at Excelsior.

HELPS FOR HANDICAPPED CHILDREN

One of the outstanding features of modern American education is its attempt to adapt itself to varying needs, and especially to those children who are by nature in some way handicapped. Special techniques have been developed, special classes, special teachers, all endeavoring to make it possible for the handicapped to get the most out of life.

Miss Mae E. Bryne, who is director of the special class teaching in the Minneapolis city schools and therefore responsible for what she is to promulgate, will speak on the subject of this work for the handicapped as it is carried on in Minneapolis, on Tuesday afternoon at 3:30 in the Old Library Auditorium. This work has a large social import, and should be of interest to a wide range of people outside the field of education as well as within.

WHAT ABOUT AMERICAN MERCHANT SHIPS?

Has the United States a policy regarding its merchant marine? A recent action puts the task of formulating such a policy before a committee that will "investigate." But only on the basis of facts should such a policy be formulated. The Shipping Board, thru its Bureau of Research, has for several years been collecting information never before available, in the hope of supplying these facts. But the American public knows little of these facts, and consequently thinks little about the matter.

In the hope of stimulating the interest of Minnesota students, and perhaps of beginning the spread of both interest and information elsewhere in the country, the director of the Bureau of Research, Mr. J. E. Saugstad has been invited to address the Summer Session on Wednesday afternoon, July 21, in the Music Auditorium at 4:30. Mr. Saugstad will not plan to give out all the information available, nor in any way to make the hour a course in statistics. But he will hope to present the general situation, in the light of facts, and especially to demonstrate the really vital importance of the whole question of whether the United States has any part in the ocean transportation of the world's goods.

SIR WILLIAM OSLER'S LIFE AND LETTERS

Older members of the Summer Session may recall the sensation created some years ago when Sir William Osler (he was not a Sir then) uttered a statement which was garbled, in the popular prints, into a pronouncement that all men might just as well be killed at the age of forty, for they were not very productive after that. This was, of course, not what he said; for he was one of the leaders in medical science in this country. His Life and Letters has recently been published, and has attracted much attention within and without the medical profession.

It is most appropriate, as well as a bit novel, that we should have this work reviewed by a physician. Dr. Margaret Warwick, pathologist on the University faculty, will present the review on Tuesday afternoon at 4:30 in the Music Auditorium. It should command a large attendance.

NOTICE TO INSTRUCTIONAL STAFF

Copies of a tentative list of candidates for degrees at the close of the present term of the Summer Session have been sent to the office of the head of each department where they may be obtained by members of the teaching staff.

On account of the shortness of the session no early examinations will be required and final reports on candidates may be included with reports for other students at the close of the session.

In certain colleges, however, regulations have been adopted providing for exemption from final examinations in the case of candidates in their final quarter of work. These rules apply for the Summer Session in the same way as in any other quarter. In such colleges, candidates who have failed to meet the conditions for exemption from final examinations are indicated on the tentative list.

The last hour of each class is to constitute the examination hour. Salary checks will be ready for issue Saturday morning, July 31, and will be issued when grades are turned in. The offices of the Registrar and the Bursar will be open until 5 o'clock on that date.

IMPORTANT NOTICE TO CANDIDATES FOR DEGREES

Special attention is called to the following revised procedure for commencement and conferring of degrees adopted to obviate early examinations in the brief Summer Session.

The list of candidates appearing on the commencement program will contain only the names of those who two weeks prior to the date of commencement were conditionally certified by their respective college faculties and whose standing at that time was such as to afford reasonable assurance that all curriculum requirements would be met by the close of the first term of the Summer Session.

This list as published does not constitute evidence of graduation.

Candidates whose names appear on this list will be notified thru the University Post-Office and must attend the commencement exercises July 29 unless excused by the dean of their college and the president.

The card contained in the diploma folder presented at the exercises must be filled out and returned to the Registrar's office.

All candidates will be expected to complete the work for the term, including the final examinations, with other members of their classes at the regular scheduled time.

When the candidate's record in this office is complete his name will be certified to the Board of Regents and after the degree is conferred the diploma will be sent by registered mail to the address given on the diploma slip.

Students whose names do not appear on the commencement program but who complete all requirements for graduation at the close of the term, will have their degree conferred and will receive their diplomas in the same manner as described above. Such students, however, are not required to attend commencement exercises as a prerequisite to the receipt of the diploma.

Those who find it necessary to have evidence of graduation pending receipt of the diploma can obtain certified statements of graduation from this office.
