DEBATE BOARD NAMES DATES

Hamilton Club Entries Close Nov. 5—Central League Entries Received Till Saturday

The first meeting of the Debating Board for this year was held last Friday.

The matter of the Hamilton Club Contest was discussed, and it was decided that this year Sophomores, Juniors and Seniors shall be eligible, although in the future it will undoubtedly be restricted to Juniors and Seniors. Owing to the short time left, the contestants will be excused from a trial on delivery, the judgment being given largely on thought and composition.

All orations for the Hamilton Club Contest must be handed in before November 5, accompanied by author's name and nom de plume.

Men entering the trials for positions on either the Central League or Minnesota-Iowa debating teams must hand in their names and the name of the team for which they intend to try before Saturday, Sept. 24. This is due to the fact that in case the number is small, there will be but one contest, October 23; but if otherwise, a preliminary will be held on October 21.

SPEAKERS FORM FORENSIC FRAT.

Debating and Oratorical Champions Have Organized—League May Spread to Other Colleges

The forensic Honor League is the name of the new organization of debaters and orators, made the last of the college year '03-'04.

The officers of the League are: R. P. Chase, President; Benjamin Drake vice president; J. P. De Vane, secretary, and Philip Carlson, treasurer.

The first meeting was held last May in the Commercial Club rooms where they were tendered a banquet by Mr. J. E. Myers, district agent of the Aetna Life Ins. Co.

Membership in this league is limited to those who have won honors in intercollegiate debates and oratory and has for its object, the promoting of interests in debate, and the upholding of good citizenship and clean politics. A distinctive badge to cost not less than \$10 is to be worn by each member.

It is thought that in time, an endeavor will be made to have the league an inter-collegiate affair, so that there may be an extended league of prominent men who have won fame in their college days in public debating and oratory.

FENCING CLUB TO ORGANIZE

Contest Will be Held to Settle Foil Championship of the University

The Fencing club will soon be organized and an intra-university tournament for the foil championship held. It is also possible that some inter-collegiate contests may be secured.

Juniors Election Today Will Be Contest Between Academics and Engineers

Though staggering under the effects of Vice-president Maynard's announcement of a Junior election to be held this morning at the third hour, in Professor Frankforter's lecture room, the academics held a caucus yesterday afternoon and laid their political plans to offset those of the engineers.

C. T. Christianson was put up as the academic candidate for the presidency and all agreed to stand by him.

Adolph Peterson was nominated for treasurer, Genevieve Jackson, secretary, and John Gleason, sergeant-at-arms.

Paul Spooner was mentioned for the vice-presidency, but he refused the nomination. After much discussion it was decided to leave the office open to the engineers. Someone asked what would be done if the engineers in turn left the office open to the academic, but the suggestion that such a thing would happen was laughed down.

The caucus was well attended and those present pledged themselves to stand by the nominees of the meeting.

By the holding of the caucus a direct defiance was made manifest to the engineers and the short but hot campaign placed entirely on a department basis.

The engineers held a preliminary caucus yesterday, with the result that Charles Batson is one of the engineering candidates for the office of president.

The engineers have marshalled their forces for a strenuous battle at the meeting today. Both sides seem confident of victory and it is only a matter of which department can bring the most votes to the polls.

The engineers will caucus just before the meeting. Lang is said to be running a close race with Batson for the nomination.

Dr. Samuel G. Smith, professor of sociology, was elected president of the national conference of charities and correction at the meeting of that conference June 20th.

BUCK HAS A PLAN.

A Scheme That Would Eliminate all Trouble in Disposal of Football Tickets.

His plan is to have a complete diagram of the grand stand and bleachers published in the city papers, showing which sections have been reserved for rooters, those held for complimentary, and those to which the general public will have access, also the time and place those seats will be disposed of.

Mr. Buck has been connected with this branch of football for several years and understands very well where the trouble lies. He says that the disposal of tickets has been considered none of the public's business too long but that the outside people are just the ones who should be posted.

You can't stop to tell a man at the ticket window why it is that he can't

have the front row in the grand stand or you can't explain the justice of holding the choice seats as complimentary.

If the matter were published several days before a big game in the daily papers, the public would see that the management is looking out for their interests, that "comps" are only given to those who are capable of great influence for or against the university, and that graft doesn't count so much after all.
