CANDIDATES ANNOUNCED FOR 1913 PUBLICATION

Aspirants For Next Year's Gopher Board Hand Names To Student's Council.

Five names have been handed in to the Student Council announcing candidates for next year's Gopher Board.

Will Hodson has declared his intention of running for managing editor. His is the only name so far for that position. There will be two academic representatives, one girl and one man on the Board. Martica Byrnes, Bernard Vaughan, and William Anderson, have handed in their names for these positions.

Henry Matchett is to run for representative from the mining, engineering and chemistry colleges.

So far there have been no other names handed in. The constitution reads that the names of all candidates must be handed to the Student's Council three days before the election.

The election will come next Wednesday, May 17.

FRAZER GETS OFFICE

Minnesota Man Elected Vice-President of N. O. L.—Subjects of Orations.

Marc Frazer, who represented Minnesota in the Northern Oratorical League contest at Ann Arbor, Friday night, was elected vice-president of the association. The other new officers are: president, Mr. Gutknecht, Michigan; secretary, J. L. Chestnut, Northwestern; treasurer, J. C. Searle, Illinois. The contest will be held at Northwestern, May 5, next year.

Northwestern carried off the first honors, Mr. Chestnut winning the Lowden prize of one hundred dollars. Wisconsin received second place, and the third prize was taken by Illinois. Mr. Frazer received fourth place.

Orators from seven colleges were entered for the contest, but although it was the biggest forensic meet of the year in the middle west an audience of only two hundred persons heard the speakers.

The following orations were given: "Politics and the College Man," Gutknecht, Michigan; "The Riddle of American Liberty," Chestnut, Northwestern; "International Peace," Walton, Oberlin; "Industrial Diseases," Merk, Wisconsin; "The Thinker Unafraid," Campbell, Iowa; "Insurgency," Searle, Illinois; "Ethics of Industrial Strife," Frazer, Minnesota.

CONSTITUTION UP FOR RATIFICATION TODAY

New Plan For Minnesota Magazine To Be Voted On By Paid-up Subscribers.

At nine o'clock this morning the proposed Magazine Constitution will be submitted for ratification to the paid-up subscribers. The polls, in the Magazine office, will remain open until 2 p. m. The election is to be conducted by the student's council.

The new constitution purposes to vest the authority of selecting the new board of publishers in the outgoing members. This system has been approved by the faculty press committee, and the present board, as offering the best means or securing an efficient board.

Another innovation that has met with favorable criticism is the proposal of having junior representatives on the board. Since the magazine was first established the publishers have all been members of the senior class but it was felt that the system did not work as well as it might and consequently the present plan is submitted. All members selected by the present board to publish the Magazine next year if the Constitution is adopted, must be approved by the faculty Press Committee of the University Council. The selection will take place in the near future.

MASQUERS PLAY AGAIN

Decided to Give "Merchant of Venice" in St. Paul May 24—Expenses Guaranteed.

At a meeting held yesterday noon, the Masquers decided to give one more performance of "The Merchant of Venice," having been requested to play in St. Paul by a large number of alumni. The one performance will be presented the evening of May 24, and will probably be given at the Shubert Theatre.

The same cast will appear as played at the Princess theatre and a large number of alumni are already planning to attend. H. D. Frankel, president of the St. Paul Alumni association has guaranteed to the management that 600 of his association will attend and that he would take 400 tickets at the start. The St. Paul business people are enthusiastic over the Dramatic club plans, as this performance will be the first ever presented at St. Paul by any Minnesota Dramatic club, according to tentative plans three members of the Board of Regents, who are residing in St. Paul, will probably number among the patrons, as will also Governor Eberhart, should his engagements permit.

Next Wednesday, less than a week from now the Gopher board for next year is to be elected. In the midst of so many things, as we Gopher are, this very important Elections part of our existence has Soon seemed to slip our minds. The new constitution which has been ratified by most of the sophomore classes, provides for the election of seven members to the board. One of these is to be the managing editor and is to be elected at large by all the sophomores in the university. Then there is to be an executive board composed of representatives from the several colleges or groups of colleges. As it would have been too large for practical use if it included a member from each, the colleges have been grouped together under five heads.

This board is to have very important duties, among which is that of sanctioning the managing editors appointments to the staff. The members of the board should be selected very carefully by the sophomores. They will need to be people with both ability and energy if they are to do their work well.

So far there have been very few candidates to announce themselves. The constitution reads that every aspirant must hand his name to the student concil three days before the election. This means that anyone who expects to make the board next year must have his name in very soon. The positions are very important, and there ought to be many candidates out.

(4) Any sum of money left in the treasury after the above-mentioned officers have been paid shall be distributed among the unsalaried members of the staff in proportion to the amount of work done by each, this sum being determined by the managing editor with the approval of the board of managers.

ARTICLE X.
Amendments.
This constitution may be amended by a majority vote of those present at an election which called for such purpose whenever a petition of not less than fifty members of the association is presented to the Students Council who shall set the date and conduct the election.

ARTICLE XI.
This constitution becomes operative when approved by a majority vote of the members of the association.

CONSTITUTION OF 1913 GOPHER.

We, the students of the pre-junior class of the University of Minnesota, acting through the several class organizations of our respective colleges, hereby associate ourselves for the purpose of publishing a college year-book and do ordain and establish the following constitution.

ARTICLE ONE.
Name and Object.
1. This organization shall be known as the Gopher Association of the University of Minnesota.

2. The object of this association shall be the editing and publishing of a college annual or year-book by the junior class at the University of Minnesota.

ARTICLE II.
Name of the Publication.
The name of the annual published by this association shall be "The Gopher", an Annual Published by the Junior class of the University of Minnesota.

ARTICLE III.
Membership.
All students of the University of Minnesota, who at the time of the collection are enrolled as members of the Sophomore class of a college maintaining a four-year course of study, or as members of the freshman class of a college maintaining a three-year course of study as members of the class or second-year in colleges maintaining a five-year or a six-year course of study, shall be members of this association.

ARTICLE IV.
Management.
Sec. 1. The management of this association shall be vested in a body of persons called "The Gopher Board of Managers".
Sec. 2. It shall be made up as follows:
(a.) A managing editor who shall be chairman of the board, and who shall be elected at large from and by the members of the association.
(b.) Two members of the association elected from and by the academic college, one woman and one man.
(c.) One member elected from and by the colleges of Engineering, Mines and Chemistry, acting jointly.
(d.) One member elected by and from the college of Law.
(e.) One member elected by and from the colleges of Medicine and Dentistry, acting jointly.
(f.) One member elected by and from the colleges of Agriculture and Forestry, acting jointly.

ARTICLE V.
Elections.
Sec. (1) All elections shall be under control of the Students' Council which shall each year set the date and conduct the election.
Sec. (2) All members of this association shall be qualified elections.
Sec. (3) The managing editor shall be elected from the association at large.
Sec. (4) The members of the board of managers shall be elected from and by the members of the colleges or groups of colleges as provided for in article IV, Sec. 2.
Sec. (5) Candidates, at least one week before election, must hand their names to the President of the Students Council, who shall publish the names of qualified candidates in at least three issues of the Minnesota Daily prior to the day of election.

ARTICLE VI.
The duties of the board of Managers.
The board of managers shall have the

power:
(a) to pass on all contracts.
(b) to approve all appointments to the staff.
(c) to appoint a business manager and such assistants as may be advisable.
(d) to determine the rates of advertising.
(e) to audit and approve the accounts of the business manager preliminary to the official auditing by the finance committee.
(f) to authorize all expenditures of money.
(g) to decide the price at which the Gopher is to be sold.
(h) to have general supervision over the business management of the Gopher.

ARTICLE VII.
The Gopher Staff.
Sec. (1) There shall be a Gopher staff which shall have charge of the editing of the Gopher.

Sec. (2) The staff shall consist of:
a. An editor in chief who shall be chairman of the staff.
b. A chief artist.
c. A secretary.
d. An album editor.
e. A feature editor.
f. A sporting editor.
g. An organization editor.
h. such other associates as shall be necessary.
Sec. (3) The staff shall not exceed twelve people, at least four of whom shall be women. Members of the board shall be eligible for the staff.
Sec. (4) The managing editor shall appoint the Gopher staff subject to the approval of the Board of managers, the appointments to be based upon a competitive test, the nature of which shall be determined by the Board of Managers.
Sec. (5) The staff shall be responsible to the Managing editor who may remove any member from office with the approval of the board of managers.

ARTICLE VIII.
Sec. (1) The managing editor shall be responsible to the association through the board of managers for the publication of the Gopher and shall have all necessary powers to do this except as herein limited. Sec. (2) The editor of the Gopher and shall have all the duties of the business manager shall be strictly the accredited business agent of the board. He shall be appointed solely because of his business capacity and experience.
Sec. (3) The duties of the members of the staff shall be assigned to each member by the managing editor.

Sec. (1) Compensation shall be given to the managing editor and the following members of the staff:
a. The managing editor shall be given a salary not to exceed \$300.
b. The editor in chief shall be given a salary not to exceed \$100.
c. The business manager shall be given a salary not to exceed \$200.
d. The chief artist shall be given a salary not to exceed \$100.
Sec. (2) The board of managers shall determine what percentage of their maximum salary each of the above members is to receive. The amount decided upon in each case is to be determined by the amount of work done by that member.
Sec. (3) If \$600 is not cleared over the expenses of the Gopher, the board of managers shall decide in what ratio it shall be divided among the salaried above named.

Doerman's injuries, received in a collision before the Hamline game, kept him out of the play at St. Thomas and it is very doubtful if he will be able to get back for the Iowa games Friday and Saturday. In the meantime Smith has been shifted to short, Anderson to second, Johnston behind the plate and Flynn sent to the outfield. If Doerman is unable to get back for the Iowa games the lineup used at St. Thomas will probably be used.

Hessian is learning the initial sack and should develop into a rattling good first-sacker. His work in both the Hamline and St. Thomas games was of high class. Besides fielding well, "Quasi" is hitting them far and often.

One of the most encouraging things about the last two games is the way that Hartnett and Knox are hitting again. With these clouters back in their stride the team shows up much stronger.

Sutton showed his nerve in the eighth and ninth innings at St. Thomas. The rooting was deafening but the little chucker smiled and stayed right on the job. It started after the first man had gotten away from him and lasted all the way through both innings.

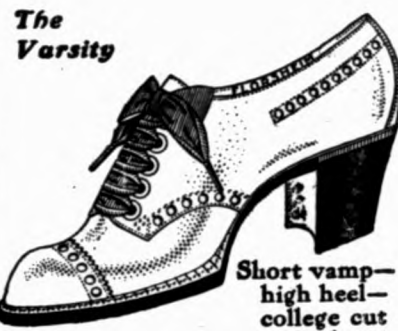

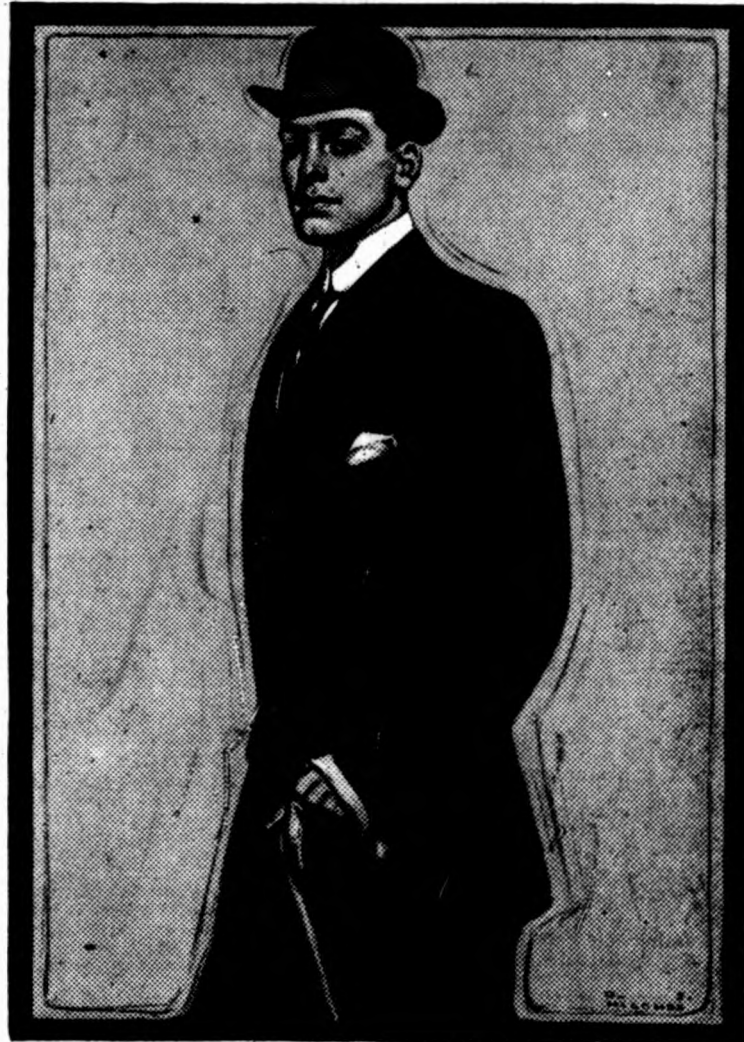
