On Wednesday, February 11, a Charter Day Convocation will be held at the Armory at 11:30 a.m. Dr. George E. Vincent, President of the Rockefeller Foundation, and former President of this University, will deliver the address. His subject will be "The University and Public Health." All members of the University will be expected to attend this convocation.

HEALTH BULLETIN

Four new cases of influenza at the University were reported to the Health Service on February 5th. This is less than were reported yesterday. Five new cases were reported at the Farm—an increase of one over the previous day.

Reports from the City Health Department show that the epidemic is declining in Minneapolis.

Present indications show that the "ban" on social gatherings on both campuses will be removed Monday, February 9th.

Notwithstanding these favorable reports, students are urged to continue precautions. Going to bed at the first appearance of symptoms, then reporting their condition to a physician make up nine-tenths of successful treatment.

Prophylactic inoculations are given daily at the University Health Service from 1 to 4 p.m.

CONDITION EXAMINATIONS

COLLEGE OF ENGINEERING AND ARCHITECTURE

At a meeting of the Faculty of this College held on January 29th the following action was taken concerning condition examinations.

All conditions in subjects offered by the College of Engineering and Architecture, which appear on the record of any student on this date, must be removed by condition examinations to be held Saturday afternoon, March 6th, and Saturday afternoon, March 13th, unless there is at the present time an agreement for the removal of the condition at an earlier date. Conditions not removed on these dates will automatically become failures and must be repeated in class. This does not apply to courses given by other Colleges of the University. Each student will be held responsible for having correct information regarding his individual record.

One week prior to the examinations, each student must notify the Dean's office in writing of his intention to take a condition examination and must state the particular course or courses for which he wishes an examination.

THE ATTENTION of students in the College of Education is called to the \$50 Pi Lambda Theta prize which is offered this year for the first time. The conditions upon which the prize will be granted are as follows:

1. It shall be open to any student enrolled in the College of Education.

2. The basis for decision shall be scholarship and a written paper, each of which shall be of equal value. The paper may be presented by the student himself or by some member of the faculty, and may be a written term paper, a magazine contribution, or an essay written expressly for this purpose. It shall be judged on the ability shown by the student in the consideration of the topic, on its originality, its style, and on the value of the contribution from a professional standpoint.

3. The papers shall be judged by a Committee consisting of the Dean of the College of Education, two members of the faculty and two members from the sorority, one representing the active membership and one the alumnae.

Names of candidates for the prize must be filed with the Dean of the College of Education on or before March 8, and copies of papers which they propose to submit must be filed on or before April 8th.
