Minnesota Bankers Association Makes Plans for 1953 Scholarships

Mr. Charles W. Wilkins, President of the First National Bank of Austin, and Mr. Floyd W. Larson, Executive Secretary of the Minnesota Bankers Association of Minneapolis were on the St. Paul Campus on Monday, November 17, 1952 to review last year's scholarship project and to lay plans for 1953. These two men were guests of Dr. J. O. Christianson on his Monday noon radio program, "The Friendly Road" over KUOM.

Plans are now being formulated to have scholarship applications sent to Mr. Floyd Larson from high school seniors and graduates by or before April 1, 1953. Announcement of the students selected for these \$400 scholarships to attend the School of Agriculture at University Farm, St. Paul, can then be made at the time of high school graduation.

Any high school graduate (girl or boy) in Minnesota who anticipates attending the School of Agriculture next fall and who wishes to apply for a Bankers Scholarship should see the local banker at once for an application, or write directly to Mr. Floyd W. Larson, Executive Secretary, Minnesota Bankers Association, 925 Rand Tower, Minneapolis 2, Minnesota.

In 1952 there were 35 counties in Minnesota represented by one or more Bankers Scholarships. Mr. Wilkins, Chairman of the scholarship committee of the Minnesota Bankers Association says that, "We aim to have scholarship students from every section of Minnesota in 1953. The bankers plan to develop scholarships in proportion to the demand as indicated by the number of applications during the next few months."

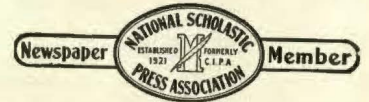
