### LAST SUMMER SESSION LECTURE

#### Principal Hargreaves to Discuss Vital Theme

The Summer Session series of lectures will close on Tuesday afternoon with a talk by Principal Richard T. Hargreaves, of the Minneapolis Central High School. Mr. Hargreaves has taken as his subject, "Secondary Education and Democracy." It cannot be denied that this is a timely and important topic. It may to some sound like a purely theoretical matter; but to a man of the experience which Mr. Hargreaves has had in training the boys and girls of high school age, and to those who have any notion of what is happening in the lives of our adolescent population, it represents a very definite and concrete problem. The solution of it, in reorganized school programs and perhaps on methods of instruction, is not in sight. All able discussions will help toward its accomplishment.

The lecture will be in the Little Theater at three o'clock, and is open to the public.
