HUMAN BEHAVIOR CONTROL DIALOGUE BEGINS TODAY

Dr. B. F. Skinner and Dr. Carl Rogers, two of America's most distinguished psychologists, today open a two-day dialogue on human behavior control at UMD.

The informal meeting of ideas, entitled: "Education and the Control of Human Behavior: A Dialogue" is being sponsored by UMD's Department of Psychology.

Seven-hundred persons—psychologists, counselors, educators and sociologists—are expected to attend the conference.

Internationally recognized for their research into the control of human behavior, the two psychologists disagree on how such knowledge should be used.

Dr. Skinner, professor of psychology at Harvard University, has relied primarily upon his research in the experimentally controlled studies of animal and human learning.

Dr. Rogers, professor of psychology and psychiatry at the University of Wisconsin, uses his experience and research as a psychologist to reach his conclusions for the most part.

The conference begins at 2 p.m. today in Kirby Student Center ballroom when Skinner and Rogers outline their basic thoughts on behavior control. An informal exchange of ideas will follow.

At 7:30 p.m. today six representatives from humanities, social sciences and natural sciences will give reactions to the day's dialogue.

At 9 a.m. tomorrow, Skinner and Rogers will continue their exchange of ideas then answer questions from the audience.

Dr. G. A. Gladstein, associate professor of psychology and chairman of the program, said both psychologists will make closing statements at 11:45 a.m.

All sessions are open at no cost but you are asked to pre-register for the conference at a desk which will be set up in the Physical Education Building during the normal UMD registration period.

ENGLISH M.A. DEGREE APPROVED FOR UMD

The offering of a Plan B Master of Arts degree in English at UMD has been approved by the Graduate School of the University of Minnesota.

Academic Dean Thomas W. Chamberlin said the new M.A. program is intended primarily for teachers. Any student entering the program who does not have a teaching certificate must complete certification before graduation.

Areas of study for the new degree are: American Literature; the Romantic Period and Shakespeare; 16th, 17th, 18th and 19th Century Literature; and Secondary English Teaching.

Some of the courses are being offered during Summer Session with a full slate in the new program to begin in the fall.

UMD LIBRARY HOURS

The UMD library summer hours have been increased by seven hours a week over last year, according to Librarian Rudy Johnson.

Library hours between June 11-August 17 are: Monday thru Thursday, 8 a.m. to 10 p.m.; Friday, 8 a.m. to 5 p.m.; Saturday, 10 a.m. to 2 p.m.; Sunday, 5 p.m. to 9 p.m.

The exceptions are: June 11, July 3 and July 16, 8 a.m. to 5 p.m.; July 4 and July 14-15, closed.

The hours change to 9 a.m. to 4 p.m., Monday thru Friday, between August 18-September 21.

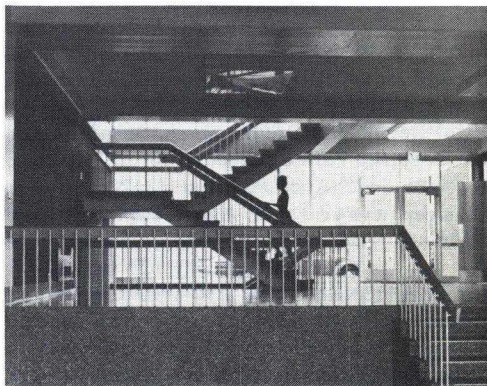
The Teaching Materials Library and the Laboratory School Library will be open Monday thru Friday, 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. during the summer months.

THREE NEW UMD FACILITIES

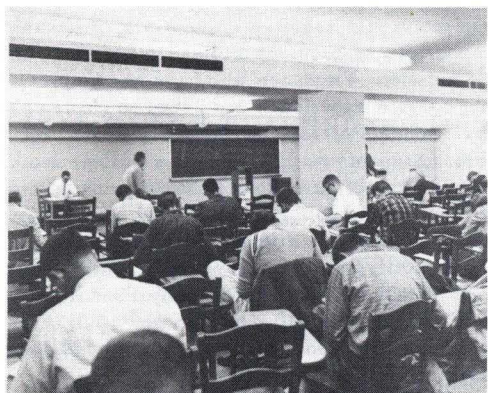

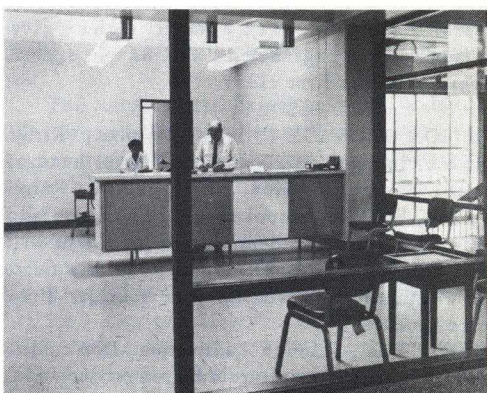
The main entrance to the \$850,000 Education building is just a few steps from Tweed Gallery and directly across from the Physical Education building. ADMISSION TO SUBSEQUENT QUARTERS. Students in attendance at UMD for the first time during the current Summer Session who wish to be considered for admission to a subsequent term must file required credentials, including transcripts of previous college work, early in the summer. Freshmen who have had no previous college experience are asked to contact Mrs. Donna Peterson in Admissions and Records. Students with previous college work should contact Mrs. Mona Johnson in the same office. Former Duluth State Teachers College students need not file application blanks but should notify Rm. 130 Kirby of their intentions.
THE ENGLISH PROFICIENCY Examination will be given at 3:30 p.m. Friday, July 6 at locations to be announced by the four academic division offices.

Students who intend to take the exam must announce their intention and submit a list of the four subjects from which they wish their examination subject to be chosen. Such a list must be turned in no later than Friday, June 15, at the department office.
