Making the Most of Your Sophomore Year: A Workshop for Honors Students

The second year of college can be a time of uncertainty as well as excitement. You may be rethinking the goals you brought with you to college or looking for new challenges. You may be wondering what to major in, what you'll do after you graduate, or what you should be doing now to lay the groundwork for your future. Or you may just be looking for ways to have a more satisfying college experience. In this 90 minute workshop you will: take stock of what you've discovered about yourself so far; learn how to get started exploring major, career, and postgraduate options; brainstorm about experiences you might want to integrate into your college years, such as study abroad, community service, political activism, or internships; and set some practical goals to keep you moving forward through your sophomore year. Class Notes...

- Seniors—If you have 136 completed credits or so, its time to make a Senior Balance Sheet appointment with Kit Gordon. This appointment will clarify your progress on graduation requirements and help you plan for that final push towards life after CLA. Ideally, these appointments should be scheduled at least a couple of quarters prior to graduation.
- Juniors—If you have completed at least 76 credits and have not already done so, it is time for you to apply for Upper Division status in Honors. The reapplication is necessary for the major department to examine your past work and make a decision about admitting you for Honors work in the major. If you are still undecided with respect to a major, a meeting with an academic advisor can help you with the process of major selection. Visit the Honors Office to begin the process or set up an appointment.
- Sophomores—The Freshman-Sophomore Honors Certificates for the 1996-97 school year were awarded during our annual file review this summer. Those who successfully completed the Freshman-Sophomore Honors Program should have received a letter in the mail congratulating them on their achievement. Eligibility is based on the following: Four Honors Opportunities completed in the first 90 credits and grades of A in at least 50% of the credits completed. If you think you are eligible for an award, but have not received a letter, check with the Honors Office. Congratulations to all recipients. Keep up the good work!

The Student Project for Amity Among Nations (SPAN) will sponsor sites in Jordan, France, Ghana, and New Zealand in the summer of 1998. Independent study in Jordan will be directed by Abdalla Battah, assistant professor of political science. Students selected for the program will assist in choosing a research topic that is appropriate to their degree program. Jordan offers a wide range of research topics in all disciplines: resource management, mass media, refugees. democratization, underdevelopment, religious revivalism, archaeology, architecture, health system, feminism, Arabic, Islam, minorities, and the Arab-Israeli conflict. Close proximity and easy access to Syria, Israel, and the West Bank make Jordan ideal for those who are interested in studying issues of regional scope. This experiential learning program will be an important opportunity for enhancing students' cultural diversity and global awareness.

Over the last 50 years, SPAN's illustrious alumni have included L. Bruce Laingen, Saul Bellow, Jay W. Gildner, Joan Mondale, Diana E. Murphy, Russell Prickett, John D. Undergraduate Research Opportunity Program and the National Conference on Undergraduate Research

The next UROP grant application deadline is October 27 for projects to be done winter and spring quarters 1998. Grants are available for working as an assistant on a faculty member's research or creative project or on a project of the student's own design, under a faculty member's sponsorship. Application materials are available in 429 Johnston and 345 Fraser.

Students who have completed UROP or other research/creative projects sponsored by the University of Minnesota by the end of fall quarter may apply to present their projects at the National Conference on Undergraduate Research (NCUR). The 1998 NCUR will be at Salisbury State University in Maryland next April. At NCUR undergraduates from throughout the United States present research projects in all academic disciplines and attend presentations by nationally-known scholars. The University of Minnesota sends about 50 students to NCUR each year, expenses paid.

The NCUR application deadline is November 3. Application materials will be available in early October.

The National Science Foundation announces opportunities for three-year Graduate Fellowships and Minority Graduate Fellowships for qualified students in science, mathematics, or engineering seeking advanced degrees in science and engineering. Prospective fellowship applicants may request application materials from the Graduate School Fellowship Office, 321 Johnston Hall, or via e-mail at nsfgrfp@orau.gov. Deadline for entering the competition is November 6, 1997. Women, minorities, and persons with disabilities are strongly encouraged to apply.

Hughes Fellowship Program—Eighty Fellowships will be awarded for full-time study toward a Ph.D. or Sc.D. degree listed in selected biological sciences. These awards are for three years of study providing an annual stipend of \$15,000 and a \$15,000 annual cost-of-education allowance with a possibility for two additional years. Students with less than one year of graduate study completed toward M.S., Ph.D., or Sc.D. in biological sciences are eligible to apply. National Scholarships 1997-98 Competitions

The following national scholarships and fellowships offer support for outstanding students to pursue undergraduate and/ or graduate studies in the U.S. and abroad. Most of these programs provide full tuition and fees; some cover travel costs and provide an additional stipend. Students are encouraged to get information and application materials from the campus contact persons listed for particular awards well in advance of the anticipated application deadlines.

Churchill Scholarships: For one year of post-baccalaureate study in engineering, math, or science at Churchill College, Cambridge University, England. Applicants must be U.S. citizens, 19-26 years old and hold a bachelor's degree from a participating college or university by the beginning of the award. Approximately 10 scholarships are given nationwide. Campus contact: I.T. Honors Program. Expected U of M Application Deadline: mid-November.

Luce Scholarships: For one-year internships in Asia. Applicants must be U.S. citizens, not more than 29 years old and hold bachelor's degree at the beginning of the award. Not intended for students whose academic concentration is in any aspect of Asian studies, or who have previous experience living in Asia. 18 scholarships are given nationwide. Andrew W. Mellon Fellowships in Humanistic Studies: For one year of graduate study at most U.S. and Canadian universities for students preparing for careers in college teaching and scholarship in humanistic fields of study (but not the creative and performing arts). Applicants must be citizens or permanent residents of U.S. or Canada and college seniors or recent graduates who have not yet began graduate study. Further info at http://www.woodrow.org/mellon. Ford Foundation Predoctoral Fellowships for Minorities: Supports U.S. citizens from a number of minority groups who are beginning graduate study in a research-based Ph.D. or Sc.D. program in many disciplines. In Memoriam

Judy Burton, who worked as principal secretary in CLA Honors for the past twenty years, died peacefully on June 25, 1997. She was fifty-six years old. Judy held a B.A. degree with honors in Comparative Literature from the University of California-Berkeley. She lived with renal disease for the last fourteen years of her life and volunteered her services as a counselor to people who were adjusting to kidney dialysis. An active member of AFSCME Council 6, Judy had been a leader in efforts to unionize the University of Minnesota's clerical employees since the early 1980s. Many of us will long remember Judy for her exemplary service to the College and its students and employees, and for her personal friendship. Shortly before her death, Judy endowed a scholarship fund for Honors students. The Judy Burton Scholarship will be announced, along with other CLA scholarship competitions, by the beginning of Winter quarter.

George Bush School of Government & Public Service

The George Bush School of Government and Public Service, a part of the new George Bush Presidential Library complex on the campus of Texas A&M University, offers a two-year, masters-level professional education for those seeking to lead and manage organizations serving the public interest.

The Bush School's Master of Public Service and Administration degree program emphasizes the knowledge and skills necessary for effective public service. A summer internship gives students valuable experience as well as important networking contacts, while leadership workshops and exercises develop specific skills vital to success.

The Bush School has endowed funds for fellowship support of exceptional students. From among those applying each year a number of Bush Fellows are selected who receive a generous stipend that is renewed for the second year based on satisfactory performance. The admissions and fellowship criteria are 1) demonstrated academic ability, 2) commitment to public service, and 3) evidence of leadership potential. The degree program is a full-time course of study that admits students for the fall semester only.

National Science Foundation (NSF) Graduate Fellowships and Minority Graduate Fellowships: For three years of graduate study at a U.S. or foreign institution leading to master's or doctoral degree in mathematical, physical, biological, engineering, and social sciences, history or philosophy of science, or for work towards a research-based Ph.D. in science education. Applicants must be U.S. citizens or nationals at or near the beginning of graduate study. Approximately 750 are given nationally. Campus contact: Alison Skoberg. Graduate School Fellowship Office. Application deadline: November 12, 1997.

James Madison Fellowships: For two years of graduate study at any accredited institution of higher education in the U.S. with a master's degree program offering courses or training that emphasize the origins, principles, and development of the U.S. Constitution and its comparison with the secondary school teaching of American history, American government, and social studies. Approximately 24 fellowships to graduating collegians and recent college graduates nationwide. Information available in the CLA Honors office and at http://www.jamesmadison.com. The following scholarship programs are for undergraduates. Students with AP, Special Exam, or PSEOA credits should note that sophomore or junior status can be defined either in terms of college credits completed or in terms of years remaining to complete an undergraduate degree. Harry S. Truman Scholarships: For undergraduate study and graduate study leading to a career in government or elsewhere in public service. Applicants must be U.S. citizens or nationals; currently enrolled juniors in the upper quarter of their class; should have a strong record of public and community service. Truman Scholars receive up to \$3,000 for the senior year, up to \$27,000 for graduate studies. Approximately 80 scholarships nationwide; at least one award given to a state of Minnesota resident. Barry M. Goldwater Scholarships: For undergraduate study leading to a graduate degree and a research-based (rather than applications-based) career in mathematics, the natural sciences, or an eligible engineering discipline. Applicants must be U.S. citizens and must be currently enrolled sophomores or juniors in the upper quarter of their class with at least a 3.0 GPA and research experience. Award covers all college fees to a maximum of \$7,500 for up to two years. Approximately 300 given nationwide; at least two awards given to state of Minnesota residents. - Seniors—If you have 136 completed credits or so, its time to make a Senior Balance Sheet appointment with Kit Gordon. This appointment will clarify your progress on graduation requirements and help you plan for that final push towards life after CLA. Ideally, these appointments should be scheduled at least a couple of quarters prior to graduation.
- Juniors—If you have completed at least 76 credits and have not already done so, it is time for you to apply for the Junior/ Senior Honors Program. The reapplication is necessary for the major department to examine your past work and make a decision about admitting you for Honors work in the major. If you are still undecided about your major, a meeting with an academic advisor can help you with the process of major selection. Visit the Honors Office to begin the process or set up an appointment. If you want to know more about the Junior-Senior Honors Program in your major, visit the Honors Web Site. All of the departmental requirements are listed along with the college guidelines for graduation with honors.
- * Sophomores—Now is the time to start thinking seriously about your major. Begin conversations with faculty during their office hours or via e-mail. Attend a workshop on majors that interest you or visit with an honors advisor to help you sort through some of your choices. Now is also a good time to start thinking about professors who might be willing to write letters of recommendation in the future. You'll need these maybe as early as Winter Quarter.
- Freshmen—Phone calls have gone out reminding you to schedule an appointment with your Honors Peer Advisor. In this appointment we'll check up on current classes and discuss your winter schedule. Remember you must schedule an appointment prior to registration. You will not be able to register without it. Call 624-5522.

Literature and Theatre in London introduces students to London's literary and cultural history through theatre productions, guest speakers, field trips in London and excursions to other parts of England. U-Migrant Experience in Minnesota

Topics in Chicana/o Studies 5920, Tuesdays 4-7pm, 4 credits

Fifteen to 20,000 migrant farmworkers come to harvest Minnesota's crops yearly.—This interdisciplinary course taught by Visiting Associate Professor, Guadalupe Luna is about their work and lives. From primarily a legal perspective, students will examine the working conditions and socio-economic reality of migrant farmworkers in Minnesota. Topics studied will include a range of disciplines: history, public policy, education, public health, law, and agricultural economics. In light of the changing socio-economic scenario of rural MN which includes a growing Latina/o population, this course has relevance on the impact of new technologies and new welfare and immigration laws. Alternative strategies to address systemic inequalities will be explored.

The U-Migrant Project Internship Program, a related opportunity involves an intensive work and/or research experience in the summer with migrant-serving agencies. Students enrolled in the Winter course can apply for this 4 credit program. (10-15 applicants will be selected. Paid internships are available as well as research and internship grants. Selections are made by February 15.

Fund for American Studies—sponsors two programs with the Engalitcheff Institute: The Bryce Harlow Institute on Business and Government Affairs and the Institute of Political Journalism. Class Notes...

- Seniors—If you have 136 completed credits or so, its time to make a Senior Balance Sheet appointment with Kit Gordon. This appointment will clarify your progress on graduation requirements and help you plan for that final push towards life after CLA. Ideally, these appointments should be scheduled at least a couple of quarters prior to graduation.
- * Juniors—If you have completed at least 76 credits and have not already done so, it is time for you to apply for the Junior/ Senior Honors Program. The reapplication is necessary for the major department to examine your past work and make a decision about admitting you for Honors work in the major. If you are still undecided about your major, a meeting with an academic advisor can help you with the process of major selection. CLA Thesis Grant Helps Zoua Vang Tell the Story of Hmong Immigrants

After journalism and history student Zoua Vang graduated from her California high school, she landed a co-hosting job on Hmong Today. She filled the hour-long slot with ad-libbed readings of the daily news and discussion of Hmong community issues. She wondered if anyone would watch her, but the numerous phone calls she received from

'You seem to know everything, Zoua. I was wondering, do you know when the world is going to end?'

Hmong viewers quickly revealed she had a strong following. Vang remembers the one particular call that gave her a purpose for what she was doing.

"An elderly man called me on the phone," she said. "He very earnestly said, 'You seem to know everything, Zoua. I was wondering, do you know when the world is going to end?"

Amazed that someone could expect such knowledge of her, and also amazed by her audience following, Vang began to see firsthand not only the power and influence of the media but also the marginalization of a group which was isolated as a result of language and cultural barriers.

This understanding has influenced Vang's direction as she drives towards graduation in spring 1999. It has framed her thesis project, "From Refugees to Americans: The Hmong Experience," a television documentary focusing specifically on the challenges middle-aged and elderly Hmong face with the transition to American culture.

"I want to help people see that it is not easy," she said. "Hopefully it will create an understanding about the Hmong people."

Vang is using a documentary format because she feels that television media will better reach the "common man." Her hope is to have the documentary broadcast on a local community network.

Vang's work is supported by a Senior Honors Thesis-Project Grant. The Grant, which is awarded by the Honors Division to support exceptional research proposals, will help purchase blank videotapes, the CIA and WCCO-TV footage tapes she plans to incorporate in the documentary, and possibly a research trip to Wisconsin.

Vang's preparation for this project ranges from attendance at Hmong community discussion groups to a mentorship with Don Shelby at WCCO-TV. She encourages other students to build on their skills and interests when developing their thesis proposals.

"Find something that you feel passionate about," she said. "But it takes a lot of preparation and you have to be serious about it."

This will not be Klimoski's first opportunity to study abroad. He spent two months this past summer studying architecture and architectural history in Rome where he got a taste of southern Europe and left with thousands of new images and ideas to incorporate into the creation of his work. He said that he did some of his best work on a tower in his third architectural design studio after his return from Europe.

"I was able to incorporate images and ideas from my experiences in combination with descriptions from other students of places I didn't get to visit."

Klimoski is very excited to return to Europe and further expand his experience and knowledge in addition to having the opportunity to study a culture which has long been a fascination and more recently the focus of his minor.

"Architecture combines every aspect of life and study: art, science, and history," Klimoski said. "The more I see and experience, the more I understand. And the more I understand, the richer my designs are."
