VARSAITY vs. W. S. N. S.

The Girl's Team Will Play the Superior Normals Friday. An Open Game

Friday evening of this week the girls' Basket ball team will play their first open game. They will meet the fast little team from West Superior Normal school which gave them such a close rub a week ago. The West Superior team with a small band of rooters will arrive here Friday morning and will spend the day taking in the university. Saturday afternoon the Normal girls will play the Central High school team on our floor.

The University Girls have received a challenge from the Normal team at Milwaukee, who up to the present time are claiming the championship of the northwest. If the challenge is accepted the game will be played here, probably on March 22. The game tomorrow will be followed by informal dancing.

PILLSBURY ORATIONS

The eight orations entered in the Pillsbury Dunwoody contest are in the hands of the judges on thought and composition, Judge Bennett, Dr. Shurtleff, and Prof Webster of the East High School. The work is said to be of a high order from every point of consideration, and indications predict the closest contest in the history of the Pillsbury prize.

There are two orations treating the modern subject of the Boers, two on Joan of Arc, one a justification of war, one upon the dangers of imperialism, one entitled "The Dawn of Peace," and one "An Unrewarded Hero." The names of the orators cannot be identified with their orations until the reports of the judges are received. Prof. Webster of the East High says that the orations this year are, in his judgment, by far the best ever submitted for the Pillsbury contest. The marks on thought and composition will not be made public until after the contest on March 21.

MANDOLIN RECITAL

Mr. Francis H. Robertson, assisted by the University Mandolin club, will give a recital at the Northwestern Conservatory this evening. A considerable number of University students are expected to attend.

THE MARCH "MAG"

The Magazine Shows Marked Improvement. Will be Out Today

The *Minnesota Magazine* for March appears today and it certainly is a very creditable issue.

Irene McKeehan contributes a very pleasing little poem entitled, "Dreamland Way." "A Little Journey to the Home of Hall Caine" is a sketch from personal experience, written by Arthur Upson. It is very well written and gives a vivid idea of Hall Caine as he appears in his home life. "The State's Prison," is a descriptive article by Alvina Seigman and describes the workings of Warden Wolfer's Institution at Stillwater. The author is very well acquainted with the subject and has written an entertaining article.

Two poems by Chester Firkins, entitled "Reprieve" and the "Balm of Years," are exceptionally good and show a fine conception of the art of writing poetry upon the part of the author. The "Barker Twins" and "How Hiram Collins put up the Stove" are the titles of two amusing little sketches which should be well received. A poem entitled "The Fountain Pen" by "S. T." is a very good poetic description of these troublesome articles.

The editorials also show merit and the *Book Reviews* are on the whole well written although one entitled "Lazarre" might have been improved upon without hurting the general character of the magazine. The exchanges are varied in number and have been for the most part well selected. On the whole, the March number of the "Mag" is one of the best that has appeared this year and the board should be congratulated upon the high character of the publication.

INDOOR MEET OUTSIDE

If the weather permits, the indoor track-meet scheduled for the latter part of this month will take place on Northrop Field instead of the Armory. This adds greatly to the interest of the contest and it is hoped that Dr. Williams will be able to induce the weather man to furnish a few more nice days.

INTRA-SOPHOMORE DEBATE

The question which the Sophomores will debate in their contest for places on the class debating team will be "Resolved, That the best interests of the United States demand the retention of the Philippines."

BATTALION PARADE

If the weather permits, the battalion will indulge in a little recreation Saturday afternoon next, in the shape of a dress parade upon the campus. This will be the first battalion parade of the year and should attract a large audience.

Robertson, has been accepted by the Gopher board and will be seen by the public for the first time when that book appears, about the first of May. It has been proposed to have the students sing it after chapel on the morning the Gopher makes its appearance.

The maximum salary paid to full professors at Minnesota is \$2,400 per annum; at Columbia and Chicago it is from \$5,000 to \$7,000; at Harvard it is \$5,000; at Yale it is \$4,000; at California it is \$4,000; at Leland Stanford it is \$3,000 to \$5,000; at Michigan and Wisconsin it is \$3,500. Respectfully referred to the proper authorities.

The great interest manifested last year in the inter-department ball games proves conclusively that such games will be a permanent addition to spring athletics.

All the departments interested last year will be in the field again and compete for honors upon the diamond. But why are not the different classes in the academic department represented by ball teams? Surely there is enough material in any one of these classes to warrant the formation of a good team. The freshman class, for instance could undoubtedly organize as good a team as any of the different departments. Let somebody take hold of this matter and organize ball teams in each of the academic classes.

A Warning

Spring time has come again and the callow youth and the unsophisticated maiden will soon avail themselves of the numberless pleasures of the river bank, where after skipping classes they can rove about in serenity and contentment. But in this connection the DAILY would like to donate a little friendly advice given with kindest feeling to all parties concerned, but nevertheless very pertinent to their welfare. And that is, that the members of the Sophomore class would do well to forget such pleasures for this spring at least, for if they do not, some of them may never have the pleasure of enjoying another joyous spring at our dear University.

Freshman beware and not let themselves be over-tempted by a desire to examine more minutely the geography and structure of the river bank. As for the Juniors and Seniors they ought to have enough sense to take care of themselves, and if they have not, no words of advice from us will avail.

FROM OTHER COLLEGES

More than 40 per cent of the students at Columbia hold degrees.

Notre Dame defeated Cornell in the relay races held at Georgetown.

Oberlin proposes to name two of its buildings after President McKinley and the late Prof. Rice.

There will be a competitive drill at the Farm school next Saturday. Major John F. Bernhagen of the University Battalion will officiate as judge.

A foot ball game between the university of California and the university of Michigan, to be played on next Thanksgiving day is something more than a possibility.

The class of '98, Harvard, gave \$9,686 for a class memorial. The largest contribution was \$300; the average amount given by those who contributed was \$37.69, and the average for the whole class was \$26.32. The Class Committee of 1902 expects to collect between \$18,000 and \$20,000.

The staff of the Michigan Daily News are going to give a banquet to the various University celebrities. All the High Moguls will attend the affair which will be strictly formal.

Among recent basket ball scores of interest were the following: March 1, Williams 23, Dartmouth 15; Brown 15, M. I. T., 14; March 3, Harvard 19, Columbia 12; Cornell 9, Yale 8; March 4, Trinity 25, Wesleyan 21.

The university of Michigan Band has disbanded. Little or no explanation is given for this startling action on the part of the band, but the principal cause seems to be the difficulty in raising funds to meet the necessary expenses of the organization.

The dual track meet of Harvard and Yale will be held on May 24.

A member of the athletic board of the Iowa State University has stated that Mr. McCutcher spent, in all, during his three years as general manager, over \$1,500 more than his salary in order to maintain his position creditably, and the best interests of the University. His salary is only one thousand dollars a year. Mr. McCutcher has not yet resigned, however.

There is a concerted movement on foot among the Michigan colleges to do away with foot ball. At a meeting of the college branch of the State Teacher's Association it was voted to recommend that all colleges unite in prohibiting the game. The faculties of nearly all the colleges in the state are now considering the recommendation. Its opponents regard the game as physically injurious, and say that it has not performed the offices which its friends claim for it, namely, that of increasing attendance.

SUMMER SCHOOL

Arrangements for the annual summer
 school at the University, under the di-
 rection of Dr. D. L. Kiehle, are about
 completed. The session this year will
 be limited to four weeks because of
 the convention of the National Educa-
 tional association to be held in Minne-
 apolis in July. The summer school will
 open for work July 14. There will be
 a number of special features. A kinder-
 garten course will be conducted by Miss
 Wood, director of the Minneapolis Free
 Kindergarten, a course in dietetics by
 Miss Eleanor Wilkinson and a course
 in physiology by Dr. R. O. Beard. Dur-
 ing the first week of the session there
 will be a special course of lectures by
 Dr. E. E. White, a prominent Ohio
 educator, on "The Philosophy of Edu-
 cation."

By coming a week early this year
 students of the summer school will have
 the opportunity of attending the ses-
 sions of the National Educational as-
 sociation and will also be able to take
 advantage of the special association
 round trip rates of one fare plus \$2.
 These rates entitle the purchaser to
 membership and also to a volume of the
 proceedings of the convention which
 are very valuable to teachers.

In the handicap shot put contest Tuesday, LeFans distanced all his competitors who were about 20 in number and put the shot 41 ft. 11 inches.

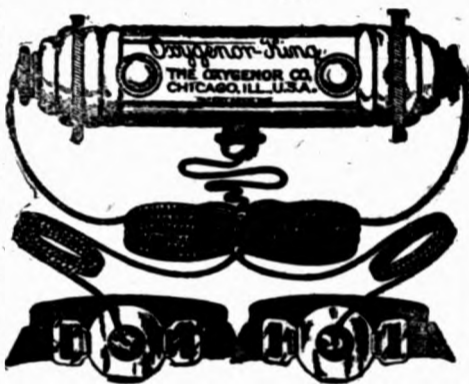

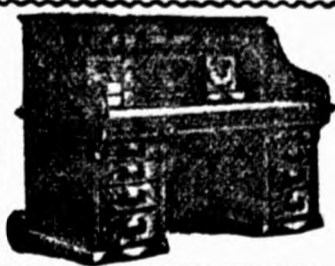
