PUBLIC LECTURE

Dr. IDA KAHN, noted Chinese woman physician, will speak to the members of the University this afternoon at 4:30 in the Little Theater. Her subject will be "China's Place in the World's Advance." Dr. Kahn was appointed by the Chinese government as its representative at the International Conference of women physicians recently held in New York City, and her address will be of interest to the general University public. Dean Lyon of the Medical School will preside. Dr. Kahn has established several hospitals in China and is one of their most beloved and versatile women. She is speaking but three times in Minneapolis and the University is most fortunate in securing her for the address this afternoon.

LECTURES BY MR. A. F. WHYTE

Honorable A. F. Whyte of England, will lecture at the Little Theater tomorrow afternoon at 2:30, and Monday afternoon at 4:30. All members of the University are invited to attend these lectures.

Mr. Whyte is a graduate of Edinburgh University and studied at the Sorbonne. In 1908 he was named a special commissioner in Vienna and Budapest for the study of Industrial Insurance. In 1910 he was elected member of Parliament from Perthshire as a Liberal, and later became Winston Churchill's parliamentary secretary. He remained in parliament until 1918 but in 1917 became editor of "The New Europe," an English periodical devoted to "integral victory" and to reconstruction on the basis of nationality and the rights of minorities. "The New Europe" has perhaps had more to do with the American and English plans for peace than any other periodical. Mr. Whyte and Mrs. Whyte—who is a fine representative of the English political woman—were in Paris during the last part of the Peace Negotiations and followed the course of events from both the British and American points of view. They are now making a tour in the United States studying American political opinion, and will be guests of the University from Friday until Tuesday.
