VISITING SCHOLAR LECTURE SERIES-----The UMD Chapter of the American Association of University Professors (AAUP) is sponsoring a Visiting Scholar Lecture Series. The major purpose of this series is to bring to UMD outstanding scholars from the arts and sciences who can communicate their ideas in an inter-disciplinary setting. These meetings will be open to all faculty and staff and their guests as well as selected students.

We are pleased to announce that our first speaker will be Professor Herbert Feigl, Director of the Minnesota Center for Philosophy of Science. He will speak on the topic "Language and Meaning" in Kirby Ballroom, March 8, 1961, at 8:00 p.m. Dr. Feigl was born in Austria, studied in Munich and Vienna, and received his doctorate in physics from the University of Vienna in 1927. While in Austria he was a member of the famous "Vienna Circle" that led in the development of logical empiricism. He has lectured at Harvard, Iowa, Purdue, Columbia, and the Universities of Puerto Rico and Hawaii. Dr. Feigl was a Guggenheim fellow. He is on the editorial staff of PHILOSOPHICAL STUDIES and PHILOSOPHY OF SCIENCE. He is the author of READINGS IN PHILOSOPHICAL ANALYSIS and READINGS IN THE PHILOSOPHY OF SCIENCE. He is also an editor of a University of Minnesota Press Series - MINNESOTA STUDIES IN THE PHILOSOPHY OF SCIENCE. According to the DIRECTORY OF AMERICAN SCHOLARS, Dr. Feigl is a specialist in logic and methodology of science and the theory of knowledge. (Wendell Glick, President AAUP)
