DULUTH--Academy Award winning cameraman Jack Painter heads the Fox-Movietone News camera crew taking several sequences of film on the UMD campus and on Park Point today and Tuesday as part of a short subject on winter fun on ice.

Thomas McMorrow, sports editor, and Ed Reek, assistant cameraman, complete the New York camera team in Duluth today and Tuesday.

Painter, F-MN's head cameraman, received the 1955 Academy Award for cinemascope short subjects with a film "Survival City," taken in Nevada to illustrate A-bomb destruction.

He has been in film work since joining the Vitagraph Film Co. in 1915. After his 40-year stint with F-MN, <sup>he</sup> began serving with the air section of the U S. army signal corps in World War I.

The UMD and Duluth scenes were arranged by a committee headed by Bob Burke, Pee-Wee football leader who several years ago assisted in arrangements for an F-MN short subject on a Pee-Wee playoff. UMD student leaders assisting in arrangements include David Zentner and Leonard Skrobel.

General views requiring spectator participants are scheduled at the Park Point Community center, 31st and Minnesota avenue, at 1:30 p.m. Tuesday.

The Duluth committee assisting the F-MN crew in arrangements has invited all who are free at that time to participate in the Park Point sequences.

Among activities scheduled are ice-boating, skating, broomball, pole-sledding and ski-joring.

McMorrow said the Duluth film will be combined with a University of Wisconsin sequence.

The film will be edited, including dubbing in of commentary and campus songs, in New York City.

The commentary will be done in English, Spanish and Portuguese in New York. Other copies will be flown to Paris and Berlin, where commentary will be dubbed in in other languages.

The film will have its premiere probably in the Radio City Music Hall in New York City. It will then be shown in theatres throughout the world.
