University Meet Will Give Aspirants Chance to Make Squad

ILEY DOES WELL IN HAMMER THROW

Late Change Makes Possible Public Admittance to Trials

Varsity track aspirants will have a chance to prove their caliber in actual competition, it was decided, and as a result there will be an All-University Track meet held on Northrop Field Saturday afternoon at 2:30. All men eligible for Varsity competition will have to win their spurs in this meet.

Outside Officials
Coach Len Frank says that outside officials will be provided and that accurate account will be kept of all results. The meet will be run off promptly with absolutely no delays so all men want to be on the field on time and ready for their events.

All eligible aspirants who have hopes of participating in the coming Ames meet must prove their class at this time. Only those men who place in this elimination contest will be allowed to enter the dual meet which takes place a week later. The competition will be unusually keen at this time since several of the freshman speed merchants have signified their intentions of going out and copping a few places from the Varsity men.

Hammer Throwers Strong
In spite of the freshman threats, and in spite of the imposing records of the coming Ames aggregation, the varsity men are steadily plugging away and are confident over the outcome of the approaching Ames meet. In the hammer-throw especially have some promising men been unearthed. Bailey, out for his first season, is already negotiating a triple turn and hurling the old hammer well over a hundred feet. This is a remarkably good showing for a first year man.

In addition to Bailey, Harry Armstrong is also showing great promise in this event. He is constantly hurling the weight over a hundred and ten feet and gives promise of increasing this distance considerably. Augie Madsen is doing the best work, however, with throws ranging a hundred and twenty feet and more. With a little more development he will offer trouble for any conference hammer-throwers.

It has been decided to let the public in to this meet in spite of an earlier announcement to the contrary. So much interest is being shown by the student body that the management decided to change its decision. This is a splendid opportunity for the students to see their team in action. It will give them a chance to get a line on the Varsity's chances with the crack Ames team.

Women's Athletic Board Installed Tues.

A joint meeting of the old and new boards of the Women's Athletic association was held Monday noon in the W. A. A. room in the Women's gymnasium. The new board, which will be installed at an open meeting of the association next Tuesday noon in the Hygiene lecture room in the Women's Gymnasium, will be entertained by the old board tomorrow morning at a 7 o'clock breakfast on the river flats. At the meeting next Tuesday the retiring officers will make their annual reports.

Baseball practices are well under way, according to Helen McGregor, who announces that teams will be picked May 19. Twelve practices are required to make teams, and as only 3 practices can be completed in a week, girls interested in getting positions on class teams are urged to come out at once.

The vanguard of the 3,000 athletes who are to compete in the University of Pennsylvania relay carnival Friday and Saturday arrived at Philadelphia today. Among the first were Nightingale of West Virginia and Jenne of Washington. Jenne, Pacific coast collegiate record holder at pole vaulting, made 13 feet 1 1/4 inches in practice yesterday. The U. S. Naval Academy will make its first appearance in the history of the academy away from Annapolis when it competes in the distance medley relay championship.

Aspirants Try-Out For Sigma Delta Psi

Shot Put and Running Broad Jump to Be Pulled Off at Northrop Field

Sigma Delta Psi candidates will strive to fulfill membership requirements in two more events this afternoon at Northrop Field.

The events on tab at 4 o'clock are the shot put and the running broad jump. Seniors are required to jump 17 feet, while the junior grade is set at 15 feet. The shot put is graded according to the weight of the competitor.

The committee on tryouts have drawn up the following program of tests to be run off this spring, making it possible for any aspirant to make senior grade in Sigma Delta Psi before the end of the quarter in June.

Sigma Delta Psi, athletic fraternity, met yesterday noon at the Union for luncheon and business session. A set of by-laws were read and adopted and the Committee on Tryouts reported that over fifty candidates had reported for the trials Tuesday in the baseball throw and football punt.

Twenty men heaved the horsehide the Senior distance of 250 feet, while 21 made Junior, 200 feet. In the football punt 10 passed Senior requirements of 40 yards and the same number made Junior, 30 yards.

Hamline Defeated by River Falls Nine

The River Falls normal baseball team avenged their recent defeat at the hands of Hamline by reversing the decision on the midway diamond, winning by a score of 10 to 1. Suther, pitching for River Falls, held the Hamline hitters to eight scattered hits and also held them scoreless after the first inning.

An interclass track meet at Macalester in which the ophomores and seniors combined against the freshmen and Juniors, was won by the former yesterday by 58 1/2 points to 49 1/2. Ralph Robertson of the sophomore team was high point winner with 14 1/2. He had two firsts, a second and two-thirds as well as a tie for third in the 100 yard dash. Paden was second with 14 points and Hauser third with 11.

He shows none of the flashy play used by the Minnesota players, but persistently cuts the balls down the side

lines. He defeated Norton in straight sets 7-5, 7-5.

Minnesota pulled the match out of the fire by capturing the doubles. The play was very even and the St. Olaf men seemed at the top of their game. Norton and Bros finally pulled out with two sets, 6-4, 9-7, giving them two of the three matches, thus winning the afternoon's play.
