

Livestock Show at Ag Farm Will be Presented May 13

One Hundred and Twenty-five Animals Entered in the "Ag. Royal"—Selection of Animals Will Begin May 1

Because a college of agriculture holiday is being planned for inauguration day, May 13, the 1921 student livestock show will probably come on that day instead of May 14, the date originally planned.

One hundred and twenty-five animals will be entered in the 1921 "Minnesota Ag. Royal," if all the animals that are available for showing are taken by students.

Selection of the various show animals will begin Tuesday, and end by May 1. Show material available includes 16 horses, 40 dairy cattle, 40 beef cattle, and 25 swine.

R.O.T.C. Enrollment Cut Down One Half

2200 Men Enrolled in All Branches Of Corps First of Year—1500 Academic

Enrollment in the R. O. T. C. has decreased nearly one-half since October, military department records show.

At the beginning of the fall quarter 2200 men were enrolled in all the branches of the University corps.

By January, the number of men taking drill had fallen to 1600; registration figures for spring show the enrollment to be a bare 1200.

Military authorities assert that the fact that many men are just finishing drill begun in the S. A. T. C. period accounts for the sudden decline.

Three Prizes Offered Annually by Sigma Xi

Two Faculty Members Required to Chaperon

3. The names of the chaperones must be given in full, together with their addresses, and telephone numbers.
