OPEN FORUM On Thursday, Jan. 28 at 3:40 p.m. in the Regents Room, Administrative Officers, University Senate Consultative Committee members and Senate Finance Committee members will be present to discuss their recent activities and to give an update on the present University financial situation.

THE HOT AND COLD OF IT How healthy is it to run from a steaming hot sauna into cold water or snow? Learn how our bodies respond to the stress of exposure to the cold, how our bodies regulate temperature, how various drugs can influence that regulation and what prevention techniques can minimize heat loss, at the lecture "Hypothermia: Friend or Foe." The lecture, part of the Sunday Evening With a Professor series, will be presented at 5 p.m. Sunday, Jan. 31, and again at 5 p.m. Sunday, Feb. 7, by Robert Pozos, associate professor and chairperson of the School of Medicine's physiology department. THE BLACK AND BLUE OF IT Excessive violence in sports will be the subject of a lecture Monday, Feb. 8, at 8 p.m. by the attorney who authored the federal Sports Violence Act Bill considered by Congress in 1980. Richard Horrow, an attorney and Harvard Law School graduate, will talk about "Violence in Sports" and show 25 minutes of film depicting brutal scenes from professional sports. The lecture, which is free and open to the public will be held in the Kirby Student Center ballroom.

"Picnic," set in a small town in Kansas in 1953, looks at the hopes, dreams and frustrations of five women and a drifter who changes the women's lives, making each realize something good about themselves.
