Changes of Registration Made Necessary by Failures in Winter Quarter Subjects

Students residing in the Twin Cities, who must change their registration owing to failures received in winter quarter courses, must make these changes on March 30th, 1929. THE REGULAR LATE CHANGE OF REGISTRATION PENALTY WILL BE IN EFFECT FOR THIS GROUP OF STUDENTS ON MONDAY, APRIL 1, 1929.

Students who do not reside in the Twin Cities will be allowed to make any necessary changes of registration (those made necessary by failures in full quarter courses) on Monday, April 1, without penalty. The REGULAR LATE PENALTY FOR THIS GROUP OF STUDENTS WILL BE IN EFFECT ON TUESDAY, APRIL 2, 1929. Any unnecessary changes of registration must be made either on March 30, 1929, or they will be subject to the regular late penalties.
