ALL-UNIVERSITY COUNCIL ON ENVIRONMENTAL QUALITY-----Dale Olsen represented UMD at the fourth meeting of the All-University Council on Environmental Quality held recently in Minneapolis.

The Council has established four broad topical areas which will be investigated by workshop-research groups during the spring quarter. The topical areas selected are: land use, water resources, growth policies and energy policy.

Each workshop-research group will be headed by one or two Council members. Council members were asked to identify faculty members on each of their respective campuses who they feel would be interested in participating in any of the workshop-research groups. Travel expenses for participants will be paid by the Council.

Final workshop reports will serve as one basis for future determination of Council financial support for individual research proposals. It is anticipated that each of the final workshop-research reports will be published.

Any UMD staff member who would like to participate or who has further questions regarding the Council is urged to contact Dr. Olsen.

GRANT-----A \$1500 grant has been awarded to John Adams in support of his research on "Fish Marketing Patterns and Problems in the West Indies" by the Office of International Programs. The grant, which was recommended by the Faculty Small Grants Review Committee, will be used to finance his field trip in the West Indies during spring quarter 1974.
