## UNION MAY CONTRACT FOR SOUVENIR OPERA SCORES

**Demand for Music of All the Songs to be Anticipated—Five Hundred Must Subscribe.**

A souvenir score of the Union Opera is the latest development in campus music circles. The contract with the publishers of the music, the University Company of Ann Arbor, provides only for the publication of five separate sheet songs. One of the individual hits of the opera which are to be published in sheet form is "I can't help loving you," a sentimental ballad which beats much of the comic opera stuff now in vogue. The "Shevlin Hall" stunt song, which is bound to be a local screamer and is going to sell well. The biggest sentimental song in the opera is said to be "when I call on you," a trio between a Stein and Song honor student and the Prof. and the heroine's second cousin. Some, however, prefer "Riverbanking" the best local hit in the fusing line for years ago.

The last sheet song will be the great loyalty song which is the key song of the second act and the great solo of the play with a chorus which is going to live along with our great hymn.

But outside of these five songs, there are ten other numbers of the best calibre, the opening choruses, finals of both acts, and several other head-liners. The expense of a high class score is a tremendous one and the publishers are unwilling to run the risk of a possible loss, so a subscription list is to be started for the scores. Blanks are to be distributed among the cast and in the post boxes, and if five hundred people agree to take a score at two dollars, the publishers agree to get out a hundred page souvenir score, with all the music in its entirety and a four-page souvenir of the Opera, pictures of the committees, cast, principals and author, and articles by the coaches, chairmen and authors.

The subscription blanks must be turned into the Postmaster immediately, as the three weeks between now and the Opera will be needed to get out the scores.

A campus music store will be established in one of the book stores, where the scores will be distributed to the subscribers, and the sheet music sold.

## NINE SCHOOLS ADDED TO ACCREDITED LIST

**Downey, James and Robinson Attend Meeting of Association of Colleges at Chicago.**

Nine new Minnesota schools were added to the accredited list at the meeting, March 25 and 26, of the North Central Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools at the Auditorium hotel, Chicago. They were Alexandria, Canby, Glencoe, Jackson, Macalester, Worthington, Crookston, Ely and Little Falls. The latter three were dropped last year, the recent meeting reinstating them. With these additions there are now fifty-two accredited schools in Minnesota.

The report in several of the state papers that three schools were dropped from the list, is erroneous. All of the former list was retained.

Deans John F. Downey and George F. James and Dr. E. V. Robinson represented Minnesota University at the meeting.

While absent Dean Downey also attended the meeting of academic deans on March 23 and 24 at the University of Illinois. Four half day sessions composed the meeting and the following universities were represented: Michigan, Ohio, Indiana, Illinois, Wisconsin, Minnesota, Missouri, Nebraska and Kansas. The meeting in 1911 will be held at the University of Michigan.

## PROPOSED CONSTITUTION OF COUNCIL PRESENTED

**Committee Draws up Articles to be Ratified by Meetings of Juniors and Seniors.**

The committee of seniors appointed by President Theodore Thomson, has drawn up the following constitution of the Student Council of the academic college. It is merely tentative and will be submitted to the senior and junior classes in order to be ratified, and probably also at a student meeting. At this meeting and in the columns of the Daily, any students will be allowed to express their opinion concerning the proposed constitution which follows:

## CONSTITUTION OF THE STUDENT COUNCIL. College of S. L. & A. University of Minnesota.

### Preamble.

It is the intention of those who ordain this constitution that:

1. Members of the Student Council shall be elected without recourse to "politics."
2. Votes shall not be solicited by prospective members nor their friends.
3. Breaches of student discipline shall be reported to the Student Council of members thereof by students and faculty.
4. It shall especially devolve upon members of the Student Council as members thereof and as students to observe at all times breaches of student discipline and report them to the Council.

### ARTICLE I.

#### Name and Composition.

This organization shall be known as the Student Council of the College of S. L. & A. of the U. of M. and shall from the beginning of the college year, until the time of election of new members, consist of thirteen members—two bodies to be known as a Men's Council, of six members, three Seniors, two Juniors and one Sophomore; and the Women's Council, of six members; three Seniors, two Juniors and one Sophomore, and a Chairman who shall be President of the Senior Class.

From the time of election until the close of the College year, the student council shall have six additional members, and the Men's Council, and the Women's Council, three ad-

ditional members each, in as much as the Senior members shall hold office until the close of the college year.

### ARTICLE II. Object.

The object of this Council shall be:  
1. To afford a suitable medium for the exchange of opinion between the Academic undergraduates and the Faculty.

2. To interpret and maintain Minnesota tradition and customs.

3. To exercise general supervision of Student affairs, including Class and Publication Elections, and student breaches of conduct.

4. To recommend and support improvements in the College.

5. And to form a body of representative students who shall crystallize and make effective the sanest phase of undergraduate opinion.

### ARTICLE II. Meetings.

The Student Council shall meet when called by the Chairman, or upon request of three members of the Men's Council or the Women's Council.

The Men's Council and the Wo-

men's Council shall meet regularly and separately once each month. Special meetings shall be called by the Chairman of the Men's Council or the Women's Council, or at the request of three members of either Council.

### ARTICLE IV. Officers.

The President of the Senior Class shall be ex-officio chairman of the Student Council.

The Student Council shall elect one student Council.

The officers of the Men's Council and of the Women's Council shall be: a Chairman who shall be a Senior, and a Secretary, elected at the last regular meeting of the College year by the respective Councils.

All officers shall hold office for the entire year.

When any of the officers are absent from any Council, an officer pro tem shall be elected.

### ARTICLE V. Election.

The representatives of the Senior, Junior and Sophomore classes of the Men's Council, shall be chosen by the men of their respective classes.

The representatives of the Senior, Junior and Sophomore classes of the Women's Council shall be chosen by

At a meeting of the men of the Junior Class at this appointed time, conducted by the Junior representative on the Council, the three members who are to be the Senior representatives for the following year, shall be chosen as follows: By a preliminary secret ballot, each man shall vote for three candidates. From the six nominees receiving the highest numbers of votes, three shall be elected by a second ballot.

The two representatives who shall be the Junior representatives for the following year shall be elected from five Juniors nominated in the above manner by the men in the Sophomore class.

The Sophomore representative for the following year shall be elected the following year on the Men's Council shall be elected from three candidates nominated in the above manner by the men of the Freshmen class.

Senior, Junior and Sophomore representatives on the Women's Council shall be elected in the same manner.

### ARTICLE VI. Quorum.

A majority of the Student Council shall constitute a quorum.

Five members from the Men's Council, or from the Women's Council shall constitute a quorum in their respective councils.

### FRATS ORGANIZE LEAGUE

**Academic Societies to Play Baseball—Professionals Not in League.**

Twelve academic and four professional fraternities were represented at a meeting held in Dr. L. J. Cooke's office yesterday, to organize an inter-fraternity baseball league. A vote to decide on the advisability of forming two distinct leagues to be composed, one of academic fraternities, the other of professional, showed a majority in favor of the plan. The representatives of the professional Greeks withdrew and will meet today to form their own organization.

The academic Greek societies then got busy with plans for their league and elected Malcolm Grant, president and Dan Long, secretary. It was decided to have an executive committee composed of five men, the president and secretary to be members ex-officio, and a schedule committee of three. The executive committee were instructed to draw up necessary rules for the government of the league, for the fixing of the eligibility.

President M. E. Grant appointed to the executive committee, Walter Wieland as chairman, and to assist him, Paul Weisel, M. E. Grant, Wm. Huntington, and Dan Long. The schedule committee are Russell Smith, chairman, Loren Brooks, Alfred Bollum.

Those fraternities not represented, who desire to participate should notify Dan Long, P. O. box 1502, without delay, and have a representative at the next meeting.
