## MEETING OF ATHLETIC BOARD HELD YESTERDAY

Passes on Many Minor Matters—Petition for Wrestling Club Coach Laid on Table.

An important meeting of the student athletic board of control was held yesterday afternoon at four o'clock in Prof. James Page's office. The monthly budget of \$682 came up for approval and was passed. The basketball schedule in-so-far as it is complete was authorized by the board.

The newly organized wrestling club were "pulling" for the Board of Control to engage a wrestling instructor and presented a well-signed petition to that effect. The board, however, denied the petition and appointed a committee, of which Edward Leach, secretary of the Board, is chairman to compose and publish, in the Minnesota Daily, an open letter stating their attitude and giving their reasons for the refusal of the request.

Manager Helon Leach's request that his office be changed was granted and the opening of school after the holidays will probably find him installed in what is now the wrestling room. Provision for new quarters for the mat enthusiasts has not as yet been made.

No definite action was taken on the matter of an eastern trip.

A freshman team is to be organized and Helon Leach, manager of athletics was instructed to arrange a schedule for them. Their first game is to be played with St. Olaf College at Northfield.

The Banquet recently tendered the football and cross-country teams of the University and the football teams of the Twin City high schools by the Board of Control cost the Board \$320. Over two hundred men were entertained.

## BOARD LAYS DOWN MANDATE

Will Stand Strictly by Rule—Delinquents Will Suffer—Dates Made in Gopher Hole.

February 1st has been set as the last day for the taking of all pictures for the 1911 Gopher. This year the board has made the iron clad rule that the pictures must be taken on time or they will be thrown out irrespective of who or what they are. The book last year was greatly delayed by a few who did not do their little part on time. This year all who fail to comply with the rules must suffer.

The board has made arrangement with Lee Bros., whereby the dates of sittings for all group pictures may be made with the managing editor of the editor-in-chief. This will save much trouble and delay on the part of the societies, and will do away with much of the confusion arising from mistakes as to the time of engagement as its photographers.

## PREXY OPTIMISTIC IN REGARD TO UNIVERSITY

Pleased at Showing of Teams and Students for This Year—Favors New Dean.

Among the things which President Northrop would like some kind Santa Claus to put into the University's stocking are the settlement of the campus extension difficulties and means for the re-enforcement of the graduate school. "We want to get the ownership of the newly-acquired property settled," said Prexy yesterday, "so the new buildings can be completed before the end of next year."

Speaking of the graduate school President Northrop said several men of scientific standing were needed to put the school on the proper basis.

Prexy thought the work of students so far this year had been better than usual. He was especially pleased with the showing the various team representing Minnesota had made.

"The board of regents," he said, "were so gratified at the double victory of the debate teams, that they passed a resolution thanking everyone involved. Governor Lind said the debate last Friday night was the best he ever heard."

President Northrop is pleased with the selection of Mr. Woods for the dean of the agricultural college. "I hope he will accept," said Prexy, "he is a man of scientific attainments."

Although President Northrop will spend Christmas at home, his vacation will be a busy one. Many questions of great importance to the University have to be considered and decided.

As a parting word Prexy said he hoped, "the students would enjoy themselves during the holidays and come back refreshed for work in January."

## SHEVLIN GETS ADDITION FOR ENLARGED KITCHEN

Another Donation from Mr. Thomas Shevlin for New Kitchen. Great Improvement.

The plans for the addition of Shevlin have been completed and the contracts will be let before the end of the holidays. On account of the peculiarity of the soil, the contractors say that winter will not interfere with the excavation.

The addition will be directly back of the present building and will be connected with it and the proposed gymnasium by arcades. The plans call for a new kitchen and dining room, the latter will afford three times more floor space than the present one, the wainscoting, will be of brick in some pleasing color, the floor will be of tiles.

The bread line will be done away with on account of the increased counter facilities, the trays can then be left before paying which will eliminate confusion. There will be windows on three sides of the room.

The kitchen will be entirely outside of the present building. It will be lined with white tile and equipped with all modern conveniences.

The addition will cost \$15,000, which has been donated by Thomas Shevlin, while Miss Comstock states that an appropriation of \$100,000 from the next legislature has practically been assumed.

## FIVE YEARS NOT REQUIRED

New Five Year Course in Mining but Four Year Course Retained.

The story, published in some of the overturn papers recently, stating that the Mining Engineering course is to be changed to five years, is erroneous. A five year course is to be offered but it is additional to the present course and differs from it only in the first year. That is to say an additional first year of work is to be given which, when finished, will start the students taking it, right in with freshmen of the four year course, their work from that time on to be the same. As it is now, many students desiring to take up Mining find themselves deficient in preparatory mathematics. This extra first year will offer to those students a special course in preparatory mathematics suitable to their peculiar needs. The other subjects included in this first year are not definitely decided upon as yet but will in all probability include mine accounting, Spanish, general chemistry and possibly some Political Science. Although there is no intention now of changing to the five year course altogether, if it should prove to be overwhelmingly popular, the four year course would probably be dropped.

## PROSPECTS FOR TRACK TEAM BRIGHTER DAILY

More Men Out Than Ever Before—One or Two Veterans for Each Event.

The Y. M. C. A. Carnival at St. Paul, Jan. 28, will give the public a large an idea of what faithful training the track men are doing in the University of Minnesota.

With the advent of 1910 it should be easily possible to get three new men out for every one that is out at present and if so, 600 men will be in training, from which to select a Conference team, and now that Minnesota has acquired the habit of winning the Conference track meet should come our way also.

The cross-country team won the intercollegiate championship without any apparent bad after effects of the exertion that was required to win.

Although we are quite well represented in nearly every event, still there is not a single event for which new candidates will not be heartily welcomed.

In the distance runs we have the cross-country men to fall back on and with a few months' more of training and experience our chances in the one and two miles should be good.

In the sprints we have Smith, Staske, Melvin, Bromley, Stevens, while in the weights we have Frank, Mencke Grant, Long, Neussle, and others.

The pole vaulters have Archie Twaine as their inspiration at present, and the hurdlers will have good pace-makers in Harmon, Stubb, Giitinan and Stevens.

The relay race requires too many stars for us to expect large results for Minnesota there, but with such strong-men in all the distance events and middle distances, as well as the short broad jump, hurdles and pole-vault and the opportunity to build up likely men in the sprints and weights Minnesota's hopes for the Conference in June ought to be very bright.

## NORTHROP'S BOOK

A Small Volume of lyrics "In Itinere"  
by G. N. Northrop on Sale at  
Wilson's.

Copies of "In Itinere," a volume of poems by Mr. George Norton Northrop of the English department have recently been received by Wilson's Book Store. "In Itinere" is published by the Oxford firm of B. H. Blackwell, and the volume appeared in England as early as April 1909, but the copies did not reach Minneapolis until the first part of December.

The poems are for the most part short lyrics. Almost every phase of emotion is covered in them, they are subjective, tender, grave, gay, symbolic and philosophical. Mr. Northrop has a singular gift for aptness of language, and every poem, however small, contains lines of beauty and dignity. "Life and Love" is one of the finest forms in the collection; it is in sonnet form and treats of the relation of Love and Life.

"Ad Matrem" and "To my Sister" are slight in form, but they are tender and graceful. None of the poems are more truly lyrical in quality than "A Song of Youth" which would lend itself admirably to a musical setting. "En Route" is remarkable in its power of insinuation, and "Apart" is interesting in its symbolism of man and nature.

It is not within the scope of such a small article to do more than mention the Nature poems, "Autumn and Spring," "Stars," (a delightful conceit) and "Night," as well as the graphic little scenes from Paris, such as "The Tuileries." All the poems show sincerity, dignity and a decided lyric gift.

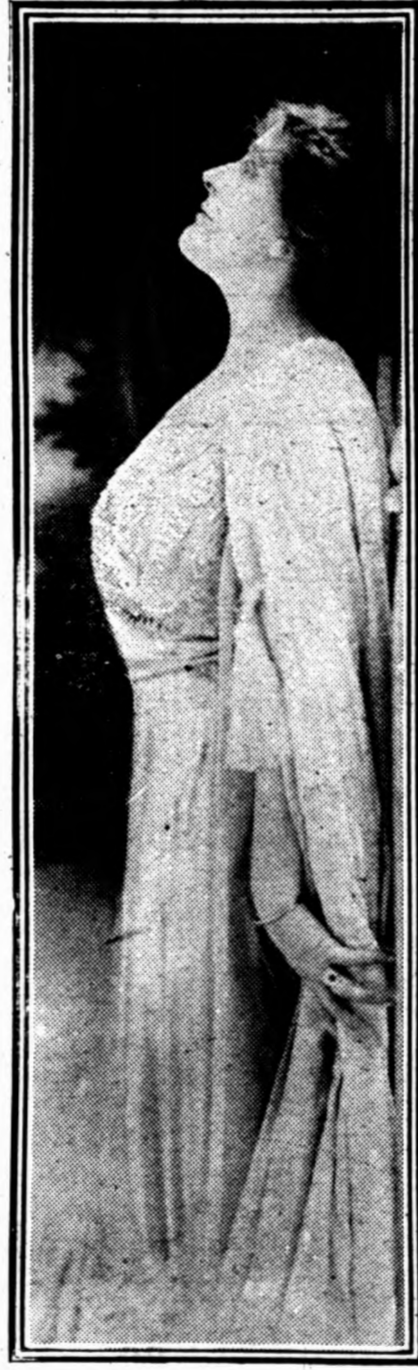
**FRESHMEN PLAN GAMES**

**TEMPLE ELECTED CAPTAIN AT NEBRASKA FOR 1910**

Right Tackle for Two Years Nearly Unanimous Choice—Other Athletic News.

Lincoln, Nebraska, Dec. 10.—(Special)—Leroy Temple was elected captain of the Nebraska 1910 football team last evening, the vote being made unanimous after the first ballot had given Temple 10 out of 15 votes. Temple has played right tackle on the varsity for two years past and has won notice for his courageous and steady playing. He was named by a Chicago Daily in its pick of a 1910 all-Western and was named in several all-Missouri-Valley line-ups.

The easy selection of Temple has caused rejoicing among Nebraska students. Both last year and in 1907-08 the election of a gridiron leader was attended with more or less bitter partianship and a choice effected only after numerous ballots. This year the athletic board made it understood that unless a good man was selected immediately, the power of selection would be taken from the "N" men and conferred upon some other authority. This may have had something to do with the action of the men, but there was a spontaneous harmony as well which argues well for the team work next year.

W. A. Mileck was elected captain of the cross-country team for next year. He ran this years as a member of the team which took second at the Chicago meet where Minnesota won first place.

Fifteen men were last week awarded "N"s by the athletic board, the awards being based on participation in the Iowa, Kansas, and Minnesota games and in two cases on general efficiency by men who were not in any one of those games. The "N" men are, Shonka, Ewing, Wolcott, Harte, Temple, Chauner, Johnson, Frank, Bentley, Hascall, Beltzer, Rathbone, Magor, Sturtznegger, and Elliott.

The full basketball schedule for 1910 has been announced, all the games being with Missouri Valley or Chicago conference schools. Nine of seventeen games are to be played in Lincoln. Kansas, Ames, Minnesota, and Drake each has four games with Nebraska, two at home and two in Lincoln and Missouri has one game in Lincoln. The basketball outlook is bright. Most of the men out for practice have had experience and Coach Hewitt promises some fast work by January 7, when the initial contest is played with Kansas.
