THANKSGIVING PARTY

On Thanksgiving afternoon at five o'clock in the Armory there will be a "home party" for all members of the University. There will be stunts put on by different organizations, a boxing match arranged by the Athletic Committee, old-fashioned games managed by a floor committee, a grand march, dancing, and a buffet supper. Members of the S. A. T. C. have a special invitation to be present, as well as all civilian students, both men and women, who do not go home for Thanksgiving Day. In order that the committee may know how many doughnuts, pies, sandwiches and cups of coffee should be provided, those who expect to attend are asked to give or send in their names as follows:

4. Girls in the dormitory at the Farm to Miss Lommen.
5. Girls in the Coöperative Cottages to Mrs. S. R. Worth.
6. Girls in the Home Management houses to Professor Mildred Weigley.
7. Girls in the approved houses to the office of the Dean of Women or to Professor Weigley's office.
8. Girls in sorority houses to the office of the Dean of Women or to Professor Weigley's office.
9. All students, both men and women, who are not included in the groups mentioned above, to the office of the Dean of Women.

Lists must be completed not later than noon, Tuesday, November 26.

Remember that all students in the University are urged to come, and that everybody will have a good time.

BECAUSE the College of Pharmacy of the University of Minnesota is engaged on so large a scale in the manufacture of tincture of digitalis for the United States Army, the District Board, Division No. 2, State of Minnesota, has decided that the College is "engaged in necessary war work and consequently is within the act of Congress and the rules regulating deferred classification for men found to be necessary to occupation or enterprise." No other College of Pharmacy in the United States has been so designated. The College recently, at the direction of the Government, sent a shipment of 4,680 half-pint bottles of tincture of digitalis of its own manufacture to France. The preparation of 10,000 additional bottles is under way.

AN OPPORTUNITY to take excellent photographs at prices approximately half of the ordinary charge is to be offered to the S. A. T. C., the Naval Unit, and the Marines, beginning soon, through arrangements completed by The 1920 Gopher. The pictures are to be the same as those taken by Juniors for the album section. Accommodations are being arranged in the International Bible College by Miller's Studio, which has done all work for The Gopher for many years. The prices will range from \$5 to \$6.75 a dozen, whereas ordinarily the pictures sell from \$10 to \$15. Further announcement will be made tomorrow as to when sittings begin. All pictures will be delivered before Christmas.

IN MEMORY OF PRESIDENT VAN HISE

YESTERDAY the University flag was flying at half-mast from 2:30 to 3:30, in honor of Charles R. Van Hise, President of the University of Wisconsin, whose funeral occurred at that hour.

THE University Health Service is now rapidly completing its plans and organization. There are three phases to its activity: (1) Personal; (2) Sanitation; (3) Education. The personal phase so far has received the most attention, owing of course to the influenza epidemic. The activities of the personal phase include the following: (a) Thorough physical and laboratory examination of students. The value of frequent physical examinations to every individual is inestimable. Am I physically fit? should be the frequent and serious concern of everybody. At any period in life serious and even fatal bodily disorders may begin and progress. In the early stages these disorders may be imperceptible, and even may reach irreparable stages before one is conscious of their presence. To avoid this condition frequent physical examinations are essential. Every student in the University should feel that he owes it to himself and society to be examined frequently—let us say, once each year. Now, it is the chief function of the University Health Service to determine the exact physical status of all students. It is primarily engaged in maintaining a high degree of health among all students. Positive health is the goal. The University Health Service urges that all students make it a point to consult its offices at 1515 University Ave. S. E. in regard to these physical examinations. Remember that all services of the University Health Service are absolutely free to students.
