"HOW TO ENJOY PICTURES"

Many people buy pictures; some of them enjoy pictures; a few of them know something about pictures. The appreciation of art really requires some knowledge about art. The lecture on Monday afternoon, by Professor Arthur F. Payne of the College of Education, is designed to furnish some information and hints on the enjoyment of pictures—"for the layman," as Professor Payne puts it.

University students may know more about pictures than some "laymen," but perhaps that is all the more reason they desire, or ought to desire, to know still more. The Summer Session thinks it is fortunate, therefore, that it may have the chance to attend such a lecture. Professor Payne will not only talk about pictures, but with the aid of the stereopticon will actually show them. The lecture is in the Little Theater and is open to the public.

SEASHORE TESTS OF MUSICAL ABILITY

Dean Seashore of Iowa University, has for some years made a study of the measurement of native musical ability. He

has very definitely formulated and tested out certain methods of determining the degree of native endowment which any person possesses which will function in a musical way. These tests are now largely used, as a vocational guide.

Mr. Earl L. Baker uses tests with his class in High School Music, and on Monday morning, from 10 to 12, will make a final test of his class. This meeting of the class will be open to all, as a demonstration of the method as applied to groups. It is in Room 117, Education Building.

The Minstrel Boy, Irish Folk Song

Irish folk lore has been brought into prominence by the writings of Eyng, Fiacha McLeod and others. It is rich with the superstition of the people, and colored with something of the Celtic fatalism. The folk music bears these same qualities with occasional touches of humor. Few countries have, on the whole, a more rich or charming array of folk songs.

The Minstrel Boy is not a true folk song, in that the author of the words was Thomas Moore, who contributed such a wealth of Irish song. The music, however, is a traditional tune, known before Moore's words were put to it as "The Green Woods of Tringha." The song gives us a picture of the life of the minstrels, of their devotion to the lords, and their love of country and independence.
