REGENTS CALL FOR RESUMPTION OF TALKS The University of Minnesota Board of Regents and University President C. Peter Magrath called for a resumption of talks with University Education Association (UEA) negotiators to avoid a strike at the Duluth and Waseca campuses. The announcement came at last Thursday's Regents' meeting in Minneapolis. Negotiations were expected to be held today (Thursday, October 14).

BUDGET REQUESTS APPROVED The University of Minnesota will ask the state legislature for an increase of \$49 million for fiscal years 1984 and 1985 after receiving approval last week from the Board of Regents. The \$49 million increase is over a base of \$757 million which would add up to a total request of \$806 million for fiscal years 1984 and 1985 (which includes the 1983-84 and 1984-85 school years). Of the \$49 million requested increase, some of what the University's Duluth campus would receive, if the request is funded, includes a share of \$4 million in operation and maintenance support, mostly in instructional equipment. This includes \$145,000 for Department of Psychology research and \$160,000 for the Department of Industrial and Technical Studies (in both cases, for equipment such as micro-computers).

JOHN JOHNSON TO RETIRE John A. Johnson, UMD Plant Services, will retire Oct. 29 after 30 years of university employment. In his honor, a farewell celebration is planned for Friday, Oct. 29, from 2 p.m. to 4 p.m. in the second floor lobby of the Darland Administration Building. Everyone is welcome to attend.
