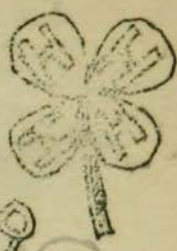

Any day at Barn D

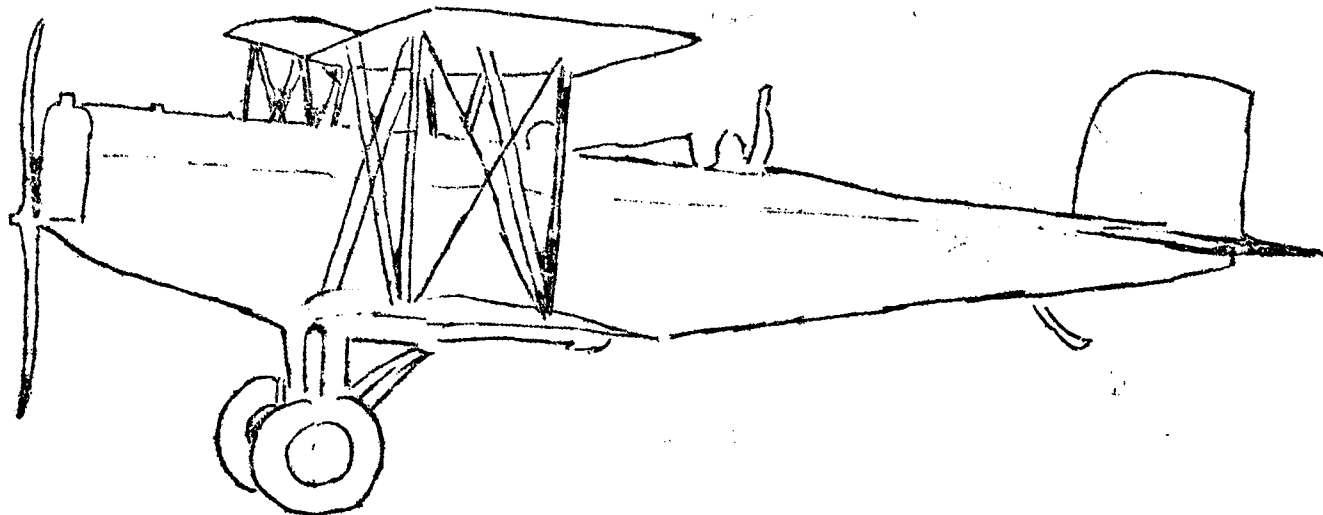
CLEOPHA DEIDERICH of Benton county, who is usually seen carrying a pail of water to her Holstein cow Dimple at Barn "D" is the only club member from her county here at the State Fair Camp. Cleopha has been in club work for 4 years and this is her first trip to the state fair. Her father raises Holstein cattle also, and they have a herd of 90 at home. Cleopha took 6th place in the showing yesterday.

CEUB members, here at State Fair Camp, do not want to miss the Airplane exhibit, which will be found in the big tent back of the State Department Exhibits building on Machinery Hill. There are 16 different types of planes on exhibition.

ONE of the planes of particular interest is the Ryan monoplane "Spirit of San Diego," which is a replica of the "Spirit of St. Louis" in which Lindy flew to Paris. This plane was brought here by Pilot Hawks and has been in the air for some stunt flying before State Fair crowds.

ANOTHER interesting plane is the big De Haviland army plane of the type used by the U. S. army in the World War. This plane has a 400 horse power Liberty motor and is capable of making 125 miles an hour. It is by far the largest plane in the exhibit and dwarfs many of the others.

THE smallest plane on exhibition was a tiny biplane made in Minneapolis with single cockpit, 2 cylinder motor, and a wing spread of only 19 feet. This plane is 14 feet long. It is capable of making 85 miles an hour and often flies from Minneapolis to Duluth in an hour and a half.

MRS. KING reports that there are no extension agents in her home county in Wisconsin, but that this summer they succeeded in

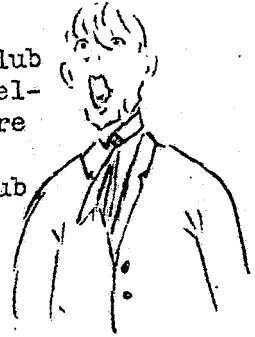

SNEEZE CREW HERE

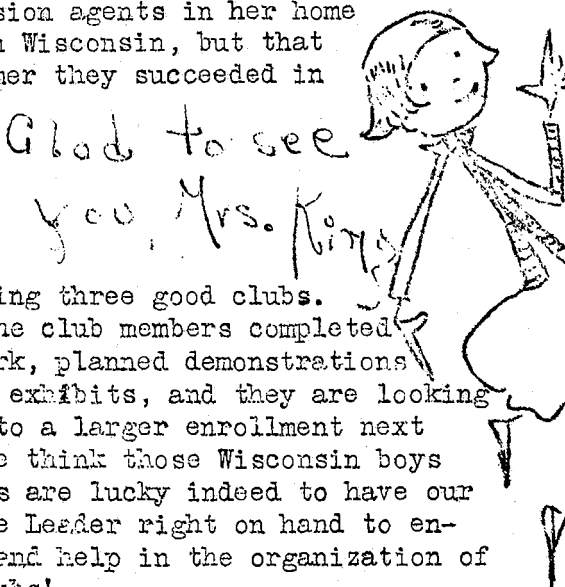

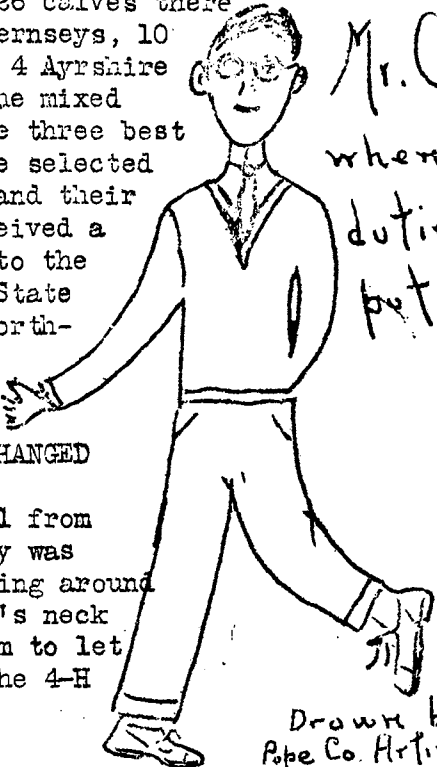
GIRL HANGED

WHERE DID THEY GET THEM?

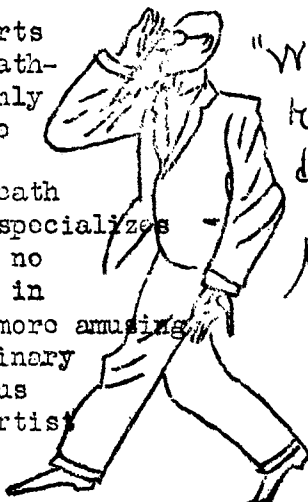
