RUSSIAN EDUCATIONAL SITUATION

The situation in Russia with respect to educational, religious, and cultural matters is of large interest to all thoughtful students of international affairs. For after all, the questions of government are largely determined by the education and social temper of the people. Dr. Sorokin, who has discussed Russian affairs so keenly in the past two weeks, will give a third lecture dealing with these phases on Tuesday afternoon at four.

This will be the last of the series by Dr. Sorokin, and will be open to the public.

LIQUID AIR DEMONSTRATION

The phenomena attending the lowering of the temperature of air until it takes a liquid form never fail to interest and in some cases to amuse. A demonstration of these phenomena becomes spectacular as well as scientific. Professor L. F. Miller has given such demonstrations in a very effective manner, and will on Thursday, August 28, open the Physics Lecture Room for a public presentation of the phenomena.

The demonstration is given partly as a regular lecture in the course in Heat, so that a full explanation of the cause of the behavior of air, as well as the practical means employed in securing the effects, will be presented. The lecture will be at four o'clock and will be open to the public.

Tonight, August 26

Those who know the work of Nazimova can well understand that her presentation of the character of Salome will not be lacking in the essential emotional elements. In addition it will be found to be artistic and of much significance. The picture has been repeatedly shown in churches for its Biblical teaching.

Thursday, August 28

For the last showing of the Summer Session another pre-release has been selected, "Napoleon and Josephine." This is a big and spectacular production, dealing with the effect of the divorce of Josephine on Napoleon's career. Accompanying this main theme, however, are presentations of many of the striking episodes in the Emperor's battles, made with historic accuracy.

The picture has been showing in eastern districts with a wonderful record of attendance, and the Summer Session is fortunate in having this opportunity to view it in advance of public showings. In order that all members of the Session may be accommodated, it will be necessary to exclude the general public. Students will please present fee statements and faculty and administration officials will personally identify themselves.

MINNESOTA WILD LIFE IN MOTION

Dr. T. S. Roberts, Curator of the University Zoological Museum, is one of the most enthusiastic as well as scientific observers of wild life in Minnesota. For years he has spent much of his time during the summer in the woods and lake country, particularly in the north. In the most recent years he has "shot" birds and animals with the motion picture camera and the museum has a fine collection of films.

On Wednesday, August 27, Dr. Roberts will give a talk accompanying a selection of these films, which will be shown in the Music Auditorium. Both pictures and discussion will be well worth the attention of all students. The talk will be at four o'clock and will be open to the public.
