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TUITION TO RISE 22 PERCENT A 22 percent increase in tuition beginning fall quarter was approved last week by the University of Minnesota Board of Regents. The regents voted 11-1 in favor of a 15 percent surcharge for 1982 summer session and the 1982-83 academic year. It will be in addition to a 10 percent tuition hike previously planned for next year. A previous three percent library surcharge will end, making the fall total 22 percent.

PUBLICATIONS FREEZE The Provost's group has reviewed each request submitted for approval of spring quarter publications. The criteria established by Central Administration and the interpretation of the criteria as applied to the Twin Cities campus publications was considered. It should be noted that the committee in the Twin Cities approved very few exemption requests on that campus. Brief, four informational-type documents, and the University Alumni Magazine Minnesota (in abbreviated form) were approved. Only the following publications were approved for spring quarter at UMD: UMD Newsletter, Duluth Business Indicators and Alumnus.

UMD GRAD WINS NATIONAL OPERA AUDITION Katherine Ritz, a UMD graduate, is one of 10 winners of the national auditions of the Metropolitan Opera Company held Monday in New York. As one of the winners, Ritz's career will now be guided under the auspices of the Metropolitan Opera. She also received a cash award of \$5,000. All 10 winners in New York remained there this week in preparation for a concert of operatic music which will be broadcast March 21 on public radio stations throughout the U.S. Ritz was a student of Donna Pegors, UMD associate professor of music, for six years before Ritz graduated with a Bachelor of Music degree in 1979.

WDTH IS KUMD WDTH-FM, the public radio station on campus, has changed its call letters back to the original letters KUMD-FM, station officials announced last week. The station, formerly the 500-watt KUMD, became WDTH-FM with 100,000 watts in 1975 when the University of Minnesota purchased equipment and the transmitter for \$95,000, which caused the initial change in call letters. KUMD is at 103 on the FM dial.
