POOL ROOM FOR "U"

ONE TO BE ESTABLISHED AT 519 FOURTEENTH AVE.

License Not in Violation of Ordinance. President Northrop Stronously Objects to Project.

A pool and billiard room in the vicinity of the University—at last the desire of some of the college students has been realized. The room will be established at 519 Fourteenth Ave. N. E., above F. A. Benjamin's grocery.

G. R. Barnhart, 1579 Minnehaha St., who intends to control the project, first endeavored to rent the hall over Wm. Slimm's hardware store, at 415 Fourteenth, but Mr. Slimm's objected.

Mr. Barnhart then applied to F. M. Henry, a down town small agent, for the place first named. Mr. Henry, when interviewed yesterday, stated that he had not yet rented the place, while Barnhart said that he had already obtained it.

People have been led to believe that a pool room would not be permitted in the vicinity of the University and that that faculty would also object.

License Inspector Longfellow said that the city ordinance allowed such establishments five hundred feet from the University. Several persons already have seen him about the matter, and he is willing to grant a license. If the faculty objects, he will revoke the license.

President Northrop is strongly opposed to such a project. He said, "I do not like it, because I do not think it good for the University. Several persons have been to see me about such a proposition and he told them that it would be unprofitable and detrimental to the University."

SENIORS MAY TAKE DAY COURSE IN LAW

JEAN PATEE CORRECTS WRONG IMPRESSIONS OF LAW SCHOOL.

Students are allowed to attend. Chapel—Academic seniors May Take Either Day or Night Junior Law.

"Not long ago, I put it to a vote in one of the classes of the law school to see how many wished to attend chapel services, not more than half a dozen signified their desire. I told that half dozen that they would be excused any time they wished to go to prayers." Thus spoke Dean Patee yesterday in an interview with a Daily representative.

The requiring of all academic seniors who wish to take law to pursue the night course and the arranging the schedule of classes at such times that it has made it impossible for the students to attend the chapel services has caused considerable consternation of late in the college of Law.

In response to these complaints, Dean Patee yesterday made the following statement:—

"It is now permissible, and has been for years, for senior academics to take either night or day Junior law.

"To avoid possible conflicts, they will be permitted to attend chapel services as a matter of fact, some take one course, some the other.

"Any who prefer the day course are accommodated, just as far as it is possible.

"All students wishing to attend chapel are permitted to do so, and the faculty would be glad if all would do so. The wish of the classes has been considered, and students of all classes are excused at any time for the purpose."

FACULTY IN FAVOR OF CLEAN CAMPUS

EVERY ONE SHOULD HELP, SAY PROFS AND STUDENTS.

Better than Treatise on "Nature of Government" to achieve civic virtue says Dr. James—Down with fences says Johnson.

"For a model campus"—this is the cry which has been taken up by the students and faculty at the suggestion of the Woman's Improvement League, and which is bound to produce results. Peanut paper bags, lunch box wrappings, cast off papers are no more to be allowed to clutter the college grounds.

Interview by a Daily reporter yesterday showed that the tidying up movement is enthusiastically supported.

Dr. James says: "It is a splendid plan. There is more civic virtue to be achieved by doing such little things around us than studying deep treatises on the "Nature of Government" or the "Relation of the Individual to the Universal Will."

Frank S. Lyon: "A good idea and if the students can be interested in the matter the campus will surely be kept clean."

Prof. Schlenker endorsed the idea and added that a great step would be taken toward beautifying the campus if students would not wear off the grass, especially back of the Pillsbury building, and in front of the Engineers.

Le Roy Arnold: "A clean campus is necessary and students will keep it so, if their attention is called to the matter. It might be well also, to begin with the Library building which is especially difficult to keep clean in our present cramped condition."

E. B. Johnson said emphatically: "Anything to beautify the campus. There should also be some way to keep students from making paths without stretching wires all over. Sitting or walking about on the grass is all right, but the artistic value of the campus should be guarded."

Prof. Maria Sanford gives the movement hearty approval and in the strongest terms denounced the habit of throwing bits of paper about, as an offense not only against neatness but also against beauty and art. She considered the abolition of this evil an important and necessary step in making the campus artistic.
