END YOUR COOPERATION WITH THE SELECTIVE SERVICE SYSTEM

November 14 is a Day of Resistance, when hundreds of young men across the United States will send their draft cards back to the government. We will not ask for or accept II-S or other deferments or even C.O. status. When we are classified I-A and called for induction, we will each say **HELL NO**, loudly and publicly.

We are committed to changing America. We are against the domination of foreign countries, a domination that often must be defended by American troops. We are against U.S. aggression in Vietnam, which threatens to destroy a people hungry for freedom and peace. We are against the draft, which controls so many lives, forcing some of our brothers to fight in Vietnam, and scaring others into college or certain approved jobs.

The Vietnamese must fight the troops our government orders there. Black people must fight for self-determination in their communities. Migrant farmers must fight for unions and decent wages. WE must fight the draft. We have sympathy for the other struggles, of course, and we want to help those peoples get rid of the causes of their oppression, but it is crucial to make our own struggle against the institution that most directly affects us.

We face prison for our action. But resistance is not experienced as a walking into prison. It is a breaking out, a liberation. We feel more enslaved by our cooperation with the draft, by our failure to live according to our convictions, than we will by iron bars.

Resistance is an affirmation. We say NO to killing, NO to war. We say NO to totalitarian pressure, NO to the draft. This is part of saying YES to life and YES to freedom. For each of us, the decision to resist means saying YES: I will live the kind of life my heart, mind, and guts tell me I have to live.

So that's a little of what we're about, and maybe it's the best we can do when we see you as a constituency for a leaflet, and you see us as one more piece of paper. But we're not a piece of paper, and you're not a constituency. Each of us is a man who had a decision about how his life is going to interact with today's most pressing social and political problems, and who decided to get together with others who made similar decisions. Over the past year at least 3000 men have decided they can't cooperate with the draft, and October 16, December 4, and April 3 were nation-wide days of Resistance. November 14 is next. Won't you join us, brothers?
