### POLITICAL SCIENCE PRIZES. for 1919-1920

The attention of all students in the University is called to the Political Science prizes for this year.

The Harris Political Science prizes amounting to \$250 established by Mr. N. W. Harris of Chicago will be offered as usual this year. A first prize of \$150 and a second prize of \$100 will be given for the best undergraduate thesis written on certain selected topics in any college or university in Indiana, Illinois, Michigan, Minnesota, Wisconsin and Iowa. The University of Minnesota has been particularly successful in carrying off one of these prizes in past years. It is hoped that a considerable number of students will enter the contest this year.

The William H. Baldwin prize of \$100 for the best undergraduate thesis in Municipal Government will also be given this year. The contest for this prize is nationwide.

The Bureau of Government Research, to be established at the University this fall, will be prepared to give special assistance to all junior and senior students who seriously enter the contest for either of these prizes.
