

The University of Minnesota, Duluth campus is young, exciting, moving. There are few campuses in the nation quite like it.

It is architecturally unique. Nearly all its buildings are interconnected for maximum comfort and efficiency. The low profile of the campus suggests both space and compactness.

Situated on a hillside high above Lake Superior, the 200 acre campus provides a clear view of ships from all over the world as they enter the bustling Duluth harbor.

UMD is one of four campuses of the University of Minnesota, fifth largest university in the nation.

UMD was established by the Minnesota Legislature on July 1, 1947. Its predecessors were Duluth State Teachers College (1921) and Duluth State Normal (1902).

Since the first brick was placed on the new campus for the Science building, 14 major structures have been built and equipped at a cost of almost \$25,000,000. According to current plans, the campus is about half complete.

The physical growth of the campus has barely kept pace with rising enrollments. UMD had 1,432 students in 1947 compared with almost 7,000 expected by 1970.

In addition to day students, almost 1,200 men and women take courses at night at UMD through the University's General Extension Division. Both Summer Session terms attract more than 2,500 students. This means that UMD now annually serves almost 9,000 individual undergraduate and graduate students.

In 1947, only a four-year B.S. degree and a two-year diploma were offered. Today, students can earn the Associate in Arts, Bachelor of Arts, Bachelor of Science, Master of Arts and Master of Science degrees.

More than 1,000 courses are offered in 34 major fields of study. The M.A. is offered in seven fields; the M.S. in five fields. There also are courses in 18 pre-professional areas and Air Force ROTC.
