Fifty-Fourth Annual Field Meet and Homecoming the Oldest Traditional Athletic Event in the State

Dr. J. L. Morrill, President of the University of Minnesota, will be the assembly speaker on Field Meet and Homecoming Day, Saturday, February second. This is the fifty-fourth observance of this occasion.

The Track and Field Meet will be held in the gymnasium beginning at two o'clock in the afternoon. This tradition has been observed on the first Saturday in February every year since 1892, and is one of the oldest athletic events in the Northwest.

There are eleven events for the boys and six for the girls. The boys events are, Rope Climb, One Mile Run, Shot Put, High Jump, 80-yard Swim, Swim Relay, 25-yard Dash, Half Mile Run, Shuttle Race, Potato Race, and the Quarter Mile Run. The events for the girls are, Rope Vault, Girls Archery, 40-yard Swim, Nail Drive, Relay Race, and 25-yard Dash.

The officials for the Track and Field Meet will be: Sheldon E. Beise, Referee and Starter; J. M. Drew and Ralph E. Miller, Scorers; P. A. Anderson, K. L. Thomas, and P. L. Johnsrud, Finish Judges.

J. B. Torrance, Otto Swenson, Victor Newcomb, Carl Borgeson, John Straight, Max K. Hinds, Mrs. Ralph E. Miller, Mrs. Bernette Peterson, Miss Eunice Hendrickson, and Miss Phyllis Durham are the Field Judges. Timers are W. L. Boyd, E. M. Johnson, and Ralph Nichols. Marshalls are W. H. Dankers, J. M. McGregor, and Truman Nodland; Announcer, Emmet Finnell; Faculty Advisers, Marie F. Eibner and Joseph A. Nowotny.

Presentation of awards will be made by Dr. J. O. Christianson at the close of each event.

Girl contestants who placed in the 1945 Field Meet and who will compete in 1946 are Celesta Schiltgen, Elizabeth Anderson, Mary Braun, Rhoda Glaeser, Mary Schiltgen, Annette Held, Verna Bogatzki, Margaret Ellison, Jo Ann Friese, Allene Johnson, Dorothy Walser, Mary Miller, and Ruth Wichelmann. Mary Braun all but beat the Field meet record 6' 9" for rope vaulting. In the intra mural tournament in archery, last fall, Verna Bogatzki beat the Field Meet record. Mary Braun and Rhoda Glaeser were in the Junior relay team which lowered the Field meet record of 40 seconds to 38.8 seconds in 1945.

If signs do not fail, other records will be set in the 54th annual Field and Track Meet.
