DULUTH -- A constitutional amendment revamping the Student Association's vice-presidency was passed, 540 votes to 364, in the UMD All-School Elections that ended Wednesday (April 27).

The amendment abolishes the single, elected vice-president and establishes four appointed vice-presidents in the areas of Public Relations, National and International Affairs, Campus and Community and Academic Affairs.

Incombent SA President Ed Thomas of Duluth ran unopposed and picked up 786 votes from the 904 students who went to the polls. The absence of competition for this key post resulted in the highest voter turnout in recent years.

Judy Noren of Paynesville outpolled Julie Anderson of Duluth for president of Kirby Student Center, 562 to 309.

Barbara Haase of Cloquet was elected SA secretary while Mary Dexter of Bagley was running unopposed for SA treasurer.

Susan Barich of Minneapolis defeated Joanne Backlund for SA vice-president but the passage of the amendment nullified her victory. However, both coeds are expected to be appointed to fill two of the newly-created positions.

Mary Bennes of Thief River Falls and Mike Dean of Hibbing ran a dead heat in the race for senior class president. Each picked up 92 votes. A decision on a run-off is being awaited.

Joy Manzer of Silver Bay was elected senior class vice-president, Mary Kay Hoffman of Duluth the senior class secretary while Dick Anneke and Kathy Johnson, both of Duluth, ran unopposed for the publications board.

In the junior class races, Ron Carlson of Duluth captured the presidency. Heather Aitken of St. Paul the vice-presidency and Barbara Look of Duluth was elected secretary.

Greg Garard emerged as sophomore class president with David Steel winning the vice-presidency and Lynn Zentner the secretary's post. All three are Duluthians.
