AT EUROPEAN WORKSHOP Music faculty Ann C. Anderson and Patricia M. Laliberte will be part of the 6th annual International String Workshop Aug. 4-17 at Lausanne, Switzerland. Anderson, a violinist and Laliberte, a pianist, will perform in masters classes and as part of a public concert by workshop musicians. Before returning to the U.S., they will give concerts at Zurich, Switzerland and Vienna, Austria.

WATERCOLOR EXHIBITION Tweed Museum of Art will host the first exhibition sponsored by the newly organized Midwest Watercolor Society opening Saturday, Aug. 6. The show will feature 102 works by watercolor artists from the U.S. and Canada. Artists will be competing for \$1,000 in awards including a Tweed Museum membership purchase award. One of the judges of the show is Robert E. Wood, nationally known watercolor artist and former member of the UMD art department. The exhibition will be displayed in the Tweed Museum main gallery and balcony through Sept. 11.

NEW GRADUATE CREDIT POLICY Graduate School rules for transfer of credit as an adult special or summer only student have been changed. The new rule permits two consecutive summer school registrations within the same calendar year as a summer only student or an adult special registration from the regular school year to transfer to a Graduate School program with approval of the advisor and the program. All such work must be in courses approved for Graduate School credit. Students who have questions should consult with the Graduate School office.

LOAN AND OTHER DEBT REPAYMENT Students who plan to complete degree requirements this summer and students who do not intend to return to UMD fall quarter who have loans or other financial obligations to the University must make arrangements for an "Exit Interview" prior to the end of Summer Session or withdrawing from school. Please contact the UMD Loan Collection Office, 210 Administration Building, for an appointment. Additional charges will be assessed to those students who fail to receive the interview.

UNDERGRADUATE ADMISSIONS Summer Session students who have not been admitted to attend classes at UMD during the regular academic year may stop at the Admissions Office, 123 Administration Building, to process the necessary forms. Prompt action is encouraged to allow ample time to consideration of the application. Attendance in Continuing Education and Extension classes does not imply admission to regular academic year programs.
