MEMORIAL CONVOCATION

To All the Members of the University—

It seems eminently fitting that the University should hold a convocation in memory of the men of Minnesota who died in the service of their country. Accordingly the eleven-thirty hour on Thursday, May 29th, has been set aside for this purpose.

It is planned that the convocation shall be simple and unostentatious, but dignified and impressive. There will be no address. The exercises will consist of music, scriptural readings, and the simple presentation of the names of the men who have died. It is desired that the service shall be expressive of the spirit of solemn triumph.

It is assumed that everyone will desire to share in this tribute to the memory of our soldier dead. An endeavor will be made to provide ample seating accommodations. It is suggested that the true spirit of the occasion will be fostered if the audience convenes and retires in silence.
