## BASKET BALL GAMES GALORE

## NO NEW ASPIRANTS FOR BOARD HONORS

Medics and Laws Will Hold Caucus. Medic Representative Chosen.

At last, things are beginning to liven up in the Board of Control campaign.

A candidate for Medical representative has appeared and is being enthusiastically supported by his friends.

The Medics are preparing to hold their caucus on Monday and all candidates who are running from that department will then have to appear to get the nomination from the caucus. The only one at present in the field, came forward to-day in the person of Burton Brandon, a member of the Junior Class. Mr. Brandon himself has not yet announced his candidacy but his friends are confident that they will prevail upon him to enter the contest.

The laws have also taken a brace and gotten into the game. They will hold their caucus to-day at 12 o'clock and come to a definite conclusion in regard to the stand to be taken by their department. It is the middle class which holds the caucus, but following the usual custom, the Junior and Senior classes have agreed to abide by their decision.
