

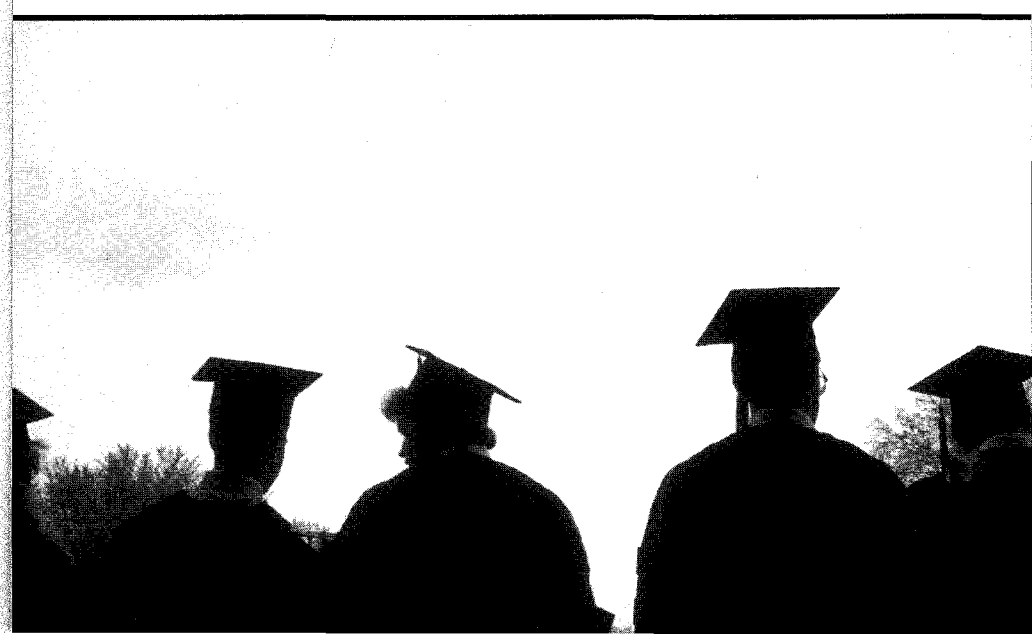

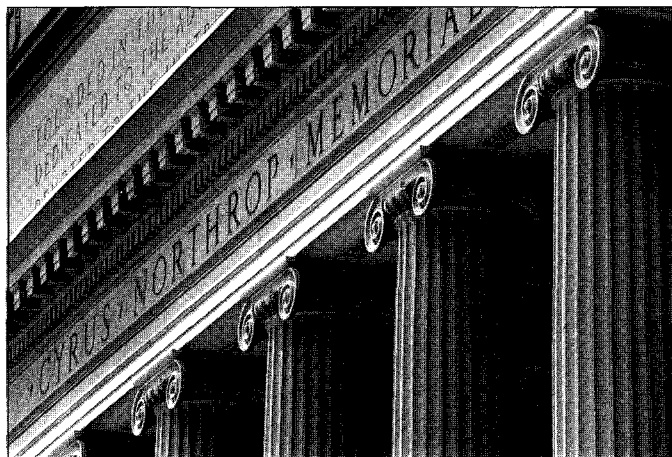
...world-class education for tomorrow

The University of Minnesota, ranked among the nation's top public universities, reflects the state of Minnesota's strong and enduring commitment to education. It is almost alone among universities in the United States in its three defining characteristics:

- It is an international research university.
- It is a land-grant institution with a strong tradition of education and public service.
- Its largest campus—the Twin Cities campus—is located in a vibrant metropolitan area with not one, but two great cities at its center: Minneapolis and St. Paul.

The University is the primary center in Minnesota (and much of the Upper Midwest) for instruction and research in the liberal arts and sciences, health sciences, law, education, engineering, agriculture, and forestry. The Twin Cities campus comprises 19 colleges and offers a full range of academic and professional degrees. A comprehensive campus in Duluth offers undergraduate and graduate programs. The Morris campus offers a four-year liberal arts program. Crookston offers associate and baccalaureate degrees in technical, career-oriented programs. Through the Minnesota Extension Service, the University is present in each of Minnesota's 87 counties.

When the University was founded as a preparatory school in 1851, Minnesota had been a territory for just two years, and statehood was still seven years away. The school was built on little more than the pioneers' faith in edu-



cation. The University struggled financially in its early years and was forced to close during the Civil War. It reopened in 1867, thanks to the energetic leadership of Governor John S. Pillsbury, who came to be known as the "Father of the Univer-

sity." Mathematics Professor William Watts Folwell became the University's first president in 1869.

Two students received bachelor of arts degrees at the first commencement in June 1873. Since then, the University has granted a total of 537,583 degrees (through June 1999). Students earn undergraduate and graduate degrees in more than 250 fields of study. During the 1998–99 academic year, the University of Minnesota conferred a total of 11,058 degrees on all of its campuses.

University alumni include five Nobel Prize winners, a former chief justice of the United States, two former U.S. vice presidents, the heads of Fortune 500 companies, pioneers in medicine, civil rights leaders, top journalists, distinguished teachers and scholars, performing artists, and men and women who have achieved distinction in every field.

Alumni and their families and friends are always welcome at the University. We invite you to visit campus regularly to enjoy the many educational, cultural, and entertainment opportunities that are open to the public—including performances by students in CLA's arts programs. We also invite you to continue your relationship with the University through the Minnesota Alumni Association and the CLA Alumni Society.

THE COLLEGE OF LIBERAL ARTS

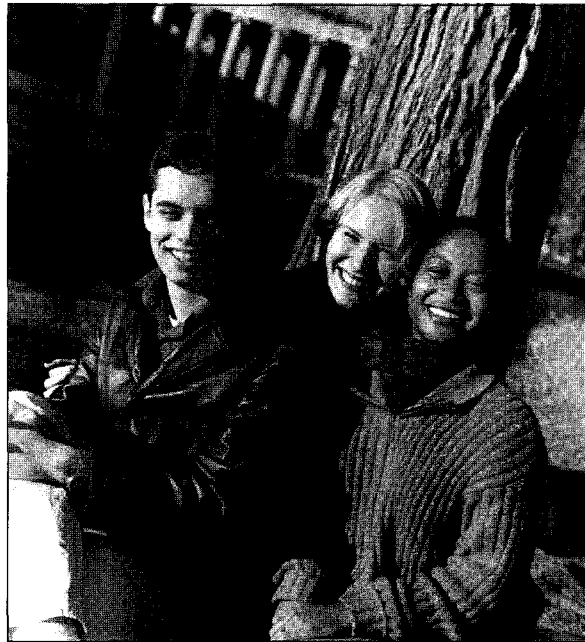
...education for a lifetime

The College of Liberal Arts (CLA) was formally established at the University of Minnesota in 1868, 17 years after the founding of the University. Since then, it has become an international center for education in the arts, humanities, and social sciences.

The liberal arts span all areas of human knowledge, enterprise, and aspirations. The college offers 60 majors, with study and research opportunities in fields ranging from anthropology to women's studies. Students whose interests cross disciplines may also choose to design individualized major programs.

The majority of students who enter CLA as first-year students complete their undergraduate education in CLA. Others complete their basic liberal arts coursework in the college and then transfer to other units of the University. The college offers strong preprofessional programs with close ties to the health sciences and other professional schools at the University.

There are more than 15,000 undergraduate students and 1,700 graduate students enrolled in CLA programs. Approximately 540 permanent faculty members—teachers and scholars of international stature—share with students



their vast knowledge, their provocative insights, and the most current research in their fields.

CLA students acquire both breadth of knowledge and particular depth and proficiency in a specialized field of knowledge. Whatever their majors, students complete an education based broadly in the liberal arts. Courses necessary to meet general education requirements introduce students to modes of inquiry

and subject matter across the major branches of knowledge. This education is the very best preparation for lives and careers in a rapidly changing world—a solid grounding in ideas and knowledge across disciplines, across centuries, across cultures, and across geographic boundaries, as well as in critical analysis, communication, and research methodologies.

Equipped with this education, graduates of the College of Liberal Arts bring into the world the communication skills, critical and innovative thinking, creativity, and intellectual versatility needed for a lifetime of learning and leadership.

CARL ROWAN

DISTINGUISHED JOURNALIST

Keynote Speaker 3:00 p.m.

Carl T. Rowan (M.A. '50, journalism) is one of the most esteemed and honored Americans in the fields of journalism, publishing, civic leadership, and public service.

He has been a naval officer and an Ambassador to Finland, and was Director of the U.S. Information Agency at the height of the Cold War. A prolific writer and astute and visionary thinker, he is one of America's most revered and trusted journalists.



In his recent book *The Coming Race War in America*, Rowan examines growing racial tensions in the United States.

Honors and kudos for Rowan have been accumulating since his days as a reporter with the *Minneapolis Tribune* more than 45 years ago. For his pioneering articles about the shame of state-sponsored racism and segregation, the Junior Chamber of Commerce named him "Minneapolis's Outstanding Young Man," and the U.S. Chamber of

Commerce named him one of "America's Ten Outstanding Young Men" in 1954.

Elected to both the Sigma Delta Chi Hall of Fame and the Black Journalist Hall of Fame, Rowan is the only journalist in American history to be awarded by his peers the coveted Sigma Delta Chi medallion in three successive years for both domestic reporting and foreign correspondence. Along with such notables as Walter Cronkite and Charles Kuralt, he holds the Allen H. Neuharth Award for Excellence in Journalism. He also has received the "Missouri Medal," the highest honor bestowed by the University of Missouri School of Journalism. That university also granted him an honorary degree, one of 53 honorary degrees that he has received.

In television, Rowan has received the Peabody Award and a coveted E.I. DuPont-Columbia University Silver Baton for his specials on Africa and his celebrated reports "Thurgood Marshall: The Man." For 29 years he was a panelist on "Inside Washington," a nationally syndicated weekly public affairs program.

Rowan's eight books include his autobiography, *Breaking Barriers*; and *Dream Makers, Dream Breakers*, a biography of the late U.S. Supreme Court Justice Thurgood Marshall, which was cited by the American Society of Writers on Legal Subjects as "the best law book of 1994."

These tributes caught the attention of then-Secretary of State John Foster Dulles, who asked Rowan to lecture in Asia on "The Role of a Free Press in a Free Society." An even greater honor was to follow: President John F. Kennedy appointed Rowan Deputy Secretary of State and then selected Rowan to serve as a delegate to the United Nations during the Cuban Missile Crisis. Kennedy later named him ambassador to Finland.

Later, as Director of the United States Information Agency (appointed by President Lyndon Johnson), Rowan was the first black American to sit with the cabinet and the U.S. Security Council.

For his civic endeavors, Rowan has received many honors, most notably for founding Project Excellence, a scholarship program for black high school students who excel in learning, writing, and speaking.

Today, Rowan is a director of the Gannett Company and a trustee of the Freedom Forum. He lives in Washington, D.C., with his wife, Vivien.

GENE SPERLING

DIRECTOR OF PRESIDENT CLINTON'S NATIONAL ECONOMIC COUNCIL

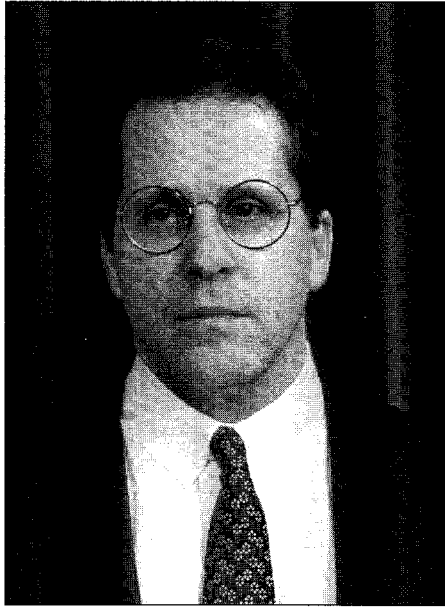
When Gene Sperling ('82, political science), Assistant to the President for Economic Policy and Director of President Clinton's National Economic Council (NEC), is advising the president on the state and direction of the U.S. economy, you can be sure that he is wedding the concept of economic prosperity to the welfare of the American people.

Both an economist and a public servant, Sperling is known for his intelligence, vision, and compassion. His ability not only to grasp the arcane details of government finance but to communicate complex economic issues to the media and the general public has made him a highly respected member of the Clinton administration.

When Sperling became head of the NEC, President Clinton said of his former deputy assistant, "He has been central to development of our budget, our tax, our training, our education policies. I suppose if we were giving MVP awards for our economic team, Gene would have been there in each of the last four years."

As one of the nation's foremost authorities on economic policy, Sperling is the chief architect of the administration's economic policies over the past several years. As a public servant, he has dedicated himself to improving the economic well-being of all Americans: indeed, he has made economic opportunity for Americans the cornerstone of the Clinton administration's economic policies. He also has assumed a lead role in coordinating education-related policy initiatives, including child literacy ("America Reads"), school construction, education technology, and tax breaks for people paying college tuition.

Sperling received his University of Minnesota B.A. in political science with high distinction in 1981. During his senior year, he was captain of the men's tennis team. He received a law degree in 1985 Yale University School



of Law, where he was senior editor of the Yale Law School Review, and also attended the Wharton Business School.

He began his career as a policy consultant, lawyer of appellate Constitutional issues, and economic advisor to public officials. In 1990, he was asked to serve as New York Governor Mario Cuomo's economic advisor. In 1992, he was named deputy director of economic policy for the Clinton administration's transition. After serving from 1993 to 1996 as Deputy As-

sistant to the President for Economic Policy and Deputy Director of the NEC, Sperling was tapped for the post he now holds—a position that oversees the President's Council of Economic Advisors.

In his current position, Sperling has coordinated key international and domestic economic policies, including proposals to use the benefits of debt reduction to extend the solvency of Medicare and Social Security. He has played a key role in development and passage of a number of Presidential policies, including the 1997 Deficit Reduction Act, the Balance Budget Agreement of 1997, the Gear-Up/College Mentoring Initiative, the HOPE Scholarship Tax credit, Empowerment Zones and Community Development Financial Institutions, and the 1998 job training reform bill.

Also a prolific writer, Sperling has written legal commentary for the *Columbia Law Review*, the *Michigan Law Review*, and the *Pennsylvania Law Review* and has contributed articles on U.S. economic policy to the *Atlantic Monthly*, the *Washington Post*, the *New York Times*, and other national publications.

PROFESSOR GORDON HIRSCH

HORACE T. MORSE—UNIVERSITY OF MINNESOTA ALUMNI AWARD FOR OUTSTANDING CONTRIBUTIONS TO UNDERGRADUATE EDUCATION

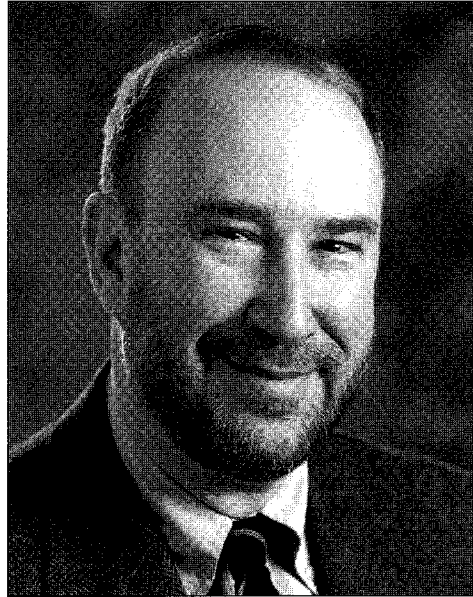
Gordon Hirsch has a gift for inspiring people. Whether he is lecturing to 150 students in a survey English literature course, advising a freshman one-on-one, or helping a senior prepare an application for graduate school, Hirsch brings out the very best in his students.

For his outstanding teaching, advising, and service to the University on behalf of CLA undergraduates, Hirsch has been selected to receive the coveted Horace T. Morse—University of Minnesota Alumni Award for Outstanding Contributions to Undergraduate Education.

Commitment to undergraduate education is Hirsch's trademark. As director of the Honors Program since 1989, Hirsch has been a leader in attracting the best and brightest high school students and bringing national prestige to the College of Liberal Arts. He also serves on the CLA Student Academic Affairs Committee and the University Senate Committee on Educational Policy, where he was a key player in adapting policies from quarters to semesters. He has led a group of undergraduates to London for a study abroad literature program; and he chaperones busloads of students to academic conferences, coaching students on their speeches en route.

"Professor Hirsch is completely unselfish—with his time, commitment, energy, and creativity," praises a former student. "No task is ever too great or too small for his attention."

Hirsch describes his position as director of the CLA Honors Program as "the best and most satisfying job at the University." Taking great pleasure in the progress of his students and advisees, Hirsch has mentored dozens of undergraduates competing for prestigious national



scholarships such as the Marshall, Rhodes, and Truman awards—this year with notable success in two fronts: graduating senior Letisha Morgan received the Marshall Scholarship, and junior Piyali Nath Dalal, the Truman Scholarship. (Several other students were semifinalists.)

A scholar of 19th century British literature, Hirsch draws upon his teaching experiences for his own research and writing. A champion

of books that often fall outside of the literary canon, Hirsch teaches both literary classics and popular culture. Among his favorite authors is Robert Louis Stevenson, whose *Dr. Jekyll and Mr. Hyde* he considers a paradigmatic modern text.

Hirsch's openness to diverse ideas and interpretations makes him a particularly effective teacher. At the core of his teaching is the recognition that there is no single and "right" way to read a text: students bring their own valuable perspectives to the books they read and also find meaning in and understanding of the world through literature. "Reading and discussing literature offers enjoyment and illumination," he says. "It is a means of experiencing different worlds and times, and an opportunity to examine one's own assumptions, ideas, and emotions."

With a B.A. from Cornell University and an M.A. and Ph.D. from the University of California at Berkeley, Hirsch joined the University of Minnesota faculty in 1970. He has received a Woodrow Wilson Fellowship, a Special Career Fellowship from the Ford Foundation, and the University's Gordon L. Starr Award for Academic Advising.

PROFESSOR THEOFANIS STAVROU

HORACE T. MORSE—UNIVERSITY OF MINNESOTA ALUMNI AWARD FOR OUTSTANDING CONTRIBUTIONS TO UNDERGRADUATE EDUCATION

The prolific scholarship of Theofanis Stavrou is surpassed only by his reputation as an exceptional teacher. Stavrou thrives on sharing his infectious love of history with others. Current and former students alike flock to his office to talk about recent political developments in Europe, borrow books, and seek academic guidance.

A recipient of this year's Horace T. Morse-University of Minnesota Alumni Award for Outstanding Contributions to Undergraduate Education, Stavrou says, "One of my greatest delights

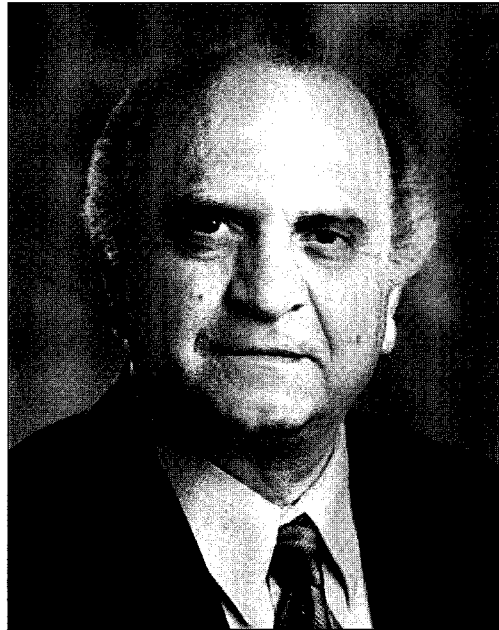

lies with the thousands of undergraduate students who, through the years, enrolled in my survey and upper division history courses.... It has been an extraordinarily satisfying experience, and I still enjoy teaching and mentoring both undergraduate and graduate students."

Stavrou has published widely on Russian and

East European history, particularly the Balkan peninsula. He frequently attends conferences and delivers lectures at over 35 colleges and universities in the United States and abroad. Stavrou is a founding member of the University of Cyprus and served on its Interim Governing Board from 1989-1995.

A passionate advocate of experiential learning, Stavrou routinely leads his students out of the classroom to visit museums, libraries, special collections, and even



foreign countries. He has been the director of the study abroad program SPAN (Student Project for Amity among Nations) since 1964 and will be taking his thirteenth student group to Greece in June 2000.

In 1982, Stavrou created the Modern Greek Studies Program at the University of Minnesota for the teaching of modern Greek language, literature, and culture. Director since the program's inception, he sponsors lectures by

world-renowned historians and hosts an annual Modern Greek Letters symposium in conjunction with the University libraries.

His contributions to the field of Balkan history include editorship of the internationally recognized *Nostos* Series in Modern Greek History and Culture, publisher of more than twenty volumes. Stavrou is also the editor and founder of an international scholarly journal, *Modern Greek Studies Yearbook*. In addition, he is the general editor of the Minnesota Mediterranean and East European Monograph series.

Stavrou received his M.A. and Ph.D. from the University of Indiana and has been a member of the University of Minnesota faculty since 1961. During his time at the University he has been honored many times for his scholarship and service: he has received a Ford Foundation Foreign Area Fellowship, grants from the International Research and Exchanges Board, a McKnight Humanities award, Special Recognition of Excellence by the Academy of Athens, and First Distinguished Award by the Russian and East European Institute of Indiana. He recently was elected president of Friends of the Library at the University of Minnesota.

LIBERAL ARTS DEGREES

The College of Liberal Arts offers five bachelor's degrees—bachelor of arts (B.A.), bachelor of individualized studies (B.I.S.), bachelor of fine arts (B.F.A.), bachelor of music (B.M.), and bachelor of science (B.S.). The bachelor's degrees have many requirements in common.

DEGREE CANDIDATES

Subject to successful completion, degrees will be conferred on those students listed below and on others meeting all curriculum requirements for graduation. Honor citations are provisional and do not become final until all requirements are met for the level indicated. Degrees and degree candidates are listed alphabetically in this program.

Honors designations—Honors graduates complete college and departmental honors requirements with a minimum of 60 credits overall with a grade of 'A.' Students graduating *cum laude* have earned As in at least 50 percent of their upper division credits. Students graduating *magna cum laude* have earned As in 66 percent of their upper division credits. Students graduating *summa cum laude* have earned As in 75 percent of their upper division credits and have completed an honors thesis or project.

THE DEGREE OF BACHELOR OF ARTS

This degree can be earned through majors in most CLA departments and programs. Its breadth and diversity in general education make it valuable as a base for many kinds of careers or for advanced study. CLA offers several professional majors and specializations as well as interdepartmental programs for the B.A. degree.

ACADEMIC COSTUME

Academic gowns date back to the 14th century, when they served two functions of nearly equal importance: to indicate the academic rank of the wearer and to keep the scholar warm in the drafty stone halls of academia.

The markings, cut, and color of modern-day academic costume—cap, gown, and sometimes hood—indicate the academic degree, the field of study, and the institution that granted the degree.

Bachelor's degree gowns are black and untrimmed. A tassel hanging from the mortar board worn on the head is color-coded by college at the University of Minnesota. The College of Liberal Arts tassel is white. Honors graduates wear a medallion adorned with a maroon and gold ribbon.

Master's degree gowns, black and untrimmed, have pointed sleeves. Doctoral gowns in the United States traditionally have been black with velvet front facings and crossbars on the sleeves, but in recent years a number of universities have adopted gowns of distinctive school colors.

A new University of Minnesota Ph.D. gown and matching tam made their appearance in 1988 to celebrate the centenary of the first Minnesota doctor of philosophy degree. The new Minnesota gown is maroon-trimmed with black velvet chevrons and gold metallic braid. The traditional gown may still be worn.

The Minnesota hood, which may be worn by anyone with a doctoral degree from the University of Minnesota, is black with maroon chevron on gold. Each institution has its own pattern of colors on the hood, worn around the neck and down the back of the gown. The length and shape of the hood identify the most advanced degree the wearer has earned, and the velvet edging shows the field: blue for doctor of philosophy, light blue for doctor of education, and pink for doctor of musical arts.

At commencement ceremonies those who already have the doctoral degree wear hoods. Degree candidates wear the gowns appropriate for the degrees they are about to receive, and new doctorates are hooded on stage.

THE MACE

The University of Minnesota mace was carried for the first time in 1961 by Regents' Professor of Physics Alfred O.C. Nier at the inauguration of President O. Meredith Wilson. Art professor Philip Morton designed the mace: a crystal sphere four inches in diameter surmounted by the North Star, symbol of the state of Minnesota, on a solid aluminum handle set with the University regents' seal.

THE NORTHPROP ORGAN

Comprising 108 ranks of pipes, the Northrop Memorial Auditorium organ is not only one of the largest organs in the Upper Midwest but also one of the finest examples in the United States of a late-Romantic concert-hall organ. Built in 1932, the organ is located in the ceiling of the auditorium, above the stage and behind the proscenium, and is placed from a console on an elevator platform in the orchestra pit. Unlike many large organs from its era, the Northrop organ is completely unaltered and entirely in its original condition.
