Boilermakers to Arrive Today for Crucial Conference Game

Gophers Plan Pass Attack for Purdue, Defense Stressed

Visitors Confident of Victory Over Improved Minnesota Grid Combination

GOPHERS IN LIGHT
Whether or not it rolls tomorrow Purdue's power attack will roll into Minneapolis this morning confident of victory over Bernie Bierman's improved and modernized football machine.

The Purdue team under Coach Noble Kizer will take the usual light workout in the Stadium this afternoon while Bernie Bierman and the Gophers go through much the same procedure.

Yesterday's secret practice found the Minnesota squad polishing off its attack and strengthening its pass defense. A second team ran off pass play against a Minnesota secondary defense while Bierman endeavored to point out weaknesses in the Purdue aerial offense.

During the week Bierman has given the Gophers some new plays which, if they work smoothly, seem to be point-getters for Minnesota. The Gopher coach has again kept to the practice of giving the varsity no scrimmage, only a stiff signal drill. Purdue left Lafayette last night and will be here sometime this morning. Reports from Indiana state that the Boilermakers may prove overconfident, a factor that may lead to disaster. Kizer's team defeated Minnesota 7-0 last year and expects to repeat the shutout process and with a vengeance.

Minnesota, after its splendid showing last week against Indiana, appears set for the Boilermakers. There is no overconfidence here but the team feels it can and will win if it plays the football of which it is capable.

Saturday will find Bierman starting the same lineup that he used against Indiana with the sole exception that Julius Alfonso will probably be at right half in place of George Roscoe.

The Gophers are all in sound physical condition except for several men still bothered by the epidemic of boils. George Rennix has been working out all week and while he will not play tomorrow, undoubtedly will be in shape to face Pittsburgh next week.

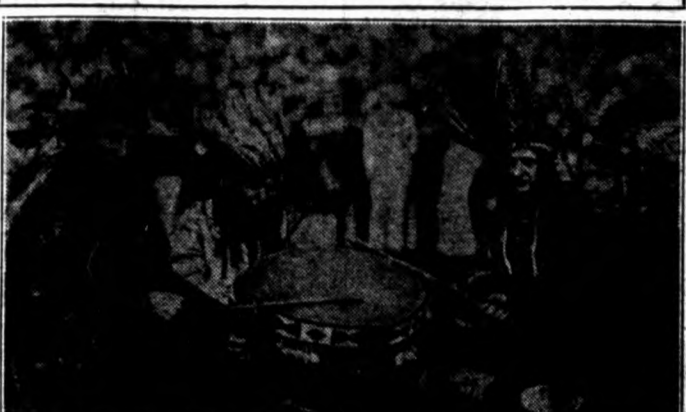
