## SOLONS WILL VISIT US

**Minnesota House will Make Their Annual Visit This Afternoon— Meeting in Chapel at 3 P. M.**

This afternoon the House of Representatives of the Minnesota Legislature will be the guest of the University.

The invitation was extended by Representative Gillette in behalf of the University authorities, and after the tour of inspection the members will be entertained by Mr. Gillette at his home in southeast Minneapolis.

It is thought that the party will arrive about 3 p. m. and the first thing on the program will be a meeting in chapel, at which several of the Solons will address the student body. It is the wish of President Northrop that every student who possibly can will make it a point to be present at this time, and he hopes to see the chapel crowded in honor of the event.

At the conclusion of the chapel exercises the Legislators will be taken in hand by the faculty and will be shown through the buildings, and the needs of the various departments will be explained to them in detail.

No student who is on the campus at 3 p. m. can find an excuse for being absent from the meeting in chapel, as no classes will be held after the close of the fifth hour.

### The President's Visit

The first citizen in the land will be here next Saturday. The Commercial Club has arranged to have the Battery fire a salute of twenty-one guns a minute apart as he approaches the Armory; to deliver his address; and it behooves every good citizen to be out and do him honor. There is a great demand for the seats in the Armory and there are only 4,000 to distribute. Senator Wyman of the committee has been given 200 tickets for the University. As there are 150 members of the faculty; 12 regents with their wives and several more to be arranged for, the chances of the student body for hearing the formal address in the Armory is quite small.

A large number will go to St. Paul where he is scheduled to speak from the capitol steps in the morning.

The members of the Commercial club are having a harder time even, than is Mr. Wyman in distributing the tickets for the Armory speech.

Counting standing room, only 4,000 people can be crowded into the armory and the special trains and people coming from all over the state there are at least 150,000 who will ask for tickets.

### Hon. D. W. Lawler in Chapel

An event of unusual importance will be the address of Hon. D. W. Lawler of St. Paul in chapel next Sunday afternoon, under the auspices of the U. C. A. Mr. Lawler will speak on the subject, "Christianity and Patriotism." Miss Frances Vincent will sing several selections and the students will have an opportunity to hear this gifted soloist in a repertoire of sacred music.

Mr. Lawler's reputation as a forceful and polished public speaker is already well known to a majority of the students. Those who have heard him will desire to hear him again and those who have not should not let this opportunity

pass of hearing so able an orator. The subject is one of vital interest. The speaker will treat his theme in its eminently practical phases in a manner which must appeal especially to a student audience.

The charm and power of Miss Vincent's singing, particularly well displayed in sacred music, will be a pleasing part of the afternoon's program. The meeting will be at 3 o'clock.

## ON LIBERAL EDUCATION

**President Hadley Discussed This Subject Before the Students Yesterday**

Yesterday morning President Hadley of Yale addressed the students in chapel. He was introduced by President Northrop as one of the wise men of the East and he responded by saying that if he was, as Dr. Northrop said, one of the wise men of the east, that President Northrop was the star that had led him out to Minnesota. Years ago, he said, he first came under Dr. Northrop's teaching at Yale. From him he had learned orderliness of thought and adoption of means to an end. The rapid development of technical education made us forget sometimes that there was anything but technical education. He did not mean the education of the technical schools. ## IN FEATS OF SKILL

**Representatives of Western Colleges Will Compete Friday at the Armory**

It doesn't seem possible that anyone who has seen the magnificent display of prize cups in the window at the Students' Book Store can have any doubt as to the importance of the Western Athletics of the meet which is to be held at the Armory on Friday night of April 2nd. Four of the greatest colleges of this great Northwest are to be represented by their best gymnasts.

A meet of this kind is especially interesting to spectators for the grace and agility which is displayed on the apparatus and the intricacy and difficulty of the various stunts. It will be remembered what a prominent part this work played in the late circus.

The "U" gymnasts sat for their pictures yesterday afternoon and are about ready for the final struggle. The boys have improved wonderfully and they feel that if the pennant is carried away from the "U" it will have to be earned. The value and magnificence of the prizes, far surpassing anything ever offered at the "U" before, will stimulate the teams to supreme effort.

A feature of the occasion will be the human pyramids by the Minnesota strong men. Wisconsin will bring Seiger, her trick bicyclist, Scrieber, the crack tumbler and Hill, her slack wire man and trapeze balancer.

The judges will be Messrs. Ruthfus, Herman, and Kuttner of St. Paul and they will mark on the basis of ten points, 5 for form and combination, 3 for difficulty, 2 for approach and finish. The totals of the judges decide which men have first, second and third places. First place counts for its team five points, second place 3 points, 3rd place 1 point. In club swinging each man will be marked for smoothness of movement, variety of combinations and using both arms equally well. In tumbling each man will be marked on his whole performance including his double work.

The college will be champion which shall score a plurality of points in the seven championship events.

The competitor will be champion Intercollegiate Gymnast who shall score a plurality of points on Horizontal bar, Parallel bars, Side horse and Tumbling. PRIZES:

What a relief and joy it was to hear and see an even, all-around performance, and not be given the usual American sensational show of one or two "stars!" Thus with proper division of effort for the acting, singing, orchestra, and scenery, the whole result was an honest presentation of the beautiful and noble ideas and emotions in Lohengrin.

This was given last week in St. Paul in the same balanced character and nearly up to the standard level of opera as presented in Leipzig, for example.

Not merely does the management deserve the whole-souled support of all believers in the German practice and higher ideals of the Theater, but every student of culture should make great efforts to hear this week's presentation of Wagner's Tannhauser. H. Gale.

**Testimony on Moonrise**

Prof. Leavenworth of the department of astronomy has been asked to give some very interesting testimony at the murder trial at St. James. The prosecuting attorney has brought forth evidence that the murder was seen by an eyewitness in the moonlight while the defense, by means of Prof. Leavenworth's testimony will prove that on the night of Dec. 31, 1898, when the murder was committed the moon was not up at

the hour stated. Professor Leavenworth has already figured this out by means of a very simple trigonometric formula. In connection with this case a rather interesting incident has been brought to his notice. In an 1898 almanac issued by a grocery firm in New Ulm where the murder was committed the hour of moon rise was found to be one-half hour earlier than in other almanacs. He discovered, however, that the computations had been made at Berlin and sent out by a firm there, instead of having been made at Washington and so the almanac was incorrect for this country. Prof. Leavenworth is expecting the summons to leave for St. James at any time.

**The Morgan Bill**

The Morgan bill came up on general orders before the Senate yesterday and at the request of Senator Morgan, progress was reported. This merely delays the matter one day more. The delay is taken to mean that the Senator has not got his colleagues lined up as yet to his satisfaction and was somewhat worried as to the fate of the bill had it come up yesterday.
