ADVANCED COURSE, R.O.T.C. 1921-1922

Any physically fit male student who will have, at the end of the present quarter, credit for two years military training in the R.O.T.C., the S.A.T.C., or in both combined, and who is not due to graduate from the University before June, 1923, may be enrolled in the Advanced Course R.O.T.C. for next year. Those who desire to so enroll and to attend the 1921 Advanced Camp, should consult the officer in charge of the Unit in which they desire to apply for enrollment, before May 15. Others who desire to enroll in this course should signify their intention as early as possible so that an estimate of next year's registration may be made and preparations for next year's instruction effected accordingly.

THE BROSS PRIZE

The late Mr. William Bross of Chicago transferred to the trustees of Lake Forest University a sum of money, the income of which was to accumulate in perpetuity for successive periods of ten years. The accumulations of one decade would be spent in the following decade for the purpose of stimulating the production of the best books or treatises "on the connection, relation and mutual bearing of any practical science, or the history of our race, or the facts in any department of knowledge, with and upon the Christian Religion." The prize amounts to \$6,000.00 and will be given to the author of the best book on any phase of the subject suggested by the will. The treatise or book must be presented on or before January 1, nineteen hundred and twenty-five (1925). The manuscript accompanied by a sealed envelope containing the name of the writer must be sent on or before the above date, addressed to the president of Lake Forest College, Lake Forest, Illinois.
