## Dramatist to Give Political Comedy Tuesday at 3 p.m.

"First Lady," George Kaufman's and Katharine Dayton's political comedy sequel to "Of Thee I Sing," will be the vehicle for Pearl Zagor's second and last dramatic recital of the current summer term on Tuesday at 3 p.m. in the Music Auditorium.

The political satire, produced during the recent Broadway season, concerns the contention that politicians' lives are full of wives and in "First Lady" the wives are to be seen running the next presidential election to suit themselves. This is the play that was the vehicle for Maud Scheerer during the first term on the campus.

In her presentation, Mrs. Zagor will recreate the hilarious mood of the comedy in which Jane Cowl starred in the original version. The play follows the same general trend of comedy used by Mr. Kaufman when he wrote "Of Thee I Sing."

In her recitals, Mrs. Zagor conveys the impressions of the play without the use of the supporting cast or scenery. She will endeavor to suggest through variations of voice and gesture the different characters. Included in her repertoire are modern plays, classical drama, one-act plays, short stories and lecture-recitals.

Mrs. Arthur A. Stewart, who has appeared on the campus several times in the past, will present two recitals in the Music Auditorium during the next week. The first will be on Thursday, August 13, when she will present her version of "Victoria Regina" by Laurence Housman. On Tuesday, August 18, Mrs. Stewart will present "Ethan Frome" from the play by Donald Owen Davis.

## Former 'U' Indian Student to Present Recital Today at 3

A former University of Minnesota student and the first "keeper of the drum" which was presented to the university several years ago as a touchdown tom-tom for football games will return to the campus today to present a lecture-recital of his native custom.

He is Chief Chibiaboos, Chippewa baritone, and he will appear in a lecture recital of "The Songs and Dances of the American Indian" at 3 p.m. in the Music Auditorium.

Characterized as "the sweet singer of the Chippewas," Chibiaboos will present a program consisting of songs, legends and dances combined with a discussion of Indian life past and present.

Chibiaboos was born on the Chippewa reservation at Turtle Mountain, North Dakota, and attended school at Fort Totten, Haskell Institute and the University of Minnesota. It was while associate at Minnesota that he took over the job of beating the tom-tom presented to the university football team as a touchdown drum. He began his voice career in the glee clubs and choir at school.

Since leaving the university, Chief Chibiaboos has devoted his time to voice study and to giving programs throughout the Northwest. He has been featured with the Indian Hill ceremonials at Kilbourn, Wisconsin and has appeared on several Indian radio programs.
