

DULUTH--Classical marionettes, folk singers and three nationally respected authorities on the English language and the U.S. world affairs will be presented by the UMD Convocations and Lectures committee during the fall quarter.

Dr. Peter Arnott, returning to UMD for the second straight year due to his popularity, and his company of marionettes will visit Tweed Gallery October 10, 11 and 12 with 8 p.m. curtains.

Arnott's remarkable puppets will be seen in three classics: Les Fourberies de Scapin, Oedipus the King and Medea. Arnott is a member of the Department of Classics at the State University of Iowa.

Oct.14 -- The Brothers Four, well-known folk singing group, popular on college campuses across the nation, 8 p.m., Physical Education building. A feature of UMD's annual Homecoming celebration.

Oct.16 --Bergan Evans, professor of English at Northwestern University and former moderator of "The Last Word" television program, talking on "The Language We Speak", 10:30 a.m., Kirby Student Center ballroom.

Oct.24 --Alistair Cooke, chief U.S. correspondent for Britain's Manchester Guardian and narrator of the award-winning "Omnibus" television program a few ydars ago, on "What Has The United Nations Done", 8 p.m., Kirby ballroom.

Nov. 1 --Leon Bibb, a rising young Negro folk and ballad singer and recording artist, 8 p.m., Kirby ballroom. This convocation has only limited seating and is closed to everyone but faculty, staff and students.
