UNAUTHORIZED REMOVAL OF RIFLES FROM ARMORY

On Thursday, June 3, 1920, four United States Army rifles were not returned to the Armory by students after the drill hour. The students having these rifles in their possession should return them at once to avoid expense to the University and trouble to themselves. Individuals having in their possession property of the United States, not authorized to have such property, are guilty of theft and are liable to severe penalties. Unless the rifles in question are returned by June 15, the matter will be placed in the hands of the Department of Justice. The guilty parties, if discovered, will receive no consideration whatever, but will be proceeded against as common criminals.
