### "BETTER MINNESOTA"

The following resolution has been received by the President of the University:

Whereas, the Student Academic Council is deeply interested in fostering those essentials to a better Minnesota, and

Whereas, the Student Academic Council has from time to time received and recommended suggestions of proved merit to the University, and

Whereas, it has recently been called to the attention of the Council that

1. The parking of automobiles in front of the Pillsbury Monument is not in keeping with a "better Minnesota" spirit, and

2. That the wearing of headgear by some men students in the corridors of the campus buildings, especially Folwell Hall, is a habit of carelessness unworthy of true gentlemanly conduct becoming a Minnesota student,

Therefore, the Student Academic Council goes on record as strongly recommending to the Student Body that hereafter

1. No cars be parked in front of the Pillsbury Monument, and

2. That male students refrain from wearing their headgear while inside of campus buildings.
