VOCAL RECITAL ON FRIDAY

The next recital will be given in the Little Theater on Friday afternoon at four o'clock. The artists will be Mrs. Corinne Frank Bowen, Soprano; Miss Ann O'Malley, Contralto, and Miss Carol Hurlbut, Pianist.

Both singers are members of the Municipal Quartet, and are considered leading vocalists in the Twin Cities. Their program will be made up of arias and songs, taken from the best of their repertory; and because of the contrast in the two voices will offer a variety unexcelled by any recital of the summer series. LECTURES ON GREECE

A series of two lectures on Greece will be given on Wednesday and Thursday, August 9 and 10, by Mr. J. P. Leotsakos. Mr. Leotsakos is a graduate of the classical college and the law department of the University of Athens, and has spent some years in educational work in America.

The first lecture, "Classic Greece," will treat of that wonderful period running from the days of Troy to the Athens of Pericles. The second will deal with the period from the fall of Constantinople (1453) to the war of independence, 1821. Both lectures will be well illustrated with the stereopticon, showing representative places and peoples of the country.

This opportunity to hear of Greece from a native Greek, whose education and interests sympathetic with western culture, is a rare one. Students of modern politics, in particular, will be interested in the resume of the near-east situation, and the place Greece occupies in it, which Mr. Leotsakos will give.

SUMMER SESSION MIXER, FRIDAY NIGHT

The social gatherings commonly known as "Mixers," which form such a pleasing part of the recreational program in the Summer Session, will be continued during the second term, so far as the demand justifies. None was given during the first week because of repair work at the Armory which prevented use of the floor for a time. There will be one this week, Friday night, from eight to eleven o'clock. It is open only to faculty and students of the Summer Session, but all of those are welcome and with good cooperation the second term series may be made as enjoyable as the first.

EXCURSION TO TELEPHONE OPERATING PLANT

Arrangements have been made for a tour of inspection of the operating plant of the Northwestern Bell Telephone Company. The company is eager to have students become acquainted with the workings of its system, and will furnish guides who will explain all the operations. To do this, the number who will probably take the tour will have to be known; and the request is made that those who intend to go will please register at Window 10 of the Registrar's Office.

The best hours for seeing operations under full pressure are in the morning, so that on Saturday afternoon especially

a tour will be less desirable. Accordingly one tour has been arranged for Saturday morning, at nine o'clock. The party will leave the Library promptly at the hour, and go by street cars to the main office, 607 Third Ave. South.

For those whose classes prevent attending at that hour a second trip is arranged for Monday afternoon, leaving the Library at one-thirty. This will bring the party to the Exchange before business subsides very much. Neither party will be limited, but advance registration is desirable so that the number attending on each day may be provided for.
