Education and Psychology

Valworth R. Plumb, Chairman

Miss Mary E. Bowne, assistant professor of women's physical education, is a native of Olivet, Mich., and a graduate of Washington high school, Cedar Rapids, Ia. She received the B. A. degree from Coe college in 1933, the M. S. degree and the Ph.D. from the University of Wisconsin in 1941 and 1956 respectively. She previously taught at Roosevelt high school, Cedar Rapids, St. Mary college, Leavenworth, Kans., Bradley university, Peoria, Ill., and Morningside college, Sioux City, Ia.

Ivan Doseff, Jr., instructor of psychology, a native of St. Paul, received the B.A. (1946) and M.A. (1957) degrees from the University of Minnesota. Now executive director of the Duluth Junior Achievement program, he has taught rapid reading at the Minneapolis YMCA and vocational high school. He received JA training at the Chicago JA center.
