DULUTH--Huai-Chang Chiang, UMD associate professor of biology, is one of four scientists outside England named recently to the Royal Entomological Society of London.

Professor Chiang studied at Cambridge university, Cambridge, England, under a Guggenheim Foundation fellowship grant, in 1956 and 1957.

Paul Freeman, RESL secretary, advised him of his selection in a congratulatory announcement.

B. P. Uvarov, staff member of the Anti-Locust Research center in London, is RESL president, and J. S. Kennedy, member of the zoology faculty at Cambridge, vice president.

Professor Chiang was associated with Kennedy during his Guggenheim grant research.

A native of Sunkiang Su, China, and a graduate of Tsing Hua university, China, in 1938, and the University of Minnesota in 1946 (M.S.) and 1947 (Ph.D.), Professor Chiang has done extensive research on the fruit fly, the European corn borer and other insects.

Under a three-year, \$12,300 National Science foundation project, Professor Chiang currently is studying migratory and dispersal characteristics of the fruit fly and the corn borer moth.
