which is a shame and a disgrace to the  
University, is the fact that the ticket  
speculator is too often a student him-  
self.

Such a man who holds up the friends

his own personal gain deserves noth-  
ing but the utmost scorn and contempt  
of his fellow students.

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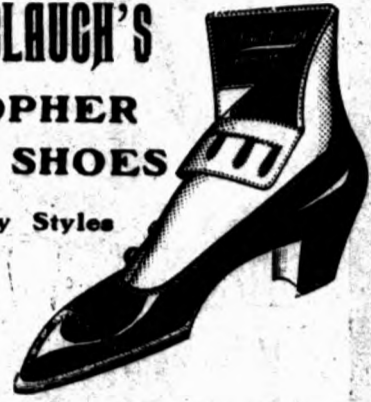
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
